PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Those assembled were led in the pledge of allegiance by Bruce Washburn.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Michael Bleak.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the minutes of the November 13, 2017 Iron County Commission Meeting. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Dale Brinkerhoff reported that he had delivered a copy of the Southwest Behavioral Health Center year-end budget report ending June 30, 2017 to the other Iron County Commissioners and Dan Jessen as required. He noted that the next Iron County Commission meeting would be held at the Iron County Courthouse in Parowan, Utah on January 22, 2018. An open house would be held the afternoon of February 12, 2018.

REVIEW OF BOARD APPOINTMENTS

Various board appointments were discussed with Jon Whittaker and assignments for follow ups were made. On the Accident Review Board, Del Schlosser, Joanna Cuthers, Cindy Bulloch, and Lori Eichelberger were either corrected or added. The Commissioners noted the need for names for the Career Service Council. Jon Whittaker was tasked to verify who the representatives were for the Health Insurance Committee, particularly in the Auditor, and Justice Court offices. Alma Adams was tasked to verify that Craig Laub was still willing to serve on the Special Service District #3 (SSD#3) board. Jon Whittaker was tasked to verify whether the Mountain View Special Service District Board was still necessary. Alma Adams was tasked to review the entire Natural Resource Advisory Council. Mike Bleak was tasked to review the Planning Commission, especially in regards to dates of service. Mike Bleak was tasked to verify who replaced Kenzie Lundberg on the Tourism Advisory Board. Mike Bleak was tasked to review the engineer position on the Water Conservancy District with Paul Monroe. Alma was tasked to verify the continued service of the members of the Weed Control Board.

The Iron County Commission liaison assignments for the individual commissioners were reviewed with no changes.

COMMISSION REPORTS

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he had met with the Iron County Engineers in regards to the restoration of the Parowan City secondary water irrigation system. The project was moving forward but the irrigation water may not be available until around August of 2018.

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he had asked Steve Platt to schedule a meeting with the Beryl Valley farmers to discuss flood control.

Mike Edwards, Deputy County Attorney, reported that the changes that were requested in the Cedar City Fire Agreement, approved in the November 13, 2017 Iron County Commission meeting, were added to the agreement.

PUBLIC HEARING FOR PROPOSED ROAD/STREET VACATION AND ABERDEEN TOWNSITE PLAT AMENDMENT

Chad Nay, Zoning Administrator, explained that the public hearing was being held to receive public comment concerning a proposed partial vacation and plat amendment of the Aberdeen Townsite, Survey Sections 27 and 28, T35S, R12W, SLB&M, Iron County, Utah. This included the vacating and reconfiguring of roads and lots requested by Frank Nichols.

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commission Chair, declared a public hearing for the proposed road/street vacation and the Aberdeen Townsite Plat amendment open. No comments were offered. Dale Brinkerhoff declared the public hearing closed.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the proposed road/street partial vacation and plat amendment of the Aberdeen Townsite, Survey Sections 27 and 28, T35S, R12W, SLB&M, Iron County, Utah. This included the vacating and reconfiguring of roads and lots. Findings had shown that there was good cause for the vacation and that no public interest or any person would be injured by the vacation. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Thomas Hale, a citizen of Iron County, explained that he was presenting a follow up on his concern for the lack of road maintenance in the Hidden Valley Ranchos Subdivision. Thomas asked that if the roads were not absorbed by Iron County why taxes were still being collected. Alma Adams noted that all property owners in Iron County paid property taxes. Mr. Hales noted that Hidden Valley Ranchos Subdivision property owners were paying Iron County taxes, but not receiving services. Thomas concluded by expressing that the roads needed to be fixed by the Central Iron County Water Conservancy District because they were the ones who excavated the roads when they installed water lines.

APPROVAL OF THE 2018 OVERVIEW AND CONTRACT PROPOSAL FOR "THE COUNTY SEAT" AND "AT YOUR LEISURE"

Alma Adams explained that Rick Peterson, The County Seat, contacted him in regards to the renewal of the contract proposal for "The County Seat" program. Alma noted that the request did not include the "At Your Leisure" program as listed. The contract would be for the half-sponsor package in the amount of \$24,000.00.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the 2018 Overview and Contract proposal for "The County Seat" program for the half-sponsor package in the amount of \$24,000.00. Half of the funds would be taken from the General Fund and half from Tourism funds. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PRAIRIE DOG TAKE APPROVAL REQUEST

Jessica VanWoeart, Division of Wildlife Resources (DWR) Biologist, reported that the DWR had updated the computation of the prairie dog permanent "take" and non-permanent "take" for Iron County for the calendar year 2018, as required by the Habitat Conservation Plan for Utah Prairie Dogs (UPD) in Iron County, Utah. The total 2018 UPD permanent "take" available in Iron County was 98.5, Non-Permanent "take" for Iron County for 2018 was 300. Jessica noted that Kelly Peterson had requested to be on the January 22nd commission agenda for a prairie dog take, but the letter was sent early and would not be addressed at this time.

NON-DELEGATED ITEM – UTAH PRAIRIE DOG

Jessica VanWoeart, Division of Wildlife Resources (DWR) Biologist, presented for approval UPD take at 494 W. 1500 N. Lot 16, Country Meadows PUD, Cedar City, Utah for 0.3 dogs and 0.1 acres which would be a \$100.00 mitigation fee for Logan Obering, Alliance Development.

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve the UPD take at 494 W. 1500 N. Lot 16, Country Meadows PUD, Cedar City, Utah for 0.3 dogs and 0.1 acres which would be a \$100.00 mitigation fee for Logan Obering, Alliance Development. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CEDAR BREAKS NATIONAL MONUMENT PRESENTATION PER PARK SERVICE POLICY REGARDING THE INCREASE OF THE WEEKLY FEE

Paul Roelandt, Cedar Breaks National Monument, reported that the National Park Service (NPS) units across the country were inviting public input on a possible fee increase proposed for 2018. In May of 2017, the NPS released an updated entrance fee rate schedule per the Secretary of Interior's recommendation for all NPS units that charged a fee. In the new model, park units were grouped into levels based on designation and visitation. Under the new pricing model Cedar Breaks entrance and camping fees would change to: Per Person \$7.00, Cedar Breaks Annual Park Pass \$30.00 and Camping per night \$22.00. Entrance fees were not charged to persons under 16 years of age or holders of the America the Beautiful-The National Parks and Federal Recreational Annual, Senior, Access, Military, Every Kid in a Park or Volunteer passes. Fees collected would be reinvested to improve visitor services, and to maintain and provide positive experiences for future visitors. The public would be invited to comment on the proposed increase and could submit comments through the Planning Environment and Public Comment site.

APPROVAL OF THE 5TH DISTRICT PUBLIC DEFENDER CONTRACT RENEWALS FOR JEFF SLACK AND TROY SUNDQUIST

Lori Eichelberger, Iron County Justice Court Administrator, presented 5th District Public Defender Contract Renewals for Jeff Slack and Troy Sundquist. Mike Edwards noted a wording correction to Troy Sundquist's contract on Section 5 paragraph 5.2 to change from "hourly rate of fifty dollars (\$100.00) per hour" to read "hourly rate of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per hour."

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve the 5th District Public Defender Contract renewals for Jeff Slack and Troy Sundquist with the corrections presented. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CONTRACT AWARD FOR JANITORIAL SERVICES AT IRON COUNTY FACILITIES IN IRON COUNTY

Lester Ross, Iron County Lead Facilities Maintenance Administrator, reported that two bids were received and that Krystal Kleen was the low bidder in the amount of \$23,250.00. The contract would include carpet cleaning.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve Krystal Kleen for the Janitorial Services contract award in the amount of \$23,250.00. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CONTRACT AWARD FOR SNOW REMOVAL SERVICES AT IRON COUNTY FACILITIES IN IRON COUNTY

Lester Ross presented two contracts, one for the Iron County Cedar City buildings and one for the Iron County Courthouse in Parowan, for snow removal. Two bids were received for the Cedar City buildings. Lawn Rangers had the low bid which included the Visitor Center at \$90.00 for the parking Lot and \$95.00 for the sidewalks; the Fiddlers Canyon Building at \$75.00 for the parking lot and \$90.00 for the sidewalks; the Justice Center at \$85.00 for the parking lot and \$65.00 for the sidewalks; and the Public Safety Building at \$135.00 for the parking lot and \$125.00 for the sidewalks. All bids were for each snow removal. Ice melt was bid at 40cents per pound. Lester noted that the Iron County Maintenance staff would provide as much help as needed to help keep the costs down.

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve Lawn Rangers for the snow removal services contract award for the Iron County buildings located in Cedar City, Utah as presented by Lester Ross. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Lester reported that one bid was received for the Courthouse snow removal services contract from Harris Custom Cabinets. The bid submitted was \$120.00 for the parking lot and \$90.00 for the sidewalks and ice melt at 40cents per pound.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve Harris Custom Cabinets for the snow removal services contract award at the Iron County Courthouse in Parowan, Utah as presented by Lester Ross. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

LETTER OF INTENT FOR PROPERTY ACQUISITION OF REAL PROPERTY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PRESERVING THE UTAH PRAIRIE DOG (UPD) HABITAT

Mike Edwards, Deputy County Attorney, explained that the parcel in question was located between Parowan and Summit, Utah. The Nature Conservancy (TNC) had a grant to purchase the property but Iron County would need to own it. It would become a Conservation Easement used to "produce" the UPD to increase their numbers.

Alma Adams made a motion to authorize Dale Brinkerhoff, as the Iron County Commission Chair, to sign the letter of intent for the property acquisition agreement of working together with the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources, Utah Department of Natural Resources Endangered Species Mitigation Fund, The Nature Conservancy, and Iron County in the acquisition of real property for the purpose of preserving the UPD habitat. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

2018 PER-DIEM AND TRAVEL REIMBURSEMENT RATES

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, explained that Iron County followed the Utah State Per-Diem and IRS recommendations. The meal reimbursement rates had increased by \$1.00 at \$42.00 per day, and mileage reimbursement rates increased by 1 cent to 54.5 cents per mile.

Michael Bleak made a motion to match the Utah Per-Diem rates and Federal Mileage Reimbursement rate at \$42.00 per day for meal reimbursements and 54.5 cents per mile for mileage reimbursements. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND RENEWAL AGENCY (ICCD&RA)

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the ICCD&RA.

ICCD&RA RESOLUTION 2018-1 DESIGNATING THE PROPOSED FIDDLERS CANYON SOLAR COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT PROJECT AREA, AUTHORIZING THE PREPARATION OF A DRAFT COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT PROJECT AREA PLAN AND BUDGET, AND AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING ALL NECESSARY ACTION BY THE AGENCY, STAFF AND COUNSEL

Jon Whittaker, Iron County Clerk, explained that there were six small projects that were Sun Edison Phase I. Sun Edison recreated the project and three projects were inadvertently omitted. The new owner of the 3 Fiddlers Canyon projects, Terraform Solar, was requesting the creation of Fiddlers Canyon Solar Community Reinvestment Project Area, with the same terms as the SunEdison, Phase I projects, namely a 50% increment for 10 years.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve ICCD&RA Resolution 2018-1 designating the proposed Fiddlers Canyon Solar Community Reinvestment Project Area, authorizing the preparation of a Draft Community Reinvestment Project Area Plan and Budget, and authorizing and directing all necessary action by the agency, staff and counsel. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

IRON COUNTY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND RENEWAL AGENCY RESOLUTION NO. 2018-1

A RESOLUTION DESIGNATING THE PROPOSED FIDDLER'S CANYON SOLAR COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT PROJECT AREA, AUTHORIZING THE PREPARATION OF A DRAFT COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT PROJECT AREA PLAN AND BUDGET, AND AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING ALL NECESSARY ACTION BY THE AGENCY, STAFF, AND COUNSEL.

Whereas, Iron County (the "County"), created the Iron County Community Development and Renewal Agency (the "Agency") and the Agency continues to operate under, Title 17C of the Utah Code, the Limited Purpose Local Government Entities-Community Reinvestment Agency Act (the "Act") for the purposes of conducting urban renewal, economic development, community development, and community reinvestment activities within the County, as contemplated by the Act; and

Whereas, the Agency, having made a preliminary investigation and conducted initial studies and inquiries, desires now to conduct community reinvestment activities in approximately the areas depicted on the map attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by this reference (the "Survey Area"), pursuant to UCA § 17C-5-103; and

Whereas, the Agency desires to begin the process of adopting a project area plan for the Survey Area by adopting this Resolution authorizing the preparation of a draft Project Area Plan and Budget, pursuant to the Act.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE IRON COUNTY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND RENEWAL AGENCY AS FOLLOWS:

- That the Agency finds the Survey Area requires study to determine whether project area development is feasible within one or more proposed community reinvestment project areas within the survey area;
- 2. That the Agency hereby tentatively designates the Survey Area as the Fiddler's Canyon Solar Community Reinvestment Project Area, the approximate proposed boundaries of which are depicted on the map attached hereto as **Exhibit A**;
- 3. That the Agency counsel, Smith Hartvigsen, PLLC, and staff, be and are hereby authorized and directed:
 - a. to prepare a draft Community Reinvestment Project Area Plan for the Survey Area
 - to prepare a draft Community Reinvestment Project Area Budget;
 - conduct any examination, investigation, or negotiation regarding the proposed community reinvestment project area that the Agency considers appropriate
 - d. to undertake all such actions as may be required by the Act, or which may otherwise be necessary or desirable to the successful establishment of the proposed community reinvestment project area, including, without limitation, the negotiation of agreements with taxing entities and participants, the preparation for all necessary

hearings and the preparation, publication, and/or mailing of statutorily required notices; and

That this Resolution shall take effect upon adoption.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Cindy Bulloch, Iron County Assessor, reported that she finished the 2017 year under budget. Cindy reported that scanning had begun but would become a very labor intensive project. Ann Gurr would be retiring soon, and she was hoping to hire someone ahead of her retirement to allow time for training.

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, reported that the Auditor budget ended at 99 percent for 2017. Dan reported that the new Accounts Payable clerk, August Franklin, was working well and was a great addition to the department. He reported that the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) sent a last minute memo stating that Iron County would need to do a 1099 form for each rodeo winner. It would be for 30 plus winners and would have to be done by hand. Dan reported that the new requisition program was downloaded and he would begin with the Iron County Courthouse employees after the move to the courthouse was complete.

Nicole Rosenberg, Iron County Treasurer, reported that collections had increased in 2017. Outstanding taxes were up from January, 2017 by \$708,277.23. Black Iron still owed \$3,299,592.58 in outstanding taxes. Nicole reported that the Public Safety Building had been closed out. Instant Payments were producing a great savings for Iron County. The Iron County Justice Court was now implementing Instant Payments along with the Sheriff's Office, Clerk's Office and the Recorder's Office. The May tax sale would be starting at 259 parcels and hoped to be down to less than 100 parcels by May. Nicole reported that she finished the 2017 year under budget.

Debbie Johnson, Iron County Recorder, reported that the Recorder 2017 budget ended at 98 percent. Debbie reported that the total number of documents recorded in 2017 was 15,214, with 27 Subdivision Plats and 8 Surveys. She expressed gratitude to her office staff for completing the annual copying and scanning of the updated maps in only 15 days. They had replaced the old scanner in the office in the fall of 2017. It was a great addition and was very efficient.

Lester Ross, Maintenance Administrator introduced Jeff McKee and Nate Dennett as new Iron County Maintenance workers.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he visited with Governor Herbert regarding Governor Herbert's 25,000 Job Initiative on January 19, 2018. Danny Stewart reported the requests and needs for Iron County during that meeting. Alma reported that there was a controversy in Brian Head regarding snowmobile trails and roads that were open in the winter that had not been in the past. He and Reed Erickson met with Brett Houser, Brian Head Town Manager, about the possibility of having a snowmobile trail alongside the road and keeping the roads plowed. It would be in a small selected area and not all roads would be plowed. Alma reported that the funding to pay for the Williams' property for planned prairie dog habitat had been held up. He would be contacting the congressional office reminding them that the money had been approved in 2012.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Bryan Dangerfield, Director of Leisure Services for Cedar City Cooperation, reported that Cedar City was chosen as the Host City for the Tour of Utah to be held in August. Cedar City would be the Host for the Start and the Finish of Stage 1. The race would begin on August 7, 2018 and would last a week. Bryan reported that the Switzerland based Haute Route Cycling Series would hold a three day event in Cedar City on September 14th through the 16th. The Haute Route was one of the most prestigious amateur cycling events in the world.

Tom Hale, a resident of Iron County, expressed that the work on the Iron County Courthouse was fantastic.

Jessica Van Woeart, Division of Wildlife Resources (DWR) Biologist, presented for approval of take for 0.5 prairie dogs and 0.46 Acres of habitat for Michele Osborne at 4940 Ashlee Circle, Enoch, Utah, Assessor Parcel Number (APN): A-977-47. A mitigation fee of \$460.00 would be assessed. Jessica presented for approval of take for at least 3 prairie dogs and 0.22 Acres of habitat for Doug Brady at the proposed Iron Willows Subdivision Phase 1 within the SE ¼ Section 32, T35S, R11W, SLB&M, Cedar City. A mitigation fee of \$220.00 would be assessed.

PUBLIC HEARING REGARDING TEMPORARILY LIMITING THE VEHICULAR ACCESS TO KANARRA CANYON ROAD TO ADMINISTRATIVE AND EMERGENCY USE ONLY

Mike Worthen, Iron County Resource Management Plan Director, explained that a proposed resolution was to limit public road access to Kanarra Canyon Road. Utah Code § 72-5-105(3) gives Iron County the authority to temporarily close or limit use to roadways. It would limit to administrative and emergency use only. Mike explained that the resolution was needed to maintain water quality and the Kanarra Falls ecosystem.

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the public hearing regarding temporarily limiting the vehicular access to Kanarra Canyon Road to administrative and emergency use only open. No Comments were offered. Dale Brinkerhoff declared the public hearing closed.

KANARRA CANYON ROAD USE AMENDMENT – TEMPORARY LIMITED USE

Whereas, Iron County, State of Utah, is surrounded by some of the most scenic public lands in southern Utah and one of the most popular locations for citizens and visitor to hike and view is Kanarra Falls, located east of the Town of Kanarraville; and

Whereas, the popularity of Kanarra Falls has become nationally known as visitors from across the nation travel to hike the canyon and view the falls; and

Whereas, the amount hikers visiting Kanarra Falls is over 40,000 per year causing human waste problems in the canyon as there are no restroom facilities beyond the parking lot, and it is feared such waste problems could impact Kanarraville's culinary water source in the canyon; and

Whereas, in an effort to better manage the resources and protect water quality the Town of Kanarra, Iron County, BLM, and SITLA are proposing to limit the number of visitors to the canyon to reduce waiting times at the falls where the largest waste problems occur; and

Whereas, the road (1.13 miles) from Kanarraville Town to the culinary well and spring in Kanarra Canyon is a public road under Utah Code 72-5, and has no limits on travel; and

Whereas, Utah Code 72-5-105-3-ii gives counties authority to temporarily close or limit public access if it is deemed necessary to mitigate or protect public land resources;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, Iron County exercises its authority under Utah Code 72-5-105 to temporarily limit vehicular access to administrative and emergency vehicle use only for maintenance of the culinary water source and facilities, and emergency vehicles as needed.

Whereas, Spring Canyon is located southeast of Kanarraville and is a red rock slot canyon popular for hiking; and

AQUIFER RECHARGE REPORT

Paul Cozzens, a member of the Central Iron County Water Conservancy District (CICWCD) reported on various recharge projects that were implemented in 2017. Paul also mentioned efforts to be able to draw water from West Dessert sources and some of the efficiencies that farmers were able to achieve with improved sprinklers. Some of the money to pay for the new sprinklers came from the State of Utah. Paul expressed determination to reach a sustainable level of water use and aquifer levels.

DISCUSSION AND APPROVAL OF SALE OF REAL PROPERTY TO ENOCH CITY, PARCEL 1, PARCEL 2 AND PARCEL 3.

Rob Dotson, Enoch City Manager, explained that three parcels were obtained by Iron County during the 2014 tax sale. Enoch City was in the process of building a new animal shelter away from public and would need to build a road easement for public use through the middle of the properties. The parcels in question were:

Parcel 1. A 33.00' Wide Road Dedication and Public Utility Easement (P.U.E.) running North and South, being the West 33.00' of the East ½ of the West ½ of the West ½ of Section 1, T35S, R11W, Salt Lake Meridian, running over and across a portion of the following described parcel: LOT 258, Park View Subdivision, Phase 3A; Southwest ¼ of Section 1, T35S, R11W, Salt Lake Meridian.

<u>DISCUSSION AND APPROVAL OF A CONTRACT TO MOVE THE IRON COUNTY</u> <u>COURTHOUSE OFFICES BACK TO PAROWAN</u>

Lester Ross, Iron County Lead Facilities Maintenance, reported that two companies performed a walk through. Slater out of St. George was the only bid returned. The bid estimate cost was \$15,809.00, or 60 cents per pound.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the contract to move the Iron County Courthouse Offices back to Parowan to Slater out of St. George for the estimated cost of \$15,809.00. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

<u>DISCUSSION AND AUTHORIZATION TO PROCEED IN FORMING AN IRON</u> <u>COUNTY AUDIT COMMITTEE, APPOINT COMMITTEE MEMBERS TO SERVE, AND ESTABLISH A MEETING SCHEDULE</u>

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, explained that the Utah State Auditor, John Dougall, was strongly pursuing effective internal control of any governmental entity that receives public funding and to have tighter control from his office. Dan reported that Mr. Dougall was advocating that counties create an Audit Committee. This recommendation did not come from any code or statute, but from the National Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA). The check list from State Auditor in creating an Audit Committee included: 1) Familiarize itself with the benefits and responsibilities of audit committees. The State office recommended following guidance provided by the GFOA; 2) Create an audit committee by ordinance or other official action of the governing body; 3) Draft and adopt an audit committee; 4) Appoint members to the audit committee; 5) Ensure that the audit committee has access to a financial expert who is independent of management; 6) Provide the audit committee with adequate resources; 7) Act upon the audit committee's recommendations and hold the audit committee accountable to perform the duties outlined within its charter. Dan reported that some of the concerns he had were that; the County Auditors were elected officials and perform the same tasks as listed and could possibly cause conflict; Membership would be the governing body and all the meetings would be public and on the county level when the commission meets it would become a dual role and might create conflicts. He explained that counties want to work with the State Auditor's Office but want to make sure that the plan setup was handled correctly. He recommended that he be given time to further investigating the issue before a decision was made,

Michael Bleak made a motion to authorize Dan Jessen to move forward investigate the best way to form an internal audit committee. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Voting: Alma Adams, Nay; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

APPROVE 2018 CONTRACTS WITH UTAH DIVISION OF FORESTRY, FIRE AND STATE LANDS FOR THE WILDLAND FIRE PROGRAM AND LOCAL SUPPORT BUDGET

Dan Jessen explained that one contract was to approve the Iron County support budget for the Fire Warden in the amount of \$69,982. The second contract was the agreement with the Utah Division of Forestry, Fire and State Lands for the Wildland Fire Program in the amount of \$285,927.

Reed Erickson reported that Horrocks Engineers, Inc. out of Pleasant Grove was the only bid returned for the amount of \$29,008 to perform an alignment study for the northern portion of the Cedar Valley belt route. The study would provide 3 possible options for the north part of the Cedar Valley belt route. The work was expected to take about six months. The funds would come from the Corridor Preservation Fund.

Lester noted that Zwick Construction offered to pay half of the settlement amount. Dale Brinkerhoff expressed that the burden should not be Zwick Construction's to bear.

SYNOPSIS

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Those assembled were led in the pledge of allegiance by Paul Cozzens.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by William Pressgrove.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Stephanie Furnival, Iron County Children's Justice Court (CJC) Director, reported there were three new part-time hires in the CJC. Natalie Townsend would be working at Parowan High School; Tori Topham would be working at Canyon View High School and in Beryl valley; Sharla Christie would be working at Kanab Middle School and High School. Primary Children's Nurse Practitioner, Daphne Sullivan moved to Alaska and Amy Blake would be the new Nurse Practitioner. Stephanie thanked the commissioners for approving fiber optic network upgrades. The CJC would now be included on the Iron County Servers. Ground breaking for a new Kane County facility would begin within the next month. Beaver County was progressing well, and Garfield County facilities were planned, but were on hold until the Kane County facility was completed. All construction was complete in the Iron County CJC and was a great improvement.

Scott Garrett, Iron County Attorney, reported that the department ended the 2017 year below budget. In 2017, 499 felony cases were prosecuted, up from 362 in 2016. The increase came largely from the drug task force cases at 147. Justice Reinvestment Initiative (JRI) offenders were opting to serve jail time because it was easier than going through drug court. Scott reported that there were more repeat offenders which was concerning. The original purpose of the JRI was to treat addiction and not lessen the punishment for violent offenders in drug court. Other areas that had an increase were domestic violence, felony drug, fraud, theft, property crimes, physical child abuse, and felony assault. He reported that many counties were looking into litigation regarding the opioid epidemic. Blake Hamilton, from Durham Jones & Pinegar in Salt Lake, would like to meet with Iron County to discuss representing Iron County in any future class action law suits regarding the opioid epidemic. Scott stated that the State Juvenile Justice System anticipated cutting their budget by \$14 million, and the Southwest Utah Youth Center in Cedar City might be subject to closure.

Lori Eichelberger, Iron County Justice Court Administrator, reported that the Justice Court came under budget in 2017. Implementation of Instant Payments had cut call volumes by 20 percent. Two Kiosks had been installed in the lobby allowing defendants to make payments directly. Lori noted efforts were ongoing to make the web site more user friendly. All forms were available on line for defendants to fill out. She reported that the Public Defender was under budget for the 2017 year. There had been savings of \$59,735 from year 2016. Public defender contracts were up to date. Case tracking had been in place for one year and she could now compare Public Defender expenditures. Alma Adams expressed that he was appreciative with the efficiency of the work that Lori had done and continued to do.

Paul Monroe, CICWCD Director, reported that they had been working with Senator Vickers and Representative Westwood for funding of low-hanging bubbler irrigators for use on center pivots. These irrigation improvements might possibly reduce agricultural usage by 20 percent. Paul noted that he was concerned with HB175, which was in Committee. He expressed that the law would curtail the duties of County Auditor. Four new bills would help with water rights. Paul reported that the CICWCD was under budget for 2017. In March there were many conferences that they would attend and they sponsor the 4th Grade water fair. The focus for 2018 was to continue to be active with recharge projects, agricultural efficiency conservation, Ground Water Management committee, importing water, and the Utah's Watershed Restoration Initiative.

Paul Cozzens explained that there would be an airport reconstruction project that would require Cedar City to provide 94 thousand tons of gravel. Kit Wareham had designed a plan to excavate gravel resulting in a 5 acre pit. The Cedar City Airport was not comfortable with water by the airport because bodies of water attract birds.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that the Utah Association of Counties (UAC) legislative committee was working well keeping the commissioners informed of legislative happenings. Alma reported that Governor Herbert featured a

business from each county that was making an impact. Genpak from Iron County was featured and received an award. Alma explained that money had been appropriated for land purchase for prairie dogs. The property had been presented to become Prairie Dog habitat and money appropriated for that had been delayed. Alma reported that he met with Horrocks engineers regarding a study of corridor acquisition for the Northern belt Route from Hwy 56 around the north end of the valley to the Summit Interchange. He attended a special meeting with Representative Rob Bishop, Lieutenant Governor, Spencer Cox, and county commissioners from Utah and surrounding states. Secretary Zinke would like managing public lands by Watershed rather by State. Alma reported that Natalie Gochnour at the Legislature stated that Iron County was one of the best counties in economic activity and economic condition and, but also held the dubious distinction of being one of four counties that had more opioid prescriptions than people.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he had participated in a sight visit to Kanarra Falls to look at areas to place signs and toilets. Iron County was partnered with Kanarraville, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), and Schools & Institutional Trust Lands Administration (SITLA) to initiate a fee to help preserve the watershed and lesson parking and traffic concerns. Michael noted that he met with Kanarraville Town and was presented with a packet that included questions and answers addressing the Kanarra Falls issue. The packet showed that residents were 100 percent in favor of the new project. They can now move forward with support from the town. The fees would be implemented by the first of April. Michael explained that the National Association of Counties Organization (NACo) Creative Placemaking Challenge was a highly competitive grant program sponsored by NACo. Iron County was one of only 7 counties nationwide to be accepted into the program to be able to attend training and to be eligible for grants. The grants are for the Arts in conjunction with Economic Development. Iron County had partnered with Cedar City and private citizens interested in the arts and economic development. The first stage would be a training held in Des Moines, Iowa that was required to move forward in the program.

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commissioner, reported that there was another bill in the Utah legislature that would facilitate changing the form of county government. The bill would make it easier to change from a 3 member county commission to a five member council. At the time there were only five counties in Utah with a five member council.

PUBLIC HEARING FOR PROPOSED PARTIAL EASEMENT VACATION & AMENDED PLAT OF MONARCH MEADOWS SUBDIVISION, PHASE 1, FINAL PLAT

Reed Erickson, Iron County Planner, explained that the easement vacation and amended plat of Monarch Meadows Subdivision would affect Lots 3,4,9,10,21,22,28, 29,35,36,43,44,58 and 59. Located within Section 21, T35S, R11W, SLB&M. The purpose was to narrow some existing access and drainage easements from 20 feet to 10 feet. All property owners had been notified of the hearing and all easement requests had been signed by property owners adjacent to the easements. Reed explained that the Home Owner Association was in control of the easements and they were petitioning the change.

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commission Chair, declared a hearing for the proposed partial easement vacation & amended plat of Monarch Meadow Subdivision, Phase 1 open.

Bill Pressgrove, a Citizen of Iron County, asked if the open space shown on the map was public. Reed explained that the open space was owned by members of the HOA and not public.

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the public hearing closed.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the partial easement vacation & amended plat of Monarch Meadows Subdivision, Phase 1, Final Plat, affecting Lots 3, 4, 9, 10, 21,

22, 28, 29, 35, 36, 43, 44, 58 and 59. Located within Section 21, T35S, R11W, SLB&M. The purpose was to narrow some existing access and drainage easements at various locations from 20 feet to 10 feet. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PUBLIC HEARING FOR ZONING OR PROPERTY DE-ANNEXED FROM CEDAR CITY

Reed Erickson explained Lots 1-7 and Lot 9, West Valley Subdivision, had been annexed into Cedar City, but were subsequently de-annexed from Cedar City, and therefore needed to be assigned a county zone. There had been building permit requests but zoning was not set by Iron County. The previous zoning was R-2 and the recommendation from the Planning Commission was to change the zone to R-5, due to lot size, frontage, and setbacks. He noted that the residents were in favor of the zone change to R-5.

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the public hearing for Zoning or property de-annexed from Cedar City, open. No comments were offered. Dale Brinkerhoff declared the public hearing closed.

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve the zoning of property de-annexed from Cedar City as presented by Reed Erickson. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Thomas Hale, a citizen of Iron County, expressed that he continued to be concerned with the lack of road maintenance in the Hidden Valley Ranchos Subdivision. Mr. Hale noted that the local well failed and that the CICWCD installed new pipes and received encroachments, but did not bring the roads back up to Iron County standards after excavating the road. He stated the residents were requesting that the potholes be taken care of.

PRAIRIE DOG TAKE APPROVAL REQUEST

Jessica Van Woeart, Division of Wildlife Resource Biologist, presented a request for prairie dog take at 4544 Prospector Ln, Enoch, Utah, APN: A-974-62 for Nathan Janes. Based on the survey, as well as estimated spring UPD productivity, estimated take for development of the property would be at least 1.6 prairie dogs and 0.42 acres of habitat, with a cost of \$420.00. Ms. Van Woeart also presented for approval a request for prairie dog take at 4258 Prospector Ln., Enoch, Utah, APN: A-974-61 for Nathan Janes. Based on the survey, as well as estimated spring UPD productivity, estimated take for development of the property would be at least would be 1.6 prairie dogs and 0.42 acres of habitat with a cost of \$420.00. Jessica presented a request for prairie dog take at the proposed Enoch Animal Shelter Road and Public Utility Easement (PUE) for Enoch City. Based on the survey, as well as estimated spring UPD productivity, estimated take for development of the property would be at least would be 0.6 prairie dogs and 0.43 acres of habitat with a cost of \$430.00.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the UPD take requests as presented by Jessica Van Woeart. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CONSIDER FUNDING REQUEST FROM THE OFFICE OF CEDAR CITY, IRON COUNTY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Danny Stewart, Iron County Economic Development, reported that Iron County was one of only seven Counties in the Nation to be selected for the NACo Creative Counties Placemaking Challenge Program Training in Des Moines, Iowa. Danny explained the total cost for the training was \$10,000 and he requested funding from Iron County in the amount of \$4,800 to cover the travel and lodging for the committee to

attend the training. The total request would be reimbursed by NACo. Cedar City would be contributing \$5,179.50.

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve the funding for the NACo training to be held in Des Moines, Iowa in the amount of \$4,800.00, recognizing that the amount would be reimbursed by NACo. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

APPROVAL OF ORDINANCE 2018-1 GRANTING GARKANE ENERGY COOPERATIVE, INC.

Jon Whittaker explained that an existing non-exclusive franchise contract was signed in 1965 for 50 years. The contract had expired and was due for renewal.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve Ordinance 2018-1 Granting Garkane Energy Cooperative, Incorporated, its successors and assigns an electric light, heat and power franchise in a non-exclusive contract in Iron County for 50 years. Second by Michael Bleak, Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

IRON COUNTY ORDINANCE 2018-1

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO GARKANE ENERGY COOPERATIVE, INCORPORATED, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, AN ELECTRIC LIGHT, HEAT AND POWER FRANCHISE.

Whereas, Iron County Ordinance 40 dated August 9, 1965 granted to Garkane Power Assoc. a fifty (50) year electric light, heat and power franchise; and

Whereas, Iron County desires to continue granting said franchise;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE IRON COUNTY COMMISSION AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1

That there is hereby granted and renewed to Garkane Energy Cooperative, Incorporated, its successors and assigns (herein called the Grantee), the full and complete authority, right, privilege and franchise, for fifty (50) years from the date hereon, to construct, operate, and maintain electric power lines and facilities together with all the necessary and desirable appurtenances (including but not necessarily limited to underground conduits, poles, towers, and wires as well as telephone wires and other compatible communications equipment and facilities), for the transmission and distribution in and through said County of Iron of electricity to present and future residents and inhabitants thereof and all other persons and corporations desirous of using the same, along, in, upon and across the present and future roads, highways, and public places of said Iron County, Utah.

SECTION II

Poles and towers shall be so erected as to interfere as little as is reasonably possible with traffic over said roads and highways. The location of all poles, towers, and appurtenances shall be fixed under the supervision of the Board of County Commissioners of Iron County, Utah, but not so as to unreasonably interfere with the proper operation of said lines.

SECTION III

All lines constructed under this grant shall be constructed in accordance with established practices with respect to electrical construction.

SECTION IV

Iron County, Utah, shall in no way be liable or responsible for any accident or damage that may occur in the construction, operation, or maintenance by the Grantee of its lines and appurtenances hereunder, and the acceptance of this franchise shall be deemed an agreement on the part of said Grantee, its successors and assigns, to indemnify said County and hold it harmless against any and all liability, loss, cost, damage, or expense which may accrue to said County by reason of the neglect, default, or misconduct of the Grantee in the construction, operation, or maintenance of its lines and appurtenances hereunder.

SECTION V

The Grantee shall file its written acceptance of this franchise with the Clerk of the Board of Commissioners within thirty (30) days after its passage.

SECTION VI

Anything herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding this grant shall be in all respects a non-exclusive grant to said Grantee, Garkane Energy Cooperative Incorporated, and the Grantor, Iron County, Utah, shall not be obligated to provide to the Grantee any easements, rights of way or otherwise in connection with the authority herein contained and set forth.

POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT ON BEHALF OF IRON COUNTY, A MEMBER OF THE RURAL PUBLIC LANDS COUNTY COUNCIL 2018.

Alma Adams explained that this item had been handled during budget talks, and the agreed upon salary was for \$7,500.00 per year to be paid in quarterly payments. Bob Weidner was a lobbyist on behalf of Iron County and Public Lands.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the memorandum of agreement on behalf of Iron County with the condition that Bob Weidner change the invoice to reflect the agreed upon amount of \$7,500.00 per year to be paid in quarterly payments. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION ON CLASS D ROADS CROSSING SITLA LANDS

Ron Torgerson, Richfield SITLA Office, explained that the last meeting with Iron County SITLA issued easements for anything 66' wide easements for all class B roads across SITLA lands. Ron reported that SITLA was offing the same for the Class D roads: the use of agency funds from the Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) fund with a \$1.50 surcharge. There had to be an exchange of funds on the easements because of the way the agency was set up. The set up was exclusive to the agency and the easements need to be purchased through the OHV funds and not though Iron County. Nancy Strickland, Salt Lake SITLA Office, explained that the pre and post SITLA lands were determined by aerial photography and survey maps. Ron proposed to continue with the process that was used for the Class B roads. No action was taken.

APPROVAL OF CONTRACT FOR SALE AND PURCHASE OF NATURAL GAS WITH SUMMIT ENERGY, LLC

Alma Adams explained that Summit Energy, LLC had presented a contract last year stating that they would be less expensive than Dominion Gas. The only county building that would benefit would be the Jail Facility. Iron County had just completed an upgrade of the boiler in the jail and the decision was made to wait a year to see how much the usage would be with the new boiler. After comparing the costs, the estimated savings with Summit Energy, LLC would be \$11,500.00 per year.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the contract for purchase of natural gas from Summit Energy, LLC., for 12 months, renewable year to year, with a 60 day notice of termination by either party, to be supplied to the Iron County Jail for an estimated savings of \$11,500.00 per year. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT & RENEWAL AGENCY (ICCD&RA)

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the ICCD&RA.

CONSIDERATION OF TAX INCREMENT TO BE PAID ON THE RED HILLS RENEWABLE SOLAR PROJECT

Danny Stewart explained that a reimbursement request form was set up for Red Hills Renewables Solar to meet certain bench marks: 1. Develop the facilities; 2. Pay any fees; 3. Pay all taxes that are due; 4. Be compliant with the conditional use permit; 5. The request would need to be made before April 1st each year. Danny reported preparing reimbursement request forms for each of the active solar projects in Iron County. The forms were sent out and the first request of the year was from Red Hills. He stated that Red Hills had met all the bench marks. Dan Jessen explained that Red Hills paid over \$1 million in property taxes in 2017. Personnel & Real property taxes to be returned to Red Hills Solar were \$742,822.63 which included all of 2017 and a portion from 2016 that

was additional from an audit in the amount of \$20,624.37. Danny Stewart noted that there were 5-6 projects that still were awaiting reimbursement requests.

Michael Bleak made a motion to authorize the tax increment to be paid to the Red Hills Renewal Solar Project in the total amount of \$742,822.63. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

RECONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY COMMISSION

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the adjournment of the Iron County ICCD&RA and the reconvening of the Iron County Commission.

PERSONNEL

Adrion Walker, Iron County Human Resource (HR) Director, presented Luigi Almont from corrections to Patrol Deputy in the Sheriff Department for approval, effective February 11. In Corrections, Adrion Walker presented the new hire of Bryan Aguayo as Corrections Deputy for approval, effective February 25. This would be a backfill of a vacant positon. Also, the new hire Zackkary Coons as a Correction Deputy for approval, effective February 25. This would be an approved emergency hire due to a military deployment. Finally, Adrion Walker presented the new hire of Anna Teeples as Interim Corporal for approval to fill the spot left by Jarod Hansen who is on military deployment. Michael Bleak made a motion to approve the changes as presented. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Adrion Walker presented the promotion of Tara C. Bird Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) Deputy Assessor to DMV Supervisor in the Cedar City Office for approval, effective January 28. This would be a backfill promotion. Adrion also presented a change in status from part time to full time DMV Technician for Latonya Heaton in the Cedar City Office for approval, effective January 28. This would be a backfill position left by Tara Bird. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the proposed changes in the Assessor's Office as presented. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Adrion Walker presented for approval a revision to Iron County "Employee Retirement" policy (Section 21). He explained the requested update to the policy was the result of a recent in office audit conducted in the HR office by the Utah Retirement Systems (URS). Per the URS, the policy needed additional information regarding retirement eligibility and exemption procedures.

Michael Bleak, made a motion to approve the update/revised Iron County "Employee Retirement" policy (Section 21), per URS requirement of additional information regarding retirement eligibility and exemption procedures. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

NON-DELEGATED ITEMS

No Non-Delegated items were discussed.

An invocation was offered by Danny Stewart.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Those assembled were led in the pledge of allegiance by John Higley.

APPOINTMENT OF IRON COUNTY COMMISSION CHAIR

Alma Adams made a motion to appoint Commissioner Michael Bleak as the 2018 Iron County Commission Chair. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Jon Whittaker, Iron County Clerk, reported that the 2017 budget ended well at 94 percent for Clerk and 85 percent for Elections. Jon reported that the Count My Vote signature gathering had begun. As of February 26, 2018 there were 4 declarations of intent to gather signatures for Iron County Sheriff, 4 for Iron County Attorney, 1 for Iron County Auditor, 1 for Iron County Clerk, 2 for Commission Seat A, 3 for Commission Seat B, 1 for State House 72, 1 for State House 71 and 1 for State Senate. The filing period would be March 9-15. He reported that marriage license applications continued to increase. In 2016 there had been 443 applications, 472 in 2017 and 41 thus far in 2018. Passport fees were \$3,240 in 2016, \$20,732 in 2017, and were currently at \$4,418 for 2018. Jon explained that the large increase in 2017 was largely due to the Post Office referring customers to the Clerk's Office after the temporary move to Cedar City. Jon reported that the Legislature was considering an Appropriations Bill which included \$4 million for new voting equipment.

Adrion Walker, Iron County Human Resource (HR) Director, reported that the 2017 budget had a minor surplus of less than 5 percent. The 2018 budget was on track. Adrion reported that he met with Johnnie Miller with the Utah Counties Indemnity Pool (UCIP) and had asked him to come to Iron County to conduct a department supervisor training. Betsy Cummings was working to become Society for Human Resource Management certified. He reported that the Iron County Employee turnover ratio from 2011-2017 was trending positive. The Iron County employee turnover ratio was at 10.73 in 2017. He was working on a ratio break down number for each Iron County department. March would be the launch of the first activity for the Iron County Healthy Living Wellness Program for Iron County employees called "activity bingo." Adrion noted that they were working on policy revisions that need to be brought up to date.

John Higley, Iron County Emergency Management Coordinator, reported that budget expenditure was at 8 percent as of Feb. 26, 2018. They were currently holding a Community Emergency Response Team training course at Southern Utah University. The class began February 23, 2018 with 31 students enrolled. The course would conclude with a disaster exercise on March 3, 2018. John reported that the Surviving Nuclear Terrorism workshop was held February 15, 2018 with 32 attending. The Local Emergency Planning Committee Table Top Exercise was scheduled for April 18, 2018 at the Heritage Center in Cedar City. He reported that the 2018 review of the Iron County Emergency Operations Plan was in the final stages and would be presented to the Iron County Commission in March for approval. The Storm Spotter workshop would be held on April 19, 2018. He concluded by reporting that the Great Utah Shakeout would be held on April 19, 2018.

Danny Stewart, Iron County Economic Development Director, reported that the Governors 25K Job Initiative was held in Governor Herbert's office on January 19, 2018. The discussion with Governor Herbert included: 1. The current economic state of Iron County. He reported that compared to other counties Iron County was in good shape; 2. Challenges; 3. Greatest opportunities; 3. Future vision and 4. How the State could help the counties. Businesses felt the implementation of recycling was difficult and was in need of local training. Danny reported on some follow-up on the help that was requested. He met with Nan Anderson, Governor's Office of Economic Development (GOED) of Rural Development (GRD), and discussed the need for clear, concise information on GOED ORD programs and looking at what had been don for film incentives with their one-page description of programs. The programs provided by GOED ORD needed to be easily understood by businesses in order to apply. The Rural Fast Track works well in the qualified areas in Iron County, and that the Rural Jobs program could work very well for Iron County businesses. He reported that he talked with Beckie Page and Chanel Flores at GOED. Iron County conducted their presentation on January 19, 2018 and one of the top priorities was connecting with the Tech Industry and those

companies that belong to Silicon Slopes, in order to align their goals and objectives for developing and growing the industry in the southern part of the state. A meeting was scheduled for March 27, 2018 at Silicon Slopes in Lehi, Utah. Danny reported that he met with Theresa Foxley and Max Backlund of EDCUtah to begin the process of creating a standardized local incentive matrix for Iron County. He had been working with Malcolm Nash of Sevier County and other rural Economic Development (ED) directors in discussions with UAC board members and administrative staff. Informal approval had been given to create within UAC an economic development group. The advantages with this include the following: a formal association for county economic development professionals; a mechanism for this group to meet, receive training, network, and communicate; a central voice for our interests when legislation was considered and/or policy issues were made at the state level. Danny reported that the Utah Rural Jobs Act enables an eligible small business located in a rural county to expand and create high wage jobs by providing flexible and affordable capital to small businesses in these areas. Eligible small businesses might receive up to \$5,000,000 in capital for business development and expansion needs. He reported that one of the projects being conducted for business recruitment was the Utah Megasites designation on the Iron Springs industrial site. There were two potential new companies locating to Iron County: a global manufacturing company headquartered in the Great Lakes area of the US and an aerospace company that was interested in property near the Cedar City Regional Airport.

Michael Bleak asked Jennie Hendricks to report on the GOP Bylaw that was passed. Jennie Hendricks, State Delegate for the Republican Party, reported that there was a special central committee meeting in regard to a GOP Bylaw that would go into effect in 2019. Jennie noted that 72 out of the 180 members were in attendance and the Bylaw was passed by 2 votes. The Bylaw created an "Anticipated Time-line of Events" that reads "January 2nd the Declaration Period of Intent to gather signatures, March 9-15th the Candidate filing period. Candidates who already declared the intent to gather signatures must withdraw their intent, in writing, to the party and to the state by March 15th or they will be in violation of the new bylaw and would be subject to membership forfeiture in the Republican Party. Members who fail to sign or honor their Candidate Certification Agreement forfeit membership and the end of the period. The Bylaw for the 2018 Election cycle would only affect Congressional House District 1 and 2 because no one had filed for signatures."

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Thomas Hale, a citizen of Iron County, stated that he was still concerned with the lack of road maintenance in the Hidden Valley Ranchos Subdivision. Thomas reported that he had talked to Paul Cozzens from the Central Iron County Water Conservancy District (CICWCD) and he would be meeting with him concerning the roads. He stated that CICWCD, not Iron County, was responsible to bring the roads back up to Iron County standards.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the February 12, 2018 minutes of the Iron County Commission meeting. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PRAIRIE DOG TAKE APPROVAL REQUEST

Jessica VanWoeart, Division of Wildlife Resource Biologist, presented a prairie dog take request from Adam Lake. The take was for development for property located at Iron Mountain Subdivision, Phases 1, 2 & 5, Lots 31, 32 and 33. Based upon the survey, as well as estimated spring UPD productivity, estimated take for Lot 31 would be at least 1.7 prairie dogs and 0.45 acres of habitat for a cost of \$450 mitigation fee; estimated take for Lot 32 would be at least 1.8 prairie dogs and 0.46 acres of habitat for a cost of \$460 mitigation fee; estimated take for Lot 33 would be at least 1.8 prairie dogs and 0.46 acres of habitat for a cost of \$460 mitigation fee.

Jessica presented a prairie dog take request from Mark Meisner, Mark 1 Dev. LLC. The take was for development for property located at Lot 24 Sycamore Trails Subdivision, Utah. Based upon

the survey, estimated take would be at least 1 prairie dog and 0.22 acres of habitat for the cost of \$220.00 mitigation fee.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Those assembled were led in the pledge of allegiance by Sheriff Mark Gower.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Paul Cozzens.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the minutes of the February 26, 2018 Iron County Commission Meeting. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Maria Twitchell, Executive Director of the Cedar City/Brian Head Tourism Bureau, reported that the Transient Room Tax (TRT) budget was at 15 percent which was slightly down due to the Brian Head fire. Restaurant tax was slightly higher at 25 percent. Maria reported that occupancy numbers were up 9 percent the weeks of the Cedar City Temple open house and state championships that were held in Cedar City. Restaurants were the winners with a 21 percent increase in sales. She reported that she had submitted two grant applications with the Utah Office of Tourism and were awarded \$137,625 for winter marketing and \$43,230 for a summer campaign. This was a matching grant with a total of \$419,085. With the recent snowfall, Brian Head reported that they were exceeding daily budget numbers. Maria reported that a permit system implementation for Kanarra Falls was in progress with the goal to be up and running by April 1st. She reported that based on a recommendation from secret shopper Roger Brooks, she would be creating a "Wayfinding System" of signs for visitors to Iron County. Due to most roads being Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) administered, the signs would have to be approved by them. Maria reported that public walk-ins were down at the Cedar City Visitors Center. International requests regarding tourism were lower, but in state requests were increasing. Maria reported that the Outdoor Recreation Department was at 28 percent of the budget. She had received \$10,000 from the Iron County Restaurant Board for improvements at Woods Ranch to replace picnic tables and to purchase AR shooting targets for the Shooting Range. Three Peaks would be hosting the Classic Bike Race in May, Utah Summer Games (USG) Moto Trials in June, USG Shooting Trials at the Shooting Range in June, USG Disc Golf, Half Marathon at Woods Ranch in September, High School Rodeo Team Shootout at the Shooting Range in September, Tactical Shoot at the Shooting Range in October and The High School Mountain Bike Southern Utah Race at Three Peaks in October. Maria reported that the Water system at Three Peaks would be turned on in time for Easter Break.

Mark Gower, Iron County Sheriff, reported that the Sheriff budget was on track. Mark reported the he was currently working with the Iron County Auditor in exploring the feasibility of leasing the Patrol vehicles instead of direct acquisition. The Investigation Detectives continued to work hard following up in several felony cases with an average of 18 active cases each. He reported that the Iron County Sheriff Office had pulled about 650 cases as of date. Deputy Johnson would be deployed in May for a minimum of a one year tour with his National Guard Unit. Deputy Winder deployed in January 2018 with his National Guard Unit for a one year tour. Sheriff Gower reported that he continued to insure that Iron County Deputies were meeting all training standards. Sex Offenses, Property Crimes and Drug Crimes continued to be the majority of incidents that they investigate and arrest on. Incidents of opiate addictions and related overdoses in Iron County were concerning and they continued to work with local and federal partners in finding solutions that would mitigate this serious problem in the community. He

reported on the successful rescue of a missing six year old boy in Iron County recently. Sheriff Gower explained that the boy wondered off from his parents and grandparents while shed (antler) hunting. Assistance came from SUU aviation and a state helicopter with infrared equipped cameras. The K-9 Unit was impressive and tracked for 8 miles straight to the boy. He was found around 2 a.m. curled up under a bush. The boy stated that, "the Helicopter kept waking me up and I was trying to sleep."

Joanna Cuthers, Iron County Corrections, reported the Corrections budget was at 16.8 percent. The current inmate population was at 134 Iron County with 10 from the state. Joanna reported that she was awaiting background/psychiatric clearance for a new deputy.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he and Commissioner Brinkerhoff attended a tour of the Dixie Regional Center in St. George. He reported that he was impressed with a new inter-catheter valve replacement. The average age for the procedure was 82 years old and there had been 55 procedures performed without any problems. Alma reported that he had met with local leaders regarding an "Envision Utah" plan for Iron County.

<u>Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commissioner</u>, reported that he would like to meet with Chad Nay about the cabins that were lost in the Brian Head fires regarding a fee waiver for reconstruction to be built on the existing property.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he attended the National Association of Counties (NACo) legislative conference in Washington DC. As a member of the Justice and Public Safety Committee, he sat in on in depth discussions regarding the national opioid epidemic, and recreational and medical marijuana legalization. Mike reported that the Public Safety Committee was able to offer input for Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) funds being available for counties. He reported that he was able to attend a meeting with the Assistant Attorney General regarding Department of Justice (DOJ) funding. The Iron County Children's Justice Center (CJC) received the majority of their funding from the DOJ. Mike reported that he was able to describe the operations of the Iron County CJC including the Mental Health packet and component. They were amazed with what Iron County was able to do on the limited amount of money that Iron County received. He reported that the AG was considering using the Iron County program as a national pilot program.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Paul Cozzens, Central Iron County Water Conservancy District (CICWCD) member, reported that the annual water fair for 4th Graders would be held at the Heritage Center March 12-13, 2018. Paul reported that he and Paul Monroe attended the Legislature and presented before the Natural Resources Committee. They requested a \$200,000 grant to help agriculture purchase more efficient nozzles for pivots.

Thomas Hale, citizen of Iron County, requested help for access to application encroachment permits in the archives. Thomas explained that he had met with the former president of the Angus Water District who was listed on the permit. He said he would like to find out who took the permit out. Cindy Bulloch suggested Thomas look on the State Water Engineer website archive.

PRAIRIE DOG TAKE APPROVAL REQUEST

Adam Kavalunas, Division of Wildlife, presented a prairie dog take request from Joseph Adams. The take was for property located at Hunter Glenn Subdivision, Lot 74, APN: B-1868-74. Based upon the survey, as well as estimated spring prairie dog productivity, estimated take for development of these properties would be at least 0.6 prairie dogs and 0.25 acres of habitat for a cost of \$250.00 mitigation fee. Adam Kavalunas then presented a prairie dog take request from Brock Holyoak. The take was for property at Iron Mountain Subdivision, Lot 24, Phases 1, 2, & 5, APN: A-974-24. Based upon the survey, as well as estimated spring productivity, estimated take for

development of these properties would be at least 1.6 prairie dogs and 0.41 acres of habitat for a cost of \$410.00 mitigation fee. Finally, Adam Kavalunas presented a prairie dog take request from Bret Williams. The take was for APN: B-1-9-10, at the Fields Town Homes, Phase 2, located in the NE ¼, SEC. 3, T36S, R11W, SLB&M. Based upon the survey, as well as estimated spring UPD productivity, estimated take for development of these properties would be at least 8.5 prairie dogs and 2.66 acres of habitat for a cost of \$2,660.00 mitigation fee.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the prairie dog take requests as presented. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF THE DRAFT IMPLEMENTING AGREEMENT OF A GENERAL CONSERVATION PLAN (GCP) FOR THE UTAH PRAIRIE DOG FOR DEVELOPMENT IN IRON COUNTY. ALSO POSSIBLE APPROVAL FOR COMMISSION CHAIR TO SIGN ASSOCIATED DOCUMENTS AS THEY ARE PREPARED

Reed Erickson, Iron County Planner, reported that this was the first GCP document to be signed by Iron County to participate in the GCP. Reed explained that he had met with Lora Roman and Kate Novak, from the US Department of Fish and Wildlife, who were issuing the permits with an April 1 approval. The Draft Implementing Plan would need to be signed to move forward with the GCP. There would be other documents that would follow and those would be able to be implemented immediately. He explained that approval for the Iron County Commission Chair to sign associated documents as they were prepared would alleviate the need to come back before the commission with each document for approval.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the draft implementing agreement of a GCP for the Utah Prairie Dog for development in Iron County and to approve the Iron County Commission Chair to sign associated documents as they are prepared. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF LEASE AGREEMENT WITH THE STATE OF UTAH SCHOOL AND INSTITUTIONAL TRUST LANDS ADMINISTRATION (SITLA)

Mike Worthen, Iron County Resource Management Plan Director, explained that this lease agreement with SITLA was for 636.76 acres around Kanarra Falls. Said lease was within Sec. 36, T37S, R12W, SLB&M. Mike reported that the Iron County Commission approved to lease the land to help ease the problems associated with tourism at Kanarra Falls. The annual lease payment of \$1,000.00 would be paid by Kanarraville Town. He explained that the Iron County Commission needed to be the lessor because Iron County had the authority to limit the use of the roads and Kanarraville Town did not.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the lease agreement with SITLA for 636.76 acres around Kanarraville Falls in Sec. 36, T37S, R12W, SLB&M, but later rescinded the motion. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

**Due to Commissioner Adams' rescission later in the meeting, no action was taken on this item. **

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF REMODELING THE GYM AREA OF THE JAIL TO INCREASE INMATE BEDS

Mike Gibbs explained that the jail was running out of room for inmates. He noted that the gym currently had one bathroom and one closet that could be converted to shower. Mike estimated that said conversion would provide a maximum capacity of 40 additional inmates. He had received an estimate for plumbing of \$60,000. Mike estimated that the whole project would cost about \$130,000. He expressed that the need was getting

acute, with a serious influx of female inmates. Mike also explained that at least one new officer would be needed at night to manage the additional beds. Dale Brinkerhoff expressed a need for Iron County to build a new facility. Dale noted that this remodel would provide time for a new facility to be built. He expressed that Iron Count could break dirt on new facility in five years.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve up to \$130,000 for the remodeling of the gym area of the jail to increase inmate beds. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

RESOLUTION 2018-3 APPROVING THE SEVENTH INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT WITH THE UTAH COUNTIES INDEMNITY POOL (UCIP) COOPERATION AGREEMENT

Jon Whittaker explained that the seventh interlocal agreement was an ongoing resolution with UCIP for Iron County to continue membership in UCIP. Jon noted that UCIP was great to work with, and that they updated the requisite Interlocal Agreement periodically. (See next item for combined motion and vote)

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF THE SEVENTH INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT WITH THE UTAH COUNTIES INDEMNITY POOL (UCIP) COOPERATION AGREEMENT

Alma Adams made a motion to approve Resolution 2018-3, also the Seventh Interlocal Agreement with the Utah Counties Indemnity Pool Cooperation Agreement. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

RATIFICATION OF A 2014 APPROVAL TO PURCHASE A MINE RESISTANT AMBUSH PROTECTED (MRAP) VEHICLE

Sheriff Gower explained that this agenda item was to ratify the use of seized drug money to purchase an MRAP vehicle in 2014. He explained that the paperwork had been signed by Commissioner Brinkerhoff, but that the expense had not been brought before the Iron County Commission. Sheriff Gower noted that seized drug monies could be used to purchase certain equipment as long as it is cleared through the Utah Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice (CCJJ).

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the 2014 purchase of the MRAP using seized drug money as explained. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PRESENTING A PROPOSAL LEASE GROUND SPACE TO CONSTRUCT A WIRELESS COMMUNICATION FACILITY AT THE NEW CASTLE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Mark Yahne, representing InTeliSites, explained that they were seeking to build a new tower to accommodate four carriers at the New Castle Fire property. Mark reported that there were currently three towers located in Iron County and five more scheduled to be built in Cedar City. He reported that there was poor cellular service in New Castle and they had requested a tower be installed. The New Castle Fire Chief had agreed to lease property behind the fire building. The proposed tower would be a 150ft. lattice tower, which would be wind rated for the area. Lieutenant Del Schlosser expressed that the improved cell coverage would help the Sheriff's Department with improved communications and data. Mark Yahne noted that this presentation only to see if there was interest from Iron County. He explained that the lease offer was \$800 payment plus an additional \$200 per carrier, with an annual increase of 2%. The commissioners asked

that the contract be given to Deputy Attorney Michael Edwards for review and to be brought back during the next meeting for approval.

Christene Lowder, presented requests for tax exemption during the 2018 tax year. Christene noted that applicants must apply by March 1 of each year. She and the commissioners discussed the requests that were submitted. Notably, 2 requests were postponed, 1) The Cedar City BPOE, Elks Lodge had not submitted their request and had been sent a certified letter; and 2) The International Church of the 4 Square had requested an exemption for raw land, and the Assessor's Office was going to investigate first.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve new requests for exemption for: the Cedar City Housing Authority, Assessor's Parcel Number (APN): B-931; The Children's Discovery Learning Center, a 2005 Chevrolet Express Bus; The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, APN: B-1580-4, a 2013 Chevrolet Equinox, and a 2017 Chevrolet Silverado; The Dixie and Anne Leavitt Foundation, APN's: B-1018-6, B-1018-8, B-1018-11, B-1018-13, B-1018-13-1 and B-1018-14. Also to approve the other updates to the list of exemptions as presented by Christene Lowder. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION REGARDING AMENDMENTS TO THE IRON COUNTY PURCHASING POLICY

Mike Edwards, explained that the old policy needed to be updated to meet current state code. Changes were made by the auditor office regarding purchasing. Mike noted that for small purchases, the amount was changed from \$1,000 to \$2,000 as the limit for Elected Officials and Department Heads to simply use their best judgement and seek the best value for the county. Purchases ranging from \$2,000 to \$15,000 were to require 3 price quotes before purchase. Above \$15,000 would require Formal Competitive Bidding. Notably, there were provisions to allow preference to local providers. Part of the revised policy would be the changed interaction with the Auditor's Office and newly implemented purchasing software. The updates were intended to improve compliance to the Iron County purchasing policy, and provide greater transparency to the taxpayers. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to amended Iron County Purchasing Policy as presented. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF SECURITY CAMERAS FOR THE COURTHOUSE

Lester Ross presented a request to purchase security cameras and a DVR recording system with 10 external and 11 internal cameras, the bid was \$20,664.29. Dale Brinkerhoff asked that this item be discussed concurrently with the next item being approval of election room remodel. Dale expressed concern that lingering expenses from the courthouse remodel be resolved before incurring an expense for cameras.

A combined motion was combined with the next item (Election Room.)

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF REPAIR AND REMODEL OF THE ELECTION ROOM IN THE BASEMENT OF THE COURTHOUSE

Lester Ross presented a request to repair and remodel the election room in the basement of the courthouse subsequent to the remodel of the top 2 floors. Lester explained that the election room had been affected by the main remodel. He noted a bid for \$83,000 from Zwick Construction. After receiving the bid, Lester decided that Iron County would deal directly with the sub-contractors. In relation to the project Marshal and Evans had bid \$9,700 to do the electrical and \$22,800 from Church Construction for painting. In this light, Lester requested \$40,000 for the project. Dale Brinkerhoff expressed concern about lingering financial obligations from the courthouse remodel. Jon Whittaker noted that the election room needed to be ready as soon as possible, and no later than May for the upcoming elections. Jon also noted that Washington County had been graciously storing the bulk of Iron County's election equipment.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to table the decision regarding courthouse cameras for 2 weeks, and to approve up to \$40,000 for the repair and remodel of the election room in the courthouse. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE DECISION REGARDING DISPOSITION OF THE FIDDLERS CANYON BUILDING

Lester Ross and the commissioners discussed several options for the disposition of the Iron County owned building in Fiddlers Canyon in Cedar City. They discussed rental rates, possible tenants, selling the building outright, and accommodating different existing tenants and Iron County offices. Dale Brinkerhoff asked that Morley and McKonkie perform an appraisal, before deciding on the disposition of the Fiddlers Canyon Building.

PERSONNEL

Adrion Walker explained that Judge Dunlap had been covering for Judge Miller, who had out on sick leave. Judge Dunlap had originally contracted for 20 hours per week. Since Judge Miller's absence, Judge Dunlap had been working average of 28 hours per week. Adrion explained that they were seeking a temporary increase in contractual paid hours for Judge Dunlap, as well as back pay for the hours worked. He noted that this could be done with a formal contract that could be reviewed monthly. This would allow for flexibility as Judge Miller's schedule might change, as well as protection against being permanently locked into a costlier, higher hour contract with Judge Dunlap. Dale Brinkerhoff expressed concern that Iron County had already contracted too many hours for justice court judges, especially since fewer tickets had been written recently.

Alma Adams made a motion to enter into a contract with Judge Brent Dunlap for a maximum of 30 hours per week not to exceed the contract, with the same hourly pay rate with no retroactive pay per his exempt status. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Nay; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve a back pay request for Brandon Kennedy in the Sheriff's Office in the amount of \$876.00. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

NON-DELEGATED ITEMS

No Non-Delegated items were discussed.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Those assembled were led in the pledge of allegiance by Chad Nay.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by William Pressgrove.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the minutes of the March 12, 2018 Iron County Commission Meeting. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS

Chad Nay, Iron County Building & Zoning Administrator, reported that they were near approval of a "General Conservation Plan," which would replace the current Habitat Plan. Chad reported that work continued to progress marking the Old Spanish Trail. The main concern with building maintenance was the Fiddlers Canyon Building. He was waiting on the information concerning the Iron County surplus auction sale. When the auction date was set then he would be able to move forward on renting the office spaces. Chad reported that with his lack of personnel it was becoming a struggle to provide timely inspection services. Numbers for building permits were increasing and was at a consecutive two year high. He expressed his concern on a future plan for infrastructure, personnel, sheriff, etc. as a result of the increase of construction.

Steve Platt, Iron County Engineer, reported that the budget was on track. The Kane Springs Road fencing being installed by the prison crew was progressing but sporadically. Steve reported that Sunset Subdivision was a Special Assessment Area (SAA) which could be a good gravel material source. Cedar City required a hydrology study on the SAA before any work could begin. The study would be performed on 7.5 acres. One real advantage for the gravel material source was that it would be used for a retention basin for Quichapa. He reported that priorities from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) money for the Brian head fire were: seeding and bale bombing after the fire, repairs to The Forebay, Parowan's gravel pit, a detention basin on 300 East and 400 South, Parowan road crossings at 300 W. and 600 W, flood channel improvements from detention basin to 1-15, enlarging the structure at Eagle Rock Subdivision, and a detention basin West of 600 West. Steve reported that with the repairs to the Forebay there was hope that the Parowan irrigation water would be available at the end of June or first of July.

Bruce Anderson, Iron County Landfill Supervisor, Preston Nelson explained that due to family matters Bruce Anderson requested that he present the Landfill report. The Landfill Budget was on track. Bruce submitted a bid for a new side load garbage truck combined with Cedar City and Enoch City each buying a truck as well. There was still no action regarding a cleanup of the Stone Castle site. Bruce had attended the Solid Waste Association of North America training conference. The landfill was now able to perform Freon evacuations on refrigerators, thus saving Iron County money. The Parowan retention basin was cleaned up and sealed. The scrap metal pile cleanup and sale was close to completion.

Preston Nelson, Iron County Road Supervisor, reported that they had replaced three cattle guards on the Bench Road in Newcastle. There were two miles of subgrade completed on the Vandenberg Road. Preston had ordered a 938 cat loader on a buy-back program which would be delivered in June. Preston reported that Mel Clark was currently crushing 30,000 yards of road base at the Road Department shop on Bulldog Road. He reported that the road chip and asphalt bids were returned and Western Rock was low bid for chip at \$16.00 per ton, and Sunroc was low bid for asphalt at \$53.00 per ton. Preston reported that they would "iron wolf" the Kanarra Mountain Road. They would begin chipping the third week in June. The roads listed to be chipped were 3.1 miles of the Kane Springs Road, 3/4 mile of Fife Town road, 5 miles of the Buck Horn East frontage, from U-20 down to the Dutch Cowboy dairy, first 5 miles of Beryl highway off crossroads going north, 2300 West (sewer plant road) from the city line out to Midvalley Road, 800 South in Westview Subdivision by the new Stake Center being built, 800 S. in Beryl by Stokes Equipment back West to the silver mine, 200 West in Beryl West of

Beryl Highwa, Chekshani Cliffs, the Cemetery road in Kanarraville, and 2200 West in Parowan Valley.

Lori Eichelberger, Iron Count Justice Court Administrator, reported that the proposed changes to the Public Defender Appeals Contract for Dale Sessions were Under Section 4 Payment. Section 4.1 Guilty Plea Appeal would increase to \$1500.00 maximum; Section 4.1 Single Day Trial Appeal remained at \$2500.00 maximum with the exception written in section 4.2; Section 4.1 Multi-Day Trial Appeal remained at \$5000.00 maximum; Section 4.2 Appeals involving Child Welfare, Termination of Parental Rights, and Single Day Trial was now \$3000.00 maximum. In these instances, the Trial Attorney would file the appeal and the petition. For doing this, they would be compensated \$100.00 per hour for 1 hour for filing of the appeal, 2 hours for the filing of the petition for a total of \$300.00. They would need to send an invoice to Lori's attention. Lori explained that due to a recent Iron County Sting Operation, it was determined that an attorney accepting a Conflict Case involving a 1st Degree Felony should be compensated more than the standard Conflict case payment. Conflict cases for anything less than a 1st Degree Felony would be paid \$1000.00 for preliminary work and accepting the case. An additional \$1500.00 would be paid if the case went to trial. Conflict cases for a 1st Degree Felony would be paid \$1500.00 for preliminary work and accepting the case. An additional \$2500.00 would be paid if the case went to trial. When Iron County needed to go outside of the existing Public Defender contract holders for Conflict Cases, the attorney who accepted such work should direct email invoices to her. Lori explained that once the changes were made she would bring them back to the commission for approval.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

William Pressgrove, a citizen of Iron County, stated that the Iron County Commissioners needed to avoid "the appearance of evil" and though an action may be legal, the ethics of it could appear that, "the fox was in control of henhouse." William explained that the Iron County Special Service District #2 and the Municipal Building Authority Boards were made up of the same individuals. He reported that the same three commissioners sat on each committee and when there were decisions and approvals from the same three there was an "appearance of evil." He admonished the commissioners to avoid quid pro quo to avoid the appearance of evil.

Paul Cozzens, Central Iron County Water Conservancy District (CICWCD) Board member, reported on the Quichapa Recharge Project. Paul explained that as sediment laden water overflowed the farmers did not want it going into their fields. Paul reported on a project to slow the flow of the silty water to allow the sediment to settle out of it in a, "Lazy River." Once the sedimentation had fallen out, the more clear water would be pumped into recharge basin that had been made by scarifying a very porous area, thus allowing the cleaner water to enter the aquifer. Their project was a proof of concept, but seemed to be working successfully.

Fred Rowley, a citizen of Iron County, reported that he, too, was involved with the recharge project and thanked the commission for their support.

PRESENTATION OF PAYMENT IN LIEU OF TAXES (PILT) PAYMENT FROM THE STATE OF UTAH

Kevin Bunnell, Department of Natural Resources, presented the annual PILT payment to Iron County in the amount of \$2,205. Kevin stated that the delisting of the Utah Prairie Dog was in progress and looked hopeful.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL FOR THE NEWCASTLE FIRE DEPARTMENT WIRELESS COMMUNICATION FACILITY LAND LEASE AGREEMENT

Mark Yahne, of InTelliSites, explained that he had submitted the agreement to the Iron County Clerk and Attorney. Mike Edwards requested that he have time to examine the agreement as he had some concerns with government approval. Mike explained that most of the approvals would involve the Planning Commission and he did not want the agreement to affect the way the Planning Commission conducted their business. Mark Yahne explained that he omitted any Iron County frees space and made had those changes. Mike Edwards requested time to make the changes and move it to the next commission meeting for approval. Alma Adams asked how high the tower would be and how far it was from the nearest building. Mark explained that the Tower would be a 150 foot tower, and was designed to collapse onto itself and to not fall over. Mark Yahne had met with the home owner adjacent to the property and the owners had no concerns. No action was taken.

RESOLUTION 2018-4, RECOGNIZING THE DEVASTATING EFFECTS OF THE OPIOID CRISIS AND SUPPORTING LEGAL ACTION AGAINST MANUFACTURERS AND DISTRIBUTORS OF OPIOIDS

Mike Edwards explained that after conversations with the Iron County
Commissioners and other counties that there was interest, to address through legal action,
the devastating effects of the opioid crisis both in Utah and in Iron County. The
Resolution outlined some of the reasons for those concerns. Mike reported that at the end
of the Resolution it calls for Iron County to work on a sustainable, comprehensive public
heath approach to the opioid crises to address preventable drug overdose deaths, to
pursue legal action against drug manufacturers and distributors of opioids, and to seek the
maximum award for damages from prescription opioid manufacturers to hold them
accountable. Mike reported that the information was collected from the State Health
Department and other counties who were pursuing similar action.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve Resolution 2018-4, Recognizing the Devastating Effects of the Opioid Crisis and Supporting Legal Action Against Manufacturers and Distributors of opioids as presented by Mike Edwards. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

IRON COUNTY RESOLUTION 2018-4

A RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE DEVASTATING EFFECTS OF THE OPIOID CRISIS AND IN SUPPORT OF PURSUING LEGAL ACTION AGAINST MANUFACTURERS AND DISTRIBUTORS OF OPIOIDS

Whereas, the Centers for Disease Control has declared that the United States is experiencing an opioid-induced "public health epidemic"; and,

Whereas, 91 Americans die each day from opioid-related drug overdose; and,

Whereas, opioid pain relievers, including oxycodone, hydrocodone, fentanyl, and hydromorphone, and responsible for three-fourths of all prescription drug overdose deaths; and

Whereas, nearly one in three Utah adults (32%) were prescribed an opioid pain medication in 2014; and

Whereas, Utah has the seventh-highest drug overdoses rate in the United States with an average of six people dying per week (one death nearly every day) and 24 deaths each month as a result of overdosing on prescription opioids; and

Whereas, according to the State Department of Health, the rate of prescription opioids dispensed in Utah from 2002 to 2015 grew by 29.4%, averaging nearly five opioid prescriptions per patient in 2015; and

Whereas, since 2002, drug poisoning deaths per 100,000 in population have increased at an alarming rate and prescription opioids have been responsible for more drug deaths in Utah than all other drug categories, such as benzodiazepines, over-the-counter medications, or illicit drugs; and

Whereas, drug poisoning deaths are a preventable public health problem that has outpaced deaths from firearms, falls, and motor vehicle crashes in Utah since 2002; and

Whereas, Iron County has experienced opioid-related deaths; and

Whereas, there are significant economic impacts caused by the opioid epidemic - \$55 billion in health and social costs, and \$20 billion in emergency department and inpatient care; and

Whereas, counties often bear the brunt of these costs, paying both for the treatment and incarceration of addicted persons and the deep social cost that the loss of a significant population of productive community members has in the region; and

Whereas, the North American prescription opioid market exploded to a value of \$12.4 billion in 2015 with an expected annual growth rate of 4.6%; and

Whereas, prescription opioid manufactures realized these profits as thousands of individuals lost their lives, having fallen victim to prescription opioid addictions; and

Whereas, practices of manufacturers, distributors and sellers of opioid painkillers have contributed to the epidemic; and

Whereas, beginning in the 1990s, opioid manufacturers lied to both doctors and the public about the risks of opioids, and touted them as a non-addictive and safer alternative to other drugs; meanwhile, opioid distributors injected millions upon millions of opioid pills into small communities, far in excess of any reasonable need; and

Whereas, a direct consequence of over-distribution, addiction has become commonplace, with death often the ultimate consequence; hard-working Americans have become addicts, first to the opioids pushed by the drug makers and distributors, and then to street drugs like heroin; and

Whereas, drug companies and distributors spent millions of dollars on promotional activities and materials that falsely deny or trivialize the risks of opioids while overstating the benefits of using them for long-term chronic pain, including providing funding to prominent doctors, medical societies and patient advocacy groups to win their support for the drugs' use for chronic pain; and

Whereas, serious allegations have been raised that prescription opioid manufactures have systematically engaged in deceptive marketing practices and fraudulent cover-ups to advance the sale of prescription opioids; and

Whereas, to date, over 250 lawsuits have been filed in federal court, with others spread across the state courts, against opioid manufacturers seeking damages for the public cost of the opioid crisis, including 16 states (Alaska, Arizona, Delaware, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, New Hampshire, New Mexico, New Jersey, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, West Virginia, and Washington), and dozens of counties across the country; and

Whereas, Iron County has the authority to bring suit on behalf of the public under a variety of legal theories, including false advertising, abating a public nuisance, and violations of the Utah Pattern of Unlawful Activity Act.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ENACTED BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF IRON COUNTY, UTAH AS FOLLOWS:

- Iron County shall work on a sustainable, comprehensive public health approach to the opioid crisis in order to address preventable drug overdose deaths.
- Iron County shall pursue legal action against drug manufacturers and distributors of opioids.
- Iron County shall seek the maximum award for damages from prescription opioid manufacturers to hold them accountable for the destruction and devastation they have inflicted upon the citizens of Iron County.

REVIEW FOR APPROVAL OR DENIAL, APPLICATIONS FOR CONTINUED EXEMPTION FOR PROPERTY TAX EXEMPT STATUS ON TWO PROPERTIES HELD OVER FROM THE MARCH 12, 2018 COMMISSION MEETING

Christene Lowder, Iron County Chief Deputy Auditor, explained that the Elks Lodge had failed to send in their tax exempt application before the deadline. She was contacted by the Elks Lodge at the conclusion of the last commission meeting and before end of the day the application was presented. Christene requested the Elks Lodge be

approved for tax exempt status for 2018. Christene reported that the International Church of the Four Square on North Main in Cedar City, reported that they used all of the 5 acres of land north of building for parking. Cindy Bulloch checked on the property and reported that it was not all being used for parking and recommended to grant only 1 acre exempt status and 4 acres be taxed. They would have 30 days to appeal the decision. Christene explained that Pastor Pete of said Church of the Four Squar informed her that the church would be placing shipping pods on the four acres at a later date.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Elks Lodge for tax exempt status in 2018 and for the Second International Church of the Four Square 1 acre be tax exempt and 4 acres taxable for 2018. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE DECISION TO OFFER A SETTLEMENT TO AMBULANCE CUSTOMERS FOR OUTSTANDING ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE BEING COLLECTED BY GOLD CROSS

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, explained that when Iron County sold the Iron County Ambulance to Gold Cross outstanding ambulance billings owed to Iron County were continued by Gold Cross. Gold Cross had been actively collecting from the accounts and once the accounts deemed uncollected they were turned over to Mountainland Collection out of Salt Lake City, Utah. Mountainland continued to work on those accounts to collect the money and they would not be written off. Mountainland Collections agreement was with Gold Cross and they in-turn would deposit the money into the Iron County bank account. Dan reported that as of March 8, 2018 there was \$3,331.15 remaining on the Gold Cross collections. There were seven customers that continued to pay their outstanding accounts in small increments. The balance on the Mountainland books, after returns, was \$1,002,926.94. These collections were deemed non collectable and Iron County would only collect one to three percent of that within the next three or more years. He explained that Iron County would not actively pursue the "non-collectable" accounts. Gold Cross proposed to offer the seven paying customers a 20-25 percent discount to pay off their accounts. This would close the Zion Bank account, write off Gold Cross and collect directly from Mountainland Collections. In summary, Dan requested allowing Gold Cross to offer the paying customers a 25 percent discount to pay off their accounts.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve Gold Cross continuing to collect outstanding account receivables in the amount of \$3,331.15 and to offer paying customers a 25 percent discount to pay off their outstanding accounts. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF THE PURCHASE OF ELECTION EQUIPMENT ON THE STATE CONTACT WITH ES&S

Jon Whittaker explained that the Utah State Legislature had passed an appropriations bill that included \$4,000,000 for election machines and equipment. There was a state wide contract with ES&S, and the estimated cost for Iron County would be \$128,000.00. Iron County would receive more than half of the cost returned from the state appropriation. The cost was less expensive than those purchased in 2005. Jon reported that the machines would be ready for the upcoming primary election.

Alma Adams made motion to approve the purchase of election equipment on state contract with ES&S in the amount of \$128,000.00, which more than half would be reimbursed by state funds. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PERSONNEL

Adrion Walker, Iron County HR Director, presented Nathan Dennett to be promoted from Facilities Maintenance Technician to Building Inspector/Zoning Officer for approval, with an effective date of March 25, 2018. There would be an increase in pay of \$2.83 per hour, raising his pay to \$20.89 per hour. This would bring Nathan to the bottom of the pay scale for the new position.

Adrion Walker presented for approval, changes to the current job description, pay range and associated pay of Lester Ross, Lead Facilities Maintenance/Building Project Manager. Said changes would include the building maintenance tasks Lester had been performing, but also include building inspection tasks, and maintain building inspection certifications. Adrion reported that Lester currently had seven out of the eight certifications. He was requesting an increase of \$1.43 which would be \$25.00 per hour bringing him to the bottom of the pay scale for the new position.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve Nathan Dennett to be promoted from Facilities Maintenance Technician to Building Inspector/Zoning Officer, with an effective date of March 25, 2018. This change would reflect an increase in pay of \$2.83 to \$20.89 per hour. Approval of changes to the current job description, pay range and associated pay of Lester Ross, Lead Facilities Maintenance/Building Project Manager. An increase in pay of \$1.43 to \$25.00 per hour. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Adrion Walker then presented a request for an additional full-time employee to the Information Technology (IT) Department as a result of Brett Robinson's recent voluntary resignation. Adrion noted that Iron County lost a great deal of knowledge base with the loss of Brett Robinson. In moving forward, it had been explained that there was a need to change the prior "IT Administrator" position to a "Network Administrator" position, along with the creation of a new "Web Developer/Programmer" programmer position. With the request to restructure and reorganize the IT Department, there was also a need to discuss compensation issues related to the recruiting of new skilled employees and the retention of existing employees as it related to market data and the plan moving forward.

Alma Adams made a motion to make the following changes in the IT Department: a pay raise for the current IT Director from \$75,650 to \$79,432, a pay raise for System Administrator III from \$64,500 to \$67,725, a pay raise for Network Administrator from \$54,787 to \$59,787 and Web Developer \$49,787, and a pay raise for IT Technician from \$32,198 to \$34,025. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Adrion presented for possible approval of a Contracted Medical Support rather than backfill the vacant Medical Supervisor position in the Iron County Correctional Facility. He noted that the Correctional Facility had to meet the state requirement of the presence of a Registered Nurse (RN) three times per week. The RN would primarily be available to write prescriptions. He recommended leaving Doug Johnson as the Lead Medical Technician day to day and adjusting his pay, to advertise the contract for an RN to come in two days per week for the hours to be determined, with an estimated \$35.00 per hour.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion of approval to enter into a contract for Medical Support rather that backfill the vacant Medical Supervisor position in the Iron County Correctional Facility. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

NON-DELEGATED ITEMS

Courthouse

Lester Ross reported that the repair on the roof had been unsuccessful. They would need to cut the roof around an existing drain for the repair. Zwick was responsible for the repair as it was under warranty. Lester gave them a deadline of first week April. ThyssenKrupp would be working to repair the elevator this week to have it up and running. The election room floor was being ground to prepare it for an epoxy coating. A new T-grid system had been installed to support the suspended ceiling, and the electrical had been roughed in. The surveillance cameras would have to be rebid because they did not get ordered by the rebate deadline.

Because of inflation, fuel costs, and the added distance of collecting garbage in the unincorporated areas of Iron County, the current collection rate was insufficient. Bruce noted the collaborative nature of Iron County, Cedar City, and Enoch City regarding landfill. Not only had there been sharing of collection trucks when emergency repairs were needed, but the 3 municipalities had joined forces to buy 3 trucks simultaneously, thereby increasing their buying power. He continued, explaining that privatization had also been considered as an option. Bruce concluded by noting that with the exception of Beaver County, no other local, comparable collector, was under \$10 per month. Dale Brinkerhoff noted that the proposed increase was not a tax increase, but rather a fee increase.

No public comments were offered.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the minutes of the March 26th, 2018 Iron County Commission Meeting. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

OPEN MEETING TRAINING

Michael Edwards, Iron County Deputy Attorney, provided training regarding the Open Meeting Act. The training included: 1) Due Process; 2) Chairperson Definitions; 3) Procedural Requirements; 4) Sanctions and Enforcement; 5) Discretion; 6) Substantive Due Process; and 7) Judicial Deference.

COMMISSIONER REPORTS

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that there was a Public Meeting held on March 29, 2018 regarding an increase in the Iron County Landfill Collection fee. Landfill was a good indication of economic growth. The Landfill Fee remained at \$4.00. The Landfill Collection fee increase was approved to increase by \$2.00 per month.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he attended a conference in Des Moines, Iowa with the Iron County Economic Development Committee. Attendance at the conference would allow the committee to apply for grants for economic development. Mike reported that the main focus of the committee would be rejuvenation of Cedar City and building a partnership with Southern Utah University students and Cedar City.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he would be traveling with the Economic Development Committee and Cedar City Mayor Wilson to visit Silicon Slopes to learn from them and to enquire whether there was an opportunity to employ Iron County residents to work remotely.

PUBLIC HEARING FOR A PROPOSED ZONE CHANGE FROM A-20 TO COMMERCIAL. PROPERTY LOCATED AT APPROXIMATELY 1990 N DRY LAKE RD, BRIAN HEAD, UTAH

Chad Nay, Iron County Zoning Administrator, explained that the zone change in question was located at 1990 N. Dry Lakes Road, west of Brian Head, and that it would entail 70.00 acres located in the NE ¼ of Section 28 and the SE ¼ of Section 21, Township 34 South, Range 9 West, Salt Lake Base and Meridian. This would be a zone change only. Chad noted that the property was being considered for future use as "reasonable accommodations" known as a local boys ranch which could possibly house up to 60 residents. He explained that if the zone change was approved by the commissioners, Iron County would have no local jurisdiction over who would be housed. A conditional use permit would be required with the zone change. If the zone change was not approved the request could be issued under "reasonable accommodations" for the same use. The road that would be used was currently under a prescriptive right of way. The current owner would not give permission for the road to be widened. The road was not maintained through the winter months. Chad reported that the Zoning Commission's recommendation was to approve the zone change.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared a public hearing open regarding said proposed zone change from A-20 to Commercial.

Sheriff Mark Gower explained that group homes bring their own set of problems and that they were not secure facilities. The facility would necessitate an increase of law enforcement coverage.

Mike Edwards explained that zoning was a legislative decision through the commission and would allow Iron County a lot of discretion. If the zone change was denied the request would return under a reasonable accommodation. The reasonable accommodation would become an administrative decision which would give Iron County less discretion. Mike noted that it was premature to focus on the potential pitfalls before the application had been received. Iron County would not be permitted to deny the request for the facility just because of the challenges group homes cause, but would have to declare substantial reasons to deny. Iron County should not allow private citizens to maintain roads because of liability. The specific details in regards to the road would need to be included in the conditional use permit.

Chad Nay asked whether the proposed zone change might change the possibility of commercial zoning in the adjoining areas.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the public hearing closed.

Mike Edwards recommended to table the issue for further investigation.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to move the issue to the next Iron County Commission meeting. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Based on the survey, as well as estimated spring prairie dog productivity, estimated take for development of the property would be at least 7.2 prairie dogs and 0.42 acres of habitat, with a cost of \$420.00.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the prairie dog take request as presented by Jessica Van Woeart. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Jessica Van Woeart reported that the General Conservation Plan (GCP) was likely to be in place as of that day (April 9th, 2018).

APPROVAL TO APPLY FOR AN OFF-HIGHWAY VEHICLE (OHV) TRAILS PROGRAM GRANT FROM THE UTAH STATE PARKS. THE GRANT WOULD BE USED TO PLAN, PURCHASE AND INSTALL SIGNS & TRAIL HEADS, AND INSTALL TRAIL MARKERS IN THE OLD WEST AND NORTH HILLS TRAIL SEGMENTS OF THE COLOR COUNTRY OHV TRAIL.

Mike Worthen presented a request for approval to apply for a grant that would help pay for signage and trail heads for segments of the Color Country OHV trail system. He explained that the entire project would be \$39,271.20, with \$19,636 coming from the grant, \$8,344 provided as "in kind," and \$12,000 from Iron County Tourism. Mike explained that these trails would be in western Iron County.

Kacy Adams, Iron County Weeds Supervisor, presented a request to renew the annual Cooperative Agreement for the Iron County Cooperative Weed Management Area. Kacy noted that the other participating entities needed a place to sign and approve the agreement.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the cooperative agreement as explained and to add signature places for all seven municipalities of Iron County to the document. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

<u>DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF THE 2018 COOPERATIVE</u> AGREEMENT FOR UTAH STATE UNIVERSITY EXTENSION SERVICES

After some concern over a roughly \$40,000 increase, Alma Adams requested that approval for the 2018 Cooperative Agreement for Utah State University Extension Services be postponed until the increase could be explained.

OPIOID LEGAL REPRESENTATION AGREEMENT WITH PHIPPS DEACON PURNELL, LLP, CO-LEAD COUNSEL, AND DURHAM JONES & PINEGAR, PC AS CO-LEAD COUNSEL. Presented by Michael Edwards.

No action was taken.

DISCUSSION ON CORRECTIONS AND PATROL RETENTION ISSUES.

Mark Gower, Iron County Sheriff, expressed alarm regarding retention issues in the Iron County Sheriff's Office. Sheriff Gower noted that around 13 deputies were at various stages of leaving Iron County for various reasons. He noted that other agencies were offering significantly higher starting wages, signing bonuses, and greater contributions to retirement funds. He noted that in both Corrections and Patrol, there would be personnel deficiencies. Sheriff Gower pleaded with the commissioners that even though it was the middle of the year and budget cycle, there was a significant need to revisit wages in his department. He and others noted that, in particular, the Utah Highway Patrol was paying high wages, and that so many deputies would begin their career at Iron County and then leave as soon as their obligation to stay ended. Another concern expressed was that with staff shortages there was a genuine threat to public safety, because deputies working too many hours tend to be tired. Some deputies were also working multiple jobs to subsist.

Dale Brinkerhoff asked Adrion Walker to research wages in surrounding and comparable agencies to identify Iron County's shortfalls. Dale expressed that Iron County was not in a position to compete with Wasatch Front and St. George agencies.

Alma Adams noted that the economy was doing very well, and therefore, wages had increased. Alma also noted that fewer young people were choosing law enforcement as a career.

Mike Bleak noted that under the Utah Retirement System, law enforcement had seen reduced and delayed retirement due to recent changes to retirement rules, contributing to a lack of interest in serving.

PERSONNEL

Adrion Walker, Iron County Human Resource (HR) Director, presented the new hire of Bryce Williams as a Full Time Outdoor Maintenance Worker in the Parks and Recreation Department for approval, with an effective date of April 16th. Additionally, Adrion presented the new hire of Kristine Heter as a Part Time Assistant Cook in the Council of Aging (COA) Department for approval, with an effective date of April 3rd. Finally, Adrion presented the new hire of Eric Rohmann, as a Correction Deputy in the Sheriff's Office, with an effective date of April 9th. All of these new hires would be backfills of vacant positions.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Personnel changes as presented by Adrion Walker. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the minutes of the March 29, 2018 Special Iron County Commission Meeting. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, reported that the Iron County external audit was scheduled for April 30, 2018. Hinton Burdick would be conducting the audit. Dan reported that phase one of the new purchase requisition system had been implemented in the courthouse offices and would move forward to the other Iron County Departments later. He reported that he had attended the West Point Economic Summit that was held on March 27th. Robert Spendlove, Zion Bank's Chief Economist, presented an economic overview which was tailored to local government. A few insightful points that he covered were that the economy as a whole was up 48 percent since the 2016 Election also, as of February 2018 there were 89 straight months of job growth which was the 3rd longest expansion on record of economic growth. Dan explained a healthy unemployment rate was 5 percent. If the percentage fell below 5 percent it was considered a "labor shortage." Unemployment was at 4.1 percent nationally. Utah was at 3.1 percent and Iron County was at 3.5 percent, which meant that there was a lower degree of unemployment than what was desirable. At this time there was a decline in labor force participation resulting from "baby boomers" heading for retirement. The teenage workforce was also declining. He explained that the teenage workforce was not working at an early and were taking more time to inter the workforce. There was a high exodus from high stress jobs. This was beginning to happen in Iron County with the Sheriff and Police departments. Dan noted that some management level changes would help along with an increase in incentives. He reported that trends show that the U.S. was about a year out from another recession.

Nicole Rosenberg, Iron County Treasurer, reported that product sales collection was close to \$3M. The Iron County Pooled cash report was steady. Nicole reported that she had been working with Reed Erickson to set up a new Public Treasurers' Investment Fund (PTIF) for the prairie dogs for the new General Conservation Plan (GCP). The PTIF would include Garfield, Beaver and Iron County. This would be the first time that there would be a shared account with other counties. She reported that Melanie Hall had been working with Maria Twitchell to set up instant payments for Kanarra Falls hikers. The May tax sale would be held on May 24th. As of last Thursday, there were 154 parcels set to be sold, and ten were single wide trailers. Nicole reported that the budget was on track.

Debbie Johnson, Iron County Recorder, reported that total documents recorded was at 3540, transfer documents were at 1160, notices of default at 26 and trustees deeds were trending up at 11. Debbie reported that the budget was on track. She reported that she was pleased with the hard work from her staff.

Cindy Bulloch, Iron County Assessor, reported that this was a busy time of the year for her office. The statutory deadline for the assessment roll being completed was May 22nd. Greenbelt applications were due statutorily on May 1st. The Assessor's Office was about one third complete with an audit of greenbelt parcels. Cindy explained that

property owners were responsible to notify the Assessor's office of any changes made, including the death of an owner. She noted that there was a need to educate owners to understand what changes needed to be reported to her office. This would help to maintain correct records. Cindy reported that job recruiting for an open appraiser position had gone onr 6 to 7 weeks and there were no qualified applicants yet. She explained that there would need to be a reevaluation of wages and incentives to be able to recruit qualified applicants. Cindy reported that within the last 2 years she had lost 63 years of experience in the Assessor's office. She reported that her staff was doing a fantastic job.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported there had been a theft at the Iron County Road department. Three machines had been broken into and the radios and batteries were taken.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commissioner, reported he had met with the Cedar City Chamber of Commerce at a breakfast that they hold on the 3rd Friday of every month at The Pastry Pub. It was a great way for him to get to know local business owners. Mike reported that he had been meeting with Sheriff Gower regarding the retention staff issues.

Jon Whittaker, Iron County Clerk, reported that the Iron County surplus sale was held April 19th and 20th to liquidate overstock furniture and equipment in the Fiddlers Canyon building.

PUBLIC HEARING AND POSSIBLE ACTION FOR A PROPOSED ZONE CHANGE FROM A-20 TO COMMERCIAL. PROPERTY LOCATED AT 1990 N DRY LAKE RD, BRIAN HEAD, UTAH

Reed Erickson, Iron County Planning & Zoning, explained that the public hearing was to propose a zone change from A-20 to Commercial for property located at approximately 1990 N Dry Lake Rd, Brian Head, Utah, 70.00 acres located in the NE ¼ of Section 28 and the SE ¼ of Section 21, T35S, R9W, SLB&M. Parcels C-1124-1-2, C-1124-1-2-1, C-1124-1-2-2 and C-1118-2-2224-1).

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the public hearing for the proposed zone change from A-20 to commercial at 1990 N Dry Lake Rd, Brian Head, Utah open.

Gordon Birch, Executive Director of the Project Monuments Academy, explained the project would be a Boys Ranch for adolescent boys aged 14-18. Families seek out the program the Boys Ranch provided and place their boys in the homes. Gordon reported that he understood that a conditional use permit was required if the zone change was approved.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the zone change from A-20 to Commercial for property located at approximately 1990 N Dry Lake Rd, Brian Head, Utah, 70.00 acres located in the NE ¼ of Section 28 and the SE ¼ of Section 21, T35S, R9W, SLB&M. Parcels C-1124-1-2, C-1124-1-2-1, C-1124-1-2-2 and C-1118-2-2224-1). Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

William Pressgrove, a citizen of Iron County, explained that in the Zoning District Purposes under RA-20 it says "the primary purpose for requiring large minimum lots of not less than 20 acres is to discourage smaller lot subdivisions where public facilities such as central sewage disposal, parks, playgrounds and government services such as police and fire protection are not as readily available or could not reasonably be available. Residential Districts of Iron County zones of R-5 down to R-½ are formulated to provide single family housing choices to meet the needs of Iron County residents to offer a balance of housing types and densities, and to preserve and provide safe and convenient places to live. These districts are intended for well-designed residential usage free from any activity or use that may weaken the residential integrity of these areas. Generally residential districts shall be located where adequate public services and facilities are available to meet the needs of the residents. Typical usages include single

family dwellings, parks, and public facilities necessary to the needs of the residents." His R-5 acreage was established prior to the written statement. He reported that many in his area that are R-5 zones which were not provided with the amenities. William proposed one of three considerations: 1) Rezone; 2) Lower tax rate; or 3) Disregard the Table of Uses.

CONSIDERATION AND APPROVAL OF THE SPECIAL USE LEASE AGREEMENT #1873, WITH THE STATE INSTITUTIONAL TRUST LANDS (SITLA), TO LEASE 636.76 ACRES CONTAINING KANARRA FALLS, FOR MANAGEMENT PURPOSES

Mike Worthen, Iron County Resource Management Plan Director, explained that in the last Commission meeting Mike Edwards was concerned with the insurance section in the Kanarra Falls agreement. That concern was with the language in Article 6.2, page 9 which allows self-insurance.

Alma made a motion to approve the Special Use Lease Agreement #1873 with the State Institutional Trust Lands (SITLA), to lease 636.76 acres containing Kanarra Falls, for management purposes. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

CONSIDERATION AND APPROVAL TO SUBLEASE 636.76 ACRES CONTAINING KANARRA FALLS, FOR MANAGEMENT PURPOSES

Mike Worthen noted that if SITLA agreed to the agreement, Section 7 of the lease allowed Iron County to request from SITLA the ability to sublease the property to Kanarraville Town who would assume the responsibility and conditions of the lease agreement.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve subleasing the above mentioned property, as allowed for in the lease agreement, as requested by SITLA to the town of Kanarraville. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

Mike Edwards explained that the Iron County Commission would sign the letter to allow SITLA to sublease the property to Kanarra Town and then they would enter into an interlocal agreement. Michael Bleak thanked everyone who involved with Kanarra Canyon to protect the watershed and water for Kanarraville.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF PUBLIC DEFENSE APPEALS CONTRACT WITH DALE SESSIONS.

Lori Eichelberger, Justice Court Administrator, explained that she was bringing back Dale Sessions' Contract for public defence appeals already discussed in the March 26, 2018 Commission Meeting. Lori reported changes in the Public Defender Appeals Contract were: in the title, dates were now April 1, 2018-March 30, 2018; under Section 4 Payment: 4.1 Guilty Plea Appeal rose to \$1500.00 maximum, Single Day Trial Appeal remained at \$2500.00 maximum with the exception written into 4.2, Multi-day Trial Appeals remained at \$5000.00 maximum. 4.2 Appeals involving Child Welfare, Termination of Parental Rights, and Single-day Trial Appeals was now \$3000.00 maximum. She explained that in these instances, the trial attorney would file the appeal and the petition. For doing this, they would be compensated at a rate \$100.00 per hour. One hour for the filing of the appeal, two hours for the filing of the petition for a total of \$200.00, They would need to send an invoice to Lori's attention. The Juvenile Contracts would be updated prior to July 1, 2018. At that time she would add the revision into their contracts. She would update the District Court Contracts with the Appeals Addendum as Section 7 prior to January 1, 2019.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Public Defense Appeals Contract with Dale Sessions as presented by Lori Eichelberger. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF THE CONFLICT CASE FORM AND APPROVAL OF AMOUNTS FOR FIRST DEGREE FELONY OFFENSES

Lori Eichelberger explained that due to a recent Sting Operation, it was determined that an attorney accepting a Conflict Case involving a 1st Degree Felony should be compensated more than the Iron County standard Conflict Case payment. Lori reported that Conflict cases for anything less than a 1st Degree Felony would be paid \$1000.00 for the preliminary work and for accepting the case. An additional \$1500.00 would be paid if the case goes to trial. Cases for a 1st Degree Felony would be paid \$1500.00 for preliminary work and for accepting the case. An additional \$2500.00 would be paid if the case goes to trial.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Conflict Case Form and pay increases for 1st Degree Felony Offenses as presented by Lori Eichelberger. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF A WIRELESS COMMUNICATION FACILITY LAND LEASE AGREEMENT TO BE LOCATEED AT THE NEWCASTLE FIRE STATION

Mark Yahne, of InTelliSitesx, explained that changes made to the agreement were provisions regarding renting property from private land owners. Mike Edwards explained that the change required the land owner to cooperate and allow whatever was necessary for InTelliSites to obtain government approval for the land use. The Planning Commission would be the body to approve the process.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Newcastle Fire Department Wireless Communication Facility land lease with InTelliSites as amended, with the amendment to come later. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

Cindy Bulloch noted that the property would be taxable even though it would be on government land.

POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF A ROAD PROJECT AGREEMENT BETWEEN IRON COUNTY AND THE USDA, FOREST SERVICE, DIXIE NATIONAL FOREST FOR THE BRIAN HEAD FIRE BRIDGE AND ROAD WORK

Alma Adams explained that there was money available to Iron County as a result of the Brian Head fire. With the excess water coming down the Parowan drainages Iron County was being presented with \$700,000 to replace the bridge off Hwy 143 and Valley Creed Road.

Alma made a motion to approve the road project agreement between Iron County and the USDA, Forest Service, Dixie National Forest for the Brian Head fire bridge and road work. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF THE 2018 ANNUAL OPERATING PLAN AND FINANCIAL PLAN BETWEEN THE IRON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE AND THE USDA, FOREST SERVICE, AND DIXIE NATIONAL FOREST

Sheriff Gower explained that the contract was for patrol time in Forest Service boundaries. The reimbursement for hours would be a maximum of \$3000.00.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the 2018 Annual Operating Plan and Financial Plan between the Iron County Sheriff's Office and the USDA, Forest Service, and Dixie Nation Forest. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

<u>DISCUSSION FOR POSSIBLE FURTHER PARTNERSHIP WITH SOUTHERN</u> <u>UTAH UNIVERSITY (SUU) AVIATION</u>

Lieutenant Del Schlosser, Iron County Sheriff Department, explained that SUU's Aviation Department was requesting a partnership with the Iron County Sheriff's Department in purchasing a Bell 407 helicopter. The helicopter would be used jointly for

SUU student training and Iron County Law Enforcement/Search and Rescue operations. This was a very basic proposal to gauge interest. If Iron County were interested, a more in depth proposal would be created for addition consideration. He reported that SUU Aviation was currently in a position to purchase 2 turbine helicopters. Up to this point, SUU had been leasing two Bell 206 turbine helicopters. By moving to a purchase model, SUU would be able to decrease the operating expenses and in turn decrease what they charge the students. The upgrade would better suit the Search and Rescue/Law Enforcement needs of Iron County. The main benefactor of the increased capability would be the Iron County Sheriff and the citizens of Iron County. Lieutenant Schlosser reported that in order to reduce the cost to SUU students, the Department of Aviation Sciences must stay within \$1.3M to \$1.5M per aircraft. The cost leaves SUU short by \$400K to \$500K to purchase the more capable aircraft. SUU Aviation was asking Iron County to help with the purchase. SUU Aviation has donated upwards of 270 flight hours, 525 man hours at a cost of over \$525.000. The donations would continue regardless of Iron County's ability to invest in a new aircraft.

Michael Bleak expressed the importance of the request but was not ready for a commitment at this time. Michael asked that further discussions happen before a decision be made.

CONVENE AS IRON COUNTY SPECIAL SERVICE DISTRICT #1

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the Iron County Special Service District #1 (ICSSD#1).

APPROVAL OF SPECIAL SERVICE DISTRICT #1 RESOLUTION 2018-1 REGARDING THE AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A SEVENTH AMENDED INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT WITH OTHER MEMBERS OF UTAH COUNTIES INDEMNITY POOL (UCIP) RELATING TO THE ESTABLISHMENT FUNDING AND OPERATION OF UCIP

Jon Whittaker explained that UCIP requested that Special Services Areas be included county coverage as associated entities, and would therefore need to authorize a Seventh Amended Interlocal Cooperation Agreement, just as Iron County had previously done.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve Special Service District #1 Resolution 2018-1authorizing the execution of a Seventh Amended Interlocal Cooperation Agreement with other members of UCIP relating to the establishment funding and operation of UCIP. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF A SEVENTH AMENDED INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN IRON COUNTY SPECIAL SERVICE DISTRICT #1 AND THE UTAH COUNTIES INDEMNITY POOL

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Seventh Amended Interlocal Cooperation Agreement between Iron County Special Service District #1 and the Utah Counties Indemnity Pool (UCIP). Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

RECONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY COMMISSION

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the reconvening of the Iron County Commission.

APPROVAL OF A LAND EXCHANGE AGREEMENT BETWEEN IRON COUNTY AND CEDAR CITY CORPORATION

Alma Adams explained that Iron County desired to acquire a 7.5 acre piece of property owned by Cedar City in the vicinity of 3400 South and West of Bumblebee Drive as a pit for gravel, in exchange for the 3.65 acre parcel owned by Iron County.

Mike Edwards expressed concern that Iron County's use of the gravel from the pit was limited by the agreement. Iron County would have to use the gravel only on roads prescribed by the agreement. Mike suggested rejecting the amendments controlling use of the gravel.

Paul Cozzens, Cedar City Council member, expressed that he was in favor of making the agreement work. He was not aware of the limitations stipulated by the amendment.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Land Exchange Agreement as it was originally written between Iron County and Cedar City Corporation. Excluding the amendments. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL TO FORM AN AUDIT COMMITTEE

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, explained that the State Auditor desired counties to form audit committees as a double check on internal controls. Dan expressed that creating such a committee was a challenge since counties already have constitutional, elected auditors. If formed an audit committee would operate under the authority of the Iron County Auditor; would meet 4 times per year, would focus on improvement, would include the Iron County Auditor, an Iron County Commissioner, and a member of the public who was knowledgeable, but not directly associated with Iron County. Dan expressed that an audit committee would be useful, and that he was requesting to be able to set up the committee, not yet the policy driving it. He also expressed that legal review be completed before finalization.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the formation of an audit committee. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

PERSONNEL

JoAnna Cuthers, Iron County Jail Commander, presented the creation and recruitment for a "Lead Medical Technician" position, dissolving of the open "Medical Supervisor" position, and pursuit of a contract for Registered Nurse RN services within the Iron County Jail to meet specified requirements. A contract RN would come three times a week for 6 to 10 hours per day with a contract hourly rate of \$39.00.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the creation and recruitment for a "Lead Medical Technician" position, dissolving of the open "Medical Supervisor" position, and pursuit of contract RN services within the Iron County Jail to meet specified requirements. The contract hourly wage to be \$39.00. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

NON-DELEGATED ITEMS

Iron County Courthouse

Lester Ross reported that the Iron County Courthouse elevator work had been performed and that the inspector would be here within a week for approval of operation. The only change was the removal of the elevator telephone. Lester reported that the Election Room in the basement was moving forward. The sprinkler system had been installed at a slope and did not match the level ceiling. Therefore, crews move all fire sprinklers to match the ceiling. The air conditioner chillers were scheduled to be charged the first of May. The roof repair had been successful. Finally, Lester explained that the courthouse landscaping was still under planning.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Scott Garrett.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the minutes of the April 23, 2018 Iron County Commission Meeting. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Scott Garrett, Iron County Attorney, reported that the budget was at 74 percent. Scott reported that felony cases were at 21. The task force continued to be busy and had turned over 77 cases to his office. Child sexual abuse cases continued to rise and were at 13 cases compared to a total of 18 cases in 2016. He noted that there were no homicide cases as of May. Scott reported that there would be two new Deputy Attorney's joining the Iron County Attorney's Office on Monday May 21st per approval. He congratulated Mike Edwards for his successful conviction on a five year old case of child sexual abuse.

Lori Eichelberger, Iron County Justice Court Administrator, reported that the Justice Court budget was on track. Lori reported that there would be an addition to the budget with the creation of the Contracted Services for three judges from outside counties to cover services for Judge Miller. The anticipated expense would be \$2,405.74 with a total expense potential of \$4,347.90. She noted that the Public Defender's Office was fully staffed. Lori expressed her gratitude to her staff and how they ensured the schedule ran smoothly. The Justice Court personnel had worked well together to clean-up cases that were closed from 1992-2008 but not reported as closed. Lori reported that the Public Defender budget was on target. The Case Tracking report showed a savings of \$2,080 from appeals through the first quarter.

Jared Wilson, Iron County Information Technology (IT) Director, reported that there were a few budget issues. The software maintenance had only 17 percent remaining. Computer supplies were low due to new purchases. Tools & furniture was low due to purchases made with completion of the courthouse. Jared stated that he was confident that he would be able stay on track with the budget. He reported that there would be two new employees, David Nielsen and Ronald Larsen, joining the IT Department upon approval. Jared reported that in 2017, there were 3978 work orders that were completed. There had been 1257 work orders that have been completed as of April 1st.

Stephanie Furnival, Iron County Children's Justice Center (CJC) Director, was unable to attend and requested that Michael Bleak report for her. Commissioner Bleak reported that Saturday May 19th would be the CJC's Fun-run/walk fund raiser. There were 256 preregistered, which was up from previous years. Mike stated that anyone could still register up to the day of the fun-run. Stephanie's staff would be attending the annual symposium hosted by the State Attorney General's Office in Salt Lake City. Stephanie had applied for a Grant for victim advocates/social workers that would be located in the Sheriff and Police departments.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that Iron County was successful in finalizing the agreement with Cedar City for a trade of a gravel pit on Vandenberg Road, west of the Sunset subdivision. The trade consisted of 6.5 acres traded for 7.5 acres of land. Said trade would allow Iron County to excavate the pit which would be a great gravel source and would become good recharge basin for Quichapa Canyon.

<u>Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commissioner</u>, reported the SRS Payment In Lieu of Taxes (PILP) payment was renewed. The payment would include a portion of 2017 and 2018. Dale reported that on May 3rd he met with Garfield, Kane, and San Juan

counties regarding the Hole in Rock memorial. He recently attended the National Council on Public Health in Washington DC.

Jon Whittaker, Iron County Clerk, reported that Rainbow Sign & Banner had designed and placed several wall décors in the Iron County Courthouse. Jon expressed his appreciation to Maria Twitchell from Tourism for her work in getting the décor.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

William Pressgrove, a citizen of Iron County, expressed that "where there are no consequences there are no rules." In the Table of Uses under "Accessory outside storage of flammable and hazardous materials" the definition reads: the outside placement of flammable or hazardous materials which are customary and incidental to the principle use of the property. The definition of Accessory usage reads: the use customarily incidental to and on the same parcel as the principal or main use. William explained that on the Table of Uses "Accessary outside storage of flammable or hazardous materials" Zones R20 through R1/2 was "not" permitted. Any property owner that had a propane take or wood pile was in violation of the code. He suggested that the addition of word "not" before customary on the code which would make it legal.

Christene Lowder, Iron County Chief Deputy Auditor, expressed her concern that the courthouse elevator was still not working. Christene reported that she had contacted Lester Ross on May 10, 2018 and had received no reply. She was concerned for those that had to use the stairs as many of her customers were either unable or limited to use stairs. Dale Brinkerhoff stated that he would call Lester at the lunch break. He was under the understanding that it had been completed. Donald Hunter was the State Inspector and needed a letter from service contractor.

TAX MATTER REGARDING ASSESSOR'S PARCEL NUMBER APN:55-2 #2573

Jon Whittaker explained that this was a tax deferral request. As presented in the commission's packet the owner was refused a loan from her bank for the amount due. The total deferral amount was \$3880.20. Jon explained that if the tax deferral was approved she agreed to make a payment of \$200.00 a month over a one year period. Alma Adams noted that the payment of \$200.00 would not cover the payment in one year. The amount needed would be \$323.35 per month.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the deferral request for property taxes on APN: 55-2 with a monthly payment of \$323.35 for a total of \$3880.20. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

<u>DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF 2018 COOPERATIVE</u> AGREEMENT FOR UTAH STATE UNIVERSITY EXTENSION SERVICES

Alma Adams explained that the 2018 Cooperative Agreement was in order and made a motion to approve the 2018 Cooperative Agreement for Utah State University Extension Service in the amount of \$152,634 Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PRESENTATION OF THE 2018 REVISED EMERGENCY OPERATIONS PLAN (EOP) WITH UPDATED PROMULGATION DOCUMENT

John Higley, Iron County Emergency Management Director, explained that the EOP had gone through all the revisions necessary and was now compliant. John presented the 2018 Iron County Emergency Operations Plan to the Iron County Commissioners.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the 2018 revised Iron County Emergency Operations Plan with the updated Promulgation document. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL FOR THE NEWCASTLE FIRE DEPARTMENT WIRELESS COMMUNICATION FACILITY LAND LEASE AGREEMENT

Mike Edwards, Iron County Attorney, explained that Section 3b was amended that the Iron County Commission would not be the approving body, but the Planning Commission would approve any zoning or conditional use permit that would be needed. With those amendments Mike recommended approval of the agreement.

ANNUAL REVIEW OF INCENTIVE REQUESTS FOR THE FOLLOWING SOLAR PROJECTS IN IRON COUNTY: IRON SPRINGS, ENTERPRISE, GRANITE MOUNTAIN WEST AND GRANITE MOUNTAIN EAST

Danny Stewart, Iron County Economic Development Director, explained that the four solar projects were owned by Dominion Energy. Danny reported the requirements for the incentive request had been met and returned within the deadline. The combined base year valuation was \$172,910.00 on the installation of the solar projects, the current year valuation was \$451M plus, and the combined reimbursement was at 3.5M. They were each a 15 year-70 percent agreement.

Michael Bleak declared the adjournment of the closed meeting and the reconvening of the Iron County Commission Meeting.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to hire the firm of Phipps Deacon Purnell, LLP and Durham Jones & Pinegar, PC to represent Iron County in pursuing action against opioid manufactures and distributors. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Nay; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

VARIANCE REQUEST FROM DAVID AND LORI HULET IN SUMMIT

Alma Adams stated that the item had been resolved.

DISCUSSION A POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF A MULTI-STAGE PLAN TO ADJUST PAY PRACTICES IN THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT TO IMPROVE RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION

Michael Bleak explained that adjusting pay practices had been discussed in various commission meetings. Sheriff Gower reported that there was concern for recruitment and retention in the Sheriff's Department. The Sheriff Department, including Corrections was faced with the possibility of losing up to 13 Deputies due to deployment, retirement, and actively seeking higher paying employment elsewhere. The retention issue had been ongoing for several years. Iron County had trained Deputies only to have them leave for better pay and incentives. Sheriff Gower explained that this was a great loss for Iron County in training costs and productivity. There was now a two year agreement to stay after undergoing training, but the Deputies were still leaving. Sheriff Gower expressed that recruitment and retention needed to be improved.

Michael Bleak reported that he met with HR, Sheriff's Office, Corrections, and the Auditor. The recommendation was a Five-step process to improve recruitment and retention.

- Step 1: Update to selected and identified public safety pay ranges.
- **Step 2:** Standardize Career Paths in Iron County to a 25 year career path for law enforcement and public safety employees to ensure progression through the assigned pay range. Similarly, implement a 35 year career path for all other, non-public safety employees, to align with the current URS retirement schedule.
- Step 3: Eliminate the training wage for newly hired deputies, allowing them to start at no less than the minimum of the assigned Pay Range. Commissioner Bleak explained that the cost to train a new hire to Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) certification was at least \$10,731.
- Step 4: Offer \$5,000 "sign-on-bonus" to newly hired deputies that are already POST certified, and continue implementing a two year contract. This would still save Iron County \$5,731.88. Current lateral hiring policy: The current Iron County policy for hiring employees with prior experience with other agencies only allowed for maximum of 9 percent into pay range, this meant that someone with 20 years of experience was forced to take a major pay cut to come work for Iron County. This was a disincentive for hiring valuable experienced employees; they simply look at other agencies. As a result the majority of new hires at Iron County were brand-ne employees with zero experience. Approximately 32 weeks of training. Iron County has a one-way transfer of experience.
- Step 5: Allow for up to a 4 percent advancement into the assigned pay range for each year of verified/applicable prior law enforcement experience when recruiting and hiring Public Safety employees, as justified on a case-by-case basis and as department budgets allow.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve county wide the Lateral Policy up to 4 percent advancement into the assigned pay range for each year of verified, applicable prior experience, case by case as the department budget allows, offer a sign on bonus of \$5,000 for newly hired deputies that are POST Certified. The sign on bonus for other departments would be discussed after obtaining further information on the cost of training. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Alma Adams made a motion to schedule to meet with department heads to discuss wages and benefits. The HR Director would priorize which departments to meet with first. The meetings would be held in an expeditious manner. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF A LANDSCAPING CONTRACT FOR THE IRON COUNTY PUBLIC SAFETY BUILDING

Lester Ross reported that the bidding process for landscaping the Public Safety Building had closed on May 11th, with one company submitting a bid, McArthur Landscaping. Last year during Lester's budget meeting the landscaping was excluded for the Public Safety Building. As lessors, the State of Utah tenants in the Public Safety Building as managed by Wayne Christensen, included landscaping costs in their contract, but was not in Lester's maintenance budget.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to award the Public Safety Landscaping Contract to McArthur Landscaping in the amount of \$64,673.20 to be transferred out of the Construction/maintenance budget. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Lester explained that the elevator was usable but he was waiting for the certificate from the state for legal use. Parowan City would allow the Courthouse to connect to culinary water but with a cost.

Betsy Cummings presented the new hires of David Nielsen as a Full Time Web Developer, effective June 4th, and the new hire of Ronald Larsen as a Full Time Network Administrator, effective May 21st, in the IT Department for approval. This would be a backfill of one vacant position split into two positions. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the new hires of David Nielsenand Ronald Larsen as explained. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Betsy Cummings presented the new hire of Benjamin Thornell as a Full Time Deputy Attorney 1, in the Attorney Office, effective date to be determined. He would be taking the Bar in July 2018. This would be a backfill of a vacant position.

An invocation was offered by Alma Adams.

CONSERVATION EASEMENT FOR PRAIRIE DOGS

Reed Erickson, Iron County Planner, explained that the conservation easement in question was part of an ongoing effort to manage prairie dogs in Iron County. Among the management aims was to provide habitat where prairie dogs could be counted by the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources (DWR). Reed explained that the Utah Prairie Dog could be delisted as a threatened species if counts made in the spring on public or dedicated lands exceeded 1,000. The parcels in question located in Sections 29 and 30 of Township 34 South, Range 9 West, Salt Lake Base and Meridian would provide an additional 291 acres of land where prairie dogs could be located, and importantly, counted by the DWR. He noted that the previous counts had only gotten to 500 prairie dogs, of the necessary 1,000 during the spring count for delisting. Reed continued, explaining that Iron County had begun this process in 2016 by sending letters to about 40 owners whose land would be favorable for a conservation easement for prairie dogs. The parcels were then narrowed down to 5, then to 1. The land in question was owned by Brent and Bruce Williams. There had been a special "Yellow Book" appraisal performed, which valued the land at \$3,400 per acre. Reed explained that the lengthy process even included a letter to Interior Secretary, Ryan Zinke. Reed explained while the funding had very recently happened, the appraisal would expire on May 25th, thus necessitating the Special Meeting of the Iron County Commission.

Steven McPherson, an adjacent resident, expressed frustration at the very short notice, and concern about having a conservation easement for prairie dogs near his home.

Fred Orton, an adjacent resident, expressed surprise at the high price paid per acre, noting a recent transaction of only \$1,000 per acre. Mr. Orton also asked about whether water was included, and whether any water would be developed. Reed Erickson replied that a Rangeland Management Plan would be developed to address such issues.

Benita Orton, an adjacent resident, asked how any prairie dogs on the conservation easement would be contained to the property. Ms. Orton expressed concern about the potential damage any incursions would cause. Alma Adams explained that lethal 4D permits would be allowed for adjacent property owners. Reed Erickson explained that a base line survey of adjacent owners would be completed, and any prairie dogs over said base line survey could be eliminated.

Berta McGregor, an adjacent owner, asked why so little notice had been given. She expressed her objection to the conservation easement.

Craig Woothly, an adjacent owner, explained that he had purposely sought out a parcel free of prairie dogs when he purchased his land 9 months previously. He expressed that \$3,400 per acre was too high a price for the land in question.

Elfie Dalley, a resident of Summit and an adjacent land owner, noted that she had suffered a debilitating injury falling into a prairie dog burrow. She expressed frustration at the science of prairie dog counting, noting that on her farm the original count had been 5,000 and was now only 250.

Harold Linnurtrath, an adjacent resident, asked whether Iron County would be responsible for any recourse from damage caused by prairie dogs.

Michelle Portolese, an adjacent resident, noted that she had expensive horses and livestock. She asked whether Iron County would reimburse her for injured livestock. She wondered whether she would have to walk her property line each day searching for signs of prairie dogs.

Lori Hulet, an adjacent land owner, asked whether existing reserves could be used better, instead of creating a new conservation easement among property owners and residences. Alma Adams explained that there were various places prairie dogs had been attempted to be relocated, but only with limited success. Alma explained further that one characteristic of prairie dog colonies is that they can only reach a certain critical mass before a devastating plague kills most of the dogs.

Jimmy Conn, an adjacent land owner, noted that he had heard of property near Lund which was said to be some of the best prairie dog habitat and wondered why it hadn't been utilized instead. Alma Adams explained that attempts had been made with limited success.

Marcus Hansen, a resident of Cedar City, expressed that it seemed as though Iron County was trying to tie the prairie dog preserves together to get to the delisting of the species. He expressed that the conservation easement seemed to be in the best interest of Iron County.

Alma Adams asked what the implications of waiting to take action regarding the conservation easement would be. Reed Erickson explained that waiting would necessitate revisiting the appraisal, and would likely cause about 6 to 9 months of delay.

Fred Orton asked why all the prairie dogs couldn't simply be placed together instead of spread over various preserves. Reed Erickson explained that viable populations of prairie dogs could not be that large. Also, having populations in various areas helps ensure that the species won't be wiped out by the failure of a single colony.

Dale Brinkerhoff explained that, for land owners, prairie dogs had become one of the ugliest subjects. Dale expressed sympathy for the concerns of land owners. He explained that the prairie dogs would not be allowed to pollute any wells. He reiterated that any increase in prairie dogs for adjacent land owners could be mitigated lethally, based on the base line survey which would be performed. Dale expressed appreciation for the citizens who had come to voice their frustration, and that it was a vital part of American democracy that such a right continues.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion for Iron County to accept ownership of approximately 291 acres of land located in the West ½ of Section 29, and the East ½ of Section 30, Township 34 South, Range 9 West, Salt Lake Base and Meridian, for the purpose of managing Utah Prairie Dog habitat and to authorize the Iron County Commission Chair to sign documents on behalf of Iron County to effect the ownership

and to deed a Conservation Easement to The Nature Conservancy. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the minutes of the April 9, 2018 Iron County Commission Meeting. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Jon Whittaker, Iron County Clerk, reported that the Clerk budget was at 69.13 percent remaining, the Non-Departmental budget was at 18.08 percent remaining and the Elections budget was at 86.77 percent remaining. Jon reported that the State Legislature approved an appropriation of \$4.2M for election equipment. The state also received \$4.8M in Help America Vote Act (HAVA) money. He explained that the distribution by county was not yet known, but he estimated that it would cover much of the expense of the new equipment. Jon reported that the ballots went to print that morning. Electronic Systems & Software (ES&S) provided onsite training on the new election equipment and would be providing personnel on Election Day. The Primary ballots would be in the mail on June 5th. Ballot drop boxes would be provided at town and city offices and the courthouse until Election Day.

Adrion Walker, Iron County Human Resource (HR) Director, reported that the HR budget was on track. Adrion reported that since his last commission report there have been three full-time Deputies for Corrections hired, a part-time Assistant Cook in Council on Aging, a full-time Outdoor Maintenance Technologist for Parks & Recreation, a full-time Network Administrator for IT, and a promotion within the Building & Zoning Office to a full-time Building Inspector. He reported that HR was in the process of finalizing the hire of a Web Developer for IT, a Deputy Attorney for the Attorney's Office, an Appraiser and a Chief Deputy change for the Assessor's Office, a Lead Medical Tech in Corrections, and the on-going Patrol Deputy/Corrections Deputy roster. He noted that he had been tracking employee turnover and it was at 11.97 percent as of January 2018, which was within normal range. There continued to be ongoing discussions and collection of data to monitor the wage and salary valuation within departments. Adrion reported that Workers Compensation was trending well. There was one current unemployment claim.

John Higley, Iron County Emergency Management Coordinator, reported that he concluded a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) basic course at SUU for the Nursing Program. The Training, Climbing and Exercise Committee had met and developed a three year exercise plan to run through December 2021. The upcoming Saturday would be the Preparedness Expo held at the Cedar City Main Street Park. John reported his budget at 41% spent. He explained that an "Emergency Management Performance Grant" was offered by the federal government. The state was the recipient of the \$3M Grant. Iron County was a sub-recipient and would receive \$46,000 which contributed to his and Stephanie Furnival's salaries. The federal government had yet to fund the Grant but he was positive they would. The State had asked the counties to move forward with documentation for the grant.

Curtis Crawford, Council on Aging (COA) Director, reported that the budget was on track. Curtis reported that two of the Meals on Wheels routes were reaching their delivery max of around 40 meals per route. The lunchtime meals at the Cedar Senior Center had increased from about 25 to about 50 per day. There continued to be a growth in scheduling times which now filled morning, afternoon, and evening classes/activities. He reported that in the last six months they had created 15 new classes and activities. Seven of those were health related activities which included two additional Yoga classes, two additional Tia-Chi exercise classes, an arthritis class, chronic pain class, social dancing, line dancing, and game night. Next month there would be two additional classes, one about handling diabetes and another class called "Walk with Ease." Curtis reported that the COA was two months ahead of scheduled reports to receive full funding from the Five County Association of Governments (Five County). The funding was based on a previously determined estimated number of meals, phone calls and visits. The COA would be receiving all the funding in advance because they are ahead of schedule and may possibly receive additional funding before June 30th. He reported that in November 2017 there was \$6,500 budgeted to remodel two bathrooms in the Cedar Senior Center. At that time, he estimated that there was an extra \$5,000 in the account, which would

cover the estimated \$11,000.00 for the bathroom remodel. In December it was discovered that the Parowan Center Parking Lot had not been paid.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported attended a meeting in Beaver for grazing regarding introducing Big Horn Sheep in Mineral Mountains west of Beaver. Alma noted that any sheep that left the area would be eliminated so as not to intermix with domestic sheep. He noted that a project to repair the Forebay reservoir and irrigation water for Parowan City had begun that day (May 29th), and that said project was due to be completed on July 10th.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commissioner, reported that the Children's Justice Center 5K run enjoyed an increased turnout from 140 runners up to 350 runners. Most importantly, the event was a very successful fund raiser.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Mark Gower, Iron County Sheriff, asked about the progress of pay increases discussed during the May 14th Iron County Commission meeting. Commissioner Bleak explained that meetings to refine the pay increases were ongoing, and that it would be on agenda on June 11th.

CEDAR CITY HOSPITAL CHARITY PLAN & REPORT

Eric Packer, Cedar City Hospital Administrator, presented the required, annual Intermountain Health Care (IHC) Cedar City Hospital report to the commissioners. Eric explained that they were required to 1) be non-profit; 2) have no private inurement; 3) not discriminate in the treatment of patients; 4) have policies that reflect and integrate with public interests; 5) give more to the community than would otherwise be paid in taxes; and 6) have satellite offices and facilities. Eric then presented various statistics of the Cedar City Hospital for the previous year. Notably, there were 48 licensed beds, 501 employees, \$6,487,891 in charity care, 852 babies born, 3,351 admissions, 3,272 surgeries, 19,025 visits to the emergency room, 235,532 lab tests, and 3,272 surgeries. Capital projects that were planned or under way included light emitting diode (LED) lighting, a new wound clinic, 2 digital radiography rooms, tomosynthesis mammography, and security and video camera upgrades. Eric noted that the Cedar City Hospital had given \$6,487,891 in charity care, and that the deductible for the average family was more than 10% of earned income. He discussed some of the key staffing additions to the Cedar City Hospital. Eric also discussed the ongoing advent of "virtual care," where technology allowed patients and care-givers to come closer, help with diagnosis, and ease care. He noted that unpaid bills were written off and not counted as part of the hospital's charitable care. The mission of IHC was to help people live the healthiest lives possible.

APPROVAL OF REQUEST TO FUND THE IRON COUNTY RURAL PLANNING ORGANIZATION (ICRPO) FOR THE 2019 FISCAL YEAR

Curt Hutchings, Transportation Planning Manager, Five County Association of Governments, presented a request to fund the ICRPO in the amount of \$40,000 for the 2019 fiscal year. He noted that the ICRPO acted as a liaison between the local communities and the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT). Curt explained that, although the request was for \$40,000, the ICRPO would only request reimbursement for the amount spent, which was typically between \$32,000 and \$33,000. Dale Brinkerhoff noted that the money came from the Corridor Preservation fund, which is funded by the State of Utah, and is held by Iron County for authorized distributions.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the request to fund the Iron County Rural Planning Organization for the 2019 fiscal year. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

APPROVAL OF INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT WITH KANARRAVILLE TOWN TO MANAGE KANARRA FALLS RECREATION AREA

Reed Erickson, presented on behalf of Mike Worthen an interlocal agreement to manage the Kanarra Falls Recreation Area as a joint partnership between Iron County and Kanarraville Town. Dan Jessen noted that it was likely that Kanarraville Town would soon take over the collection and management of fees from hikers.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the interlocal agreement with Kanarraville town to manage the Kanarra Falls Recreation Area. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

REQUEST FOR APPROVAL TO EXPEND THE REMAINING SEIZED DRUG MONIES FOR THE PURCHASE OF A NEW K-9 FOR THE IRON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Sheriff Mark Gower presented a request to expend remaining seized drug monies for the purchase of a new K-9. Deputy John Bettridge picked up the new dog from the Von Liche Kennel in Indiana. Sheriff Gower noted that the amount owing for the K-9 was \$9,209.25.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the expenditure of \$9,209.25 of seized drug monies for the purchase of a new K-9 as explained. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND APPROVAL FOR A MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT FOR BOOKMOBILE SERVICE

Dan Jessen explained that library taxes collected from unincorporated areas had increased in 2017 due to a surplus from certain solar farms. The amount, as he calculated, to be distributed to the state library or Bookmobile, should be about \$142,000. Dan noted that the 2017 surplus was an anomaly, and the distribution in the future would decrease to normal levels. He noted that there were some idiosyncrasies about the billing process, but that he would coordinate to make sure the amount paid would align with the amount of library tax collected from the unincorporated areas.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the Memorandum of Agreement for the Bookmobile service as explained. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PERSONNEL

Adrion Walker presented the promotion of Doug Johnson for promotion to Lead Medical Technician in the Corrections Department, effective date of May 20, 2018. The new wage was to be \$22.65 per hour.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the promotion of Doug Johnson to Lead Medical Technician in the Corrections Department, effective date of May 20, 2018. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Adrion Walker presented the promotion of Brian Hoffmeyer to Chief Deputy in the Assessor's office, effective upon the retirement of the current Chief Deputy, Angela Gurr. Adrion also presented the creation of a new position entitled Appraisal Supervisor for approval.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the promotion of Brian Hoffmeyer to Chief Deputy, effective upon the retirement of the current Chief Deputy, Angela Gurr, and to approve the creation of a Appraisal Supervisor position. Brian Hoffmeyer to receive a salary adjustment to \$63,377.67 annually, effective June 3, 2018. This represented a 5% increase plus the conversion to salary. After 6 month probation, Brian's salary would increase to \$68,099.20, upon approval of the commissioners. Second by Alma Adams, Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Adrion Walker presented for possible approval a temporary change for certain employees of the Sheriff's Office who would be in danger of losing vacation time at the end of the year, to be able to use their vacation time prior to Comp. time in the event they were able to take leave. This was to prevent the loss of accrued vacation time that would be in excess of the 320 hour limit per policy. This request was being made due to the Sheriff's Office being currently under-staffed, causing a great deal of overtime.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve allowing certain Sheriff's Office personnel in danger of losing vacation time to use vacation time before using Comp. time to prevent forfeiture of any vacation hours over 320 at December 31st. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Those assembled were led in the pledge of allegiance by Lieutenant Joanna Cuthers.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Michael Edwards.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the minutes of the May 23, 2018 and May 29, 2018 Iron County Commission Meeting. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Maria Twitchell, Executive Director of the Cedar City/Brian Head Tourism Bureau, reported that 28 percent of the Transient Room Tax (TRT) and 32 percent of the Restaurant Tax budget had been spent as of May 31st. Maria noted that collections were up 4 percent for TRT, and 7 percent for Restaurant Tax relative to 2017. In spite of very little snow during the first part of the winter, Brian Head Resort was still able to log 160,000 skier days. The poor winter combined with the advent of "AirB&B" properties, which do not report occupancies, led to a decrease in overall occupancy of 1.3 percent, relative to 2017. Maria reported having applied for two Utah Office of Tourism grants. One was a \$350,000 marketing grant for Iron County and the other was a \$35,000 marketing grant for Brian Head Town. She then discussed the cooperative efforts made to improve the Kanarra Falls hike for visitors and Kanarraville Town. Iron County had taken steps to secure a lease with the Bureau of Land Management, limit access to certain roads, install a concrete vault toilet, and set up a portal to manage visitors and fees for the hike. Maria noted that her office had been fielding between 50 and 100 calls regarding the hike each day. She then reported having partnered with a company called, "Rovit," which creates interactive maps with 360 degree views of points of interest, and ties with regional points of interest. She discussed The Tour of Utah coming to Iron County, with Cedar City being the first leg in 2018. Maria concluded her report on Tourism by discussing an upcoming episode of At Your Leisure with the topic of Off Highway Vehicles (OHV) and local trails. On June 14th Channel 4 would be broadcasting their weather report from the Frontier Homestead and reporting on the Parowan Gap. Maria reported that the Outdoor Recreation budget was at 28 percent. Bryce Williams was hired as a Maintenance Tech. The toilets at Woods Ranch needed to be replaced soon. Work continued on the culverts at the Shooting Range.

Mark Gower, Iron County Sheriff, reported that the Sheriff budget was on track. Sheriff Gower reported the he was currently working with the Iron County Auditor in exploring the feasibility of leasing the Patrol vehicles instead of direct acquisitions. Investigation Detectives continued to work hard following up in several felony cases with an average of 8 active cases each. He reported that the Sheriff's Office had pulled about 1580 cases as of June 1st. Sheriff Gower reported that the Iron County Sheriff's Office had four Deputies deployed on 400 day missions to various locations overseas. The Iron County Sheriff's Office completely and proudly supported their Military personnel and wished them a safe deployment and safe return home. He continued to insure that Iron County Deputies were meeting all training standards set by Police Officer Standards & Training (POST). Sex Offenses, Property Crimes and Drug Crimes continued to be the majority of incidents that they investigate and arrest on. Incidents of opiate addictions and related overdoses in Iron County were concerning and they continued to work with local and federal partners in finding solutions that would mitigate this serious problem in the community. Sheriff Gower expressed his appreciation and recognized the priceless value the VIPS volunteers brought to the Iron County Sheriff's Office. He reported on the recent successful rescue of a missing six year old boy in Iron County. Sheriff Gower

explained that the boy wondered off from his parents and grandparents while shed (antler) hunting. Assistance came from SUU aviation and a state helicopter with infrared equipped cameras. The K-9 Unit was impressive and tracked for 8 miles straight to the boy. He was found around 2 a.m. curled up under a bush. The boy stated that, "the Helicopter kept waking me up and I was trying to sleep."

Joanna Cuthers, Iron County Corrections, reported the Corrections budget was at 16.8 percent. The Correctional Facility continued to pass all Utah Jail Standard inspections with no problems. The current inmate population was at 134 with10 inmates from the state. Joanna reported that she was awaiting a background and psychiatric clearance for a new deputy.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that the Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) project at the Fore Bay continued to progress.

<u>Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commissioner</u>, reported that the Landscaping for the Courthouse would need to move forward. Hole in the Rock Centennial Project may request funding from Iron County.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Bryan Dangerfield, Events Director for the Cedar City Corporation, expressed his thanks to Maria Twitchell and her staff and the Iron County Sheriff Department for their hard work and cooperation regarding the Tour of Utah event. Stage 1 of The 2018 Tour of Utah would be on August 7th in Cedar City and Iron County. He explained that the route would begin in Cedar City, and would pass through Enoch, Summit, Parowan, Brian Head, Mammoth Creek, Duck Creek, Cedar canyon and end with three laps around Southern Utah University SUU. Other events scheduled were the Fire Road Mountain Biking on August 18th, Cedar City half-marathon on September 8th and the Haute Route Cycling on September 14-16th.

CONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY BOARD OF EQUALIZATION (BOE)

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the Iron County Board of Equalization (BOE).

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE DECISION FOR GREENBELT ROLLBACK TAX APPEALS ON PARCELS: C-1048-1-2 THROUGH C-1048-1-14

Justin Wayment, council representing Brent and Bruce Williams, argued extensively that a rollback assessment on land that was sold by the Williams' for a prairie dog conservation easement, should not withheld from the revenues to be paid at closing to the Williams. Mr. Wayment presented a history of the land in question, cited law preventing a rollback tax when land is placed in a conservation easement, cited cases that might have precedent, and that the land had been in continuous greenbelt use.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to move the agenda item to the next meeting to give Cindy Bulloch time to thoroughly respond to the arguments set forth by Justin Wayment, with the intent to waive penalties and interest as needed if the process becomes so lengthy as to have penalties or interest accrue. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PRESENT NEW APPLICATION FOR PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION FROM THE COMMUNITY PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Christene Lowder presented a request from The Community Presbyterian Church regarding the purchase of a building located at 1093 South Main Street, Cedar City. Assessor's Parcel Number (APN): B-1135-22. The building would be used as a thrift store. The exempt period requested would be from April 30th to December 31st, and would not include that portion of 2018 when it was not owned by The Community Presbyterian Church. Christene explained that this would leave \$886 taxable and \$1,777 exempt for the year. She explained that all of the necessary applications had been submitted. Alma Adams made a motion to grant the exemption in the amount of \$1,777 as explained. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

RECONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY COMMISSION

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the reconvening of the Iron County Commission.

BID APPROVAL FOR LANDFILL COMPACTOR

Bruce Anderson presented bids that were submitted for a new landfill compactor. Humdinger submitted a bid that did not meet the high bid. Rasmussen submitted a bid for a Bomag brand compactor. The third and final bid was from Wheeler Machinery for Caterpillar brand compactor. Bruce expressed concern that the second bid was not local, nor did it offer as much compacting weight as the Cat. He was also concerned about no trade in offer with the Bomag. Bruce recommended moving forward with the Caterpillar bid from Wheeler Machinery. Alma made a motion to approve the Wheeler Machinery bid in the amount of \$716,000 with a trade in of \$20,000. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PRESENTATION OF THE RESULTS OF THE DELINQUENT PROPERTY TAX SALE HELD MAY 24, 2018

Christene Lowder presented the results of the May 24th delinquent property tax sale. Christene explained that there were 83 parcels purchased by bidders, 28 removed or redeemed, and 39 were struck off to Iron County. She noted that no problems had arisen since the sale. One gentleman had purchased the wrong parcel, but was reminded that the tax sale is *caveat emptor*, or "Buyer Beware. There was over \$250,000 in excess funds collect, for which the prior owners may apply with the Iron County Auditor. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the results of the 2018 Iron County delinquent property tax sale held on May 24, 2018. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PRESENTATION OF THE JUVENILE PUBLIC DEFENDER CONTRACTS FOR PARK FIRM AND CANDACE REID LAW FOR APPROVAL

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the Juvenile Public Defender contracts for the Park Firm in the amount of \$80,000 and Candace Reid Law in the amount of \$62,000, with a not-to-exceed amount of \$2,500 in aggregate appeals. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

APPROVAL TO INCREASE IRON COUNTY CREDIT CARD AGGREGATE LIMIT TO \$180,000.00 WITH STATE BANK OF SOUTHERN UTAH

Dan Jessen explained that certain departments needed an increase to their credit limits for normal operations. He explained that credit card usage had increased. Some departments often maxed out their credit limit, requiring constant balancing of credit limits among departments. As a solution, the aggregate limit needed to be increased. State Bank of Southern Utah was the credit card provider, and increasing the credit limit would require approval of the commissioners. The credit limit was proposed to increase from \$140,000 per month to \$180,000 per month, giving a \$14,500 monthly aggregate credit buffer. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the increase of the Iron County aggregate credit limit for credit cards to \$180,000 per month. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CONSIDER CHANGING THE EMPLOYEE TRAVEL REIMBURSEMENT POLICY AND RATES WHEN A PERSONAL VEHICLE IS USED WHEN AN COUNTY VEHICLE IS AVAILABLE

Dan Jessen explained that the mileage reimbursement for Iron County had been defined as only one rate. The choice had simply been to use a county vehicle or to use a personal vehicle at the county reimbursement rate. In 2018, that rate was 54.5 cents per mile. However, there are circumstances when employees may choose to use a personal vehicle even when a county vehicle is available. Dan proposed adding the sentence: "If a county vehicle is available, and the traveler is approved to use their own vehicle by their supervisor, they will be reimbursed at a lower rate as approved by the County Commission," to the transportation Costs portion of Section 15 of the Personnel Policy, . He proposed that the lower rate be 40 cents per mile. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the change to the Employee Travel Reimbursement Policy as presented with the lower reimbursement rate being 40 cents per mile. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

APPROVAL TO RELEASE INTEREST IN PROPERTY OWNED BY IRON COUNTY NEXT TO PROPERTY PURCHASED BY SOUTHERN UTAH MORTUARY IN 1978. APN: A-237-1, 15 EAST 100 NORTH, PAROWAN.

Jon Whittaker explained that in a recent title search, it was discovered that a small parcel of land was inadvertently excluded from the purchase of property in 1978 from Iron County to Southern Utah Mortuary. The parcel in question was APN: A-237-1, at 15 East 100 North, Parowan. The parcel is where the old courthouse was located, and has subsequently been restored and used by Southern Utah Mortuary. Jon reported finding no indication in the minutes that there was any intention to retain the land in the southeast of the parcel. Alma Adams recollected that there had been an outdoor jail on that land, and that there may have been an irrigation ditch there at one point. Alma Adams made a motion to release any interest in the parcel as described. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

RESOLUTION 2018-5, WAIVING BUILDING INSPECTION FEES FOR THE RECONSTRUCTION OF HOMES AND CABINS DESTROYED IN THE 2017 BRIAN HEAD FIRE

Chad Nay explained that Resolution 2018-5 was written with the intent to ease the reconstruction of homes and cabins that were destroyed during the 2017 Brian Head Fire. Chad noted that the resolution would waive all building fees, waive the geological conditions ordinance, and the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) code. He noted that the relief offered under the resolution would terminate on December 31st, 2022. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve Resolution 2018-5 as explained. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

IRON COUNTY RESOLUTION 2018-5

A RESOLUTION TO WAIVE CERTAIN FEES AND REQUIREMENTS ASSOCIATED WITH THE RECONSTRUCTION OF STRUCTURES DAMAGED OR DESTROYED DURING THE 2017 BRIAN HEAD FIRE

Whereas, Iron County is responsible for providing building inspections and related services for all new construction, alteration, movement, enlargement, replacement, repair, equipment, use, and occupancy, location, removal, and demolition; and

Whereas, counties and cities are mandated by the State of Utah to use the building codes the State of Utah adopts and amends through the yearly State legislation process; and

Whereas, the only relief Iron County has control over is the waiver of building permit fees, and those requirements adopted through Iron County land Management Codes as outlined herein; and

Whereas, building codes are adopted to establish minimum requirements to safeguard the public safety, health and general welfare, structural strength, means of egress facilities, stability, sanitation, light and ventilation, energy conservation, and safety to life and property from fire and other hazards attributed to the built environment and to provide safety to fire fighters and emergency responders during emergency operations; and

Whereas, Iron County recognizes the destruction of structures in the wildfire known as the Brian Head fire of 2017 was not the fault of the people who suffered losses, nor did those people have any control over this devastation; and

Whereas, Iron County recognizes the mutual benefit to both the property owners in these areas and to the local government to rebuild the buildings and structures.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ENACTED BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF IRON COUNTY, UTAH AS FOLLOWS:

That Iron County extends to those property owners, whose buildings and structures were damaged or destroyed by the Brian Head fire of 2017, building inspection services, at no cost for said services, as outlined herein.

- The building codes shall be adhered to as adopted by the State of Utah and enforced throughout Iron County.
- Plans and the building construction shall adhere to Iron County and State of Utah building construction and land use codes, ordinances, rules and laws to the extent outlined herein.
- Chapter 17.59 Iron County Code, "Geologic Conditions" is hereby waived. However the International Residential Code is applicable concerning soils requirements.
- 4. By choice and not mandated by the State of Utah, Chapter 8.24 Iron County Code adopts the "International Urban Wildland Interface Code". Iron County follows the "2006 Utah Wildland-Urban Interface Code" by choice and not mandated by the State of Utah. Therefore the requirements of these referenced codes are hereby waived.

- Building permit applications and plans shall be submitted to and approved by the Iron County Building Inspection Department. Plan reviews are required. Some plans may require engineering.
- A building permit shall be obtained prior to the commencement of
 construction of any buildings and/or structures. Said building permits may
 be applied for and must be approved by the Iron County Building
 Inspection and Zoning departments.
- Building inspections shall be requested and passed just as with any other new construction.
- 8. The replacement building or structure may be doubled in square footage from the size of the original building or structure. Additional footage thereafter can be added by paying the building permit price for the additional footage. The cost of the building permit will be charged at the same rate as new construction.
- 9. The building or structure shall be used for the same occupancy use the building or structure was approved for prior to the 2017 Brian Head fire.
- 10. The property owner(s) must provide proof to the Iron County Building Inspection Department that the destroyed or damaged building or structure was assessed on the Iron County tax rolls prior to January of 2017, as maintained in the office of the Iron County Assessor.
- 11. The building or structure must be built on the same property as identified by the Assessor's parcel number that the original building or structure was built on prior to the Brian Head fire of 2017.
- 12. Non-adherence to any or all of this Resolution forfeits the property owner's rights to this Resolution, thus subjecting the property owner to customary cost of the building permit and possible fines.
- 13. This Resolution and its benefits to aggrieved property owners expires and is null and void at 5:00 p.m. on December 31st, 2022.
- 14. The expiration for building permits obtained under this Resolution is subject to the same as those outlined in the building codes, ordinances, rules, policies and laws adopted by the State of Utah and Iron County.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION REGARDING RELOCATING THE DRUG TASK FORCE TO THE FIDDLERS CANYON BUILDING

Sheriff Mark Gower explained that during the most recent Drug Task Force meeting, it was discussed that the space allocated to them in the Public Safety Building (PSB) was too small to meet the Task Force's needs. Also, because the space is shared by various agencies, the need for privacy due to the sensitive nature of the cases is acute. Alma Adams questioned how the space in the new building was not sufficient, especially given that it was a new building. Alma asked whether these issues had been discussed during the planning phases of the PSB. Also, the possibility of the Utah Highway Patrol adding another crew was discussed. Mike Bleak noted that he had been approached by members of the Task Force regarding the confidential nature of the work they do, and the challenge of being adjacent to Adult Parole and Probation (AP&P) and other agencies. The anonymity of confidential informants was a concern. Dale Brinkerhoff acknowledged that the Fiddlers Canyon building had indeed been appraised, and was under consideration for sale. Dale suggested, however, that the Task Force concern be given consideration and that all options should be considered. No action was taken at that time.

PERSONNEL

NON-PUBLIC SAFETY RECRUITMENT PAY

Adrion Walker, Iron County Human Resource Director, presented a request to implement the option to recruit and place "Non-Public Safety" new hires at 2.85 percent into their initial assigned pay range for every year of verified and applicable experience in excess of the defined minimum requirements. Adrion explained that this was similar to the recent approval granted to Public Safety, but with the adjustment to account for a 35-year projected career path for non-public safety employees (2.85 percent compared to 4 percent). Dale Brinkerhoff asked whether there would be a cap on the additional pay for experienced new hires. Adrion Walker answered that there was no cap, but that situations arise during hiring that might benefit Iron County to have such leeway. Adrion noted that the increase for experience was at the discretion of the department heads. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the "Non-Public Safety" new hires recruitment pay as written. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

WORKERS COMPENSATION FUND DIVIDEND CHECK

Adrion Walker presented the annual Workers Compensation Fund dividend check to Iron County in the amount of \$6,664.08, which the commissioners accepted.

CJC DIRECTOR COMPENSATION ADJUSTMENT

Regarding compensation for Stephanie Furnival, the Children's Justice Center Director, Adrion Walker discussed how the position had evolved. Adrion proposed increasing Stephanie's salary commensurate to the position. He noted that the Children's Justice Center (CJC) now covered Iron, Kane, and Beaver counties. Stephanie oversaw 3 justice centers, and had 16 years of experience. Adrion mentioned that during the hiring process for the Washington County CJC director, the salary offered was in the \$62,000 to \$63,000 range with a caseload of roughly 330 per year. In Iron County the 2017 caseload was 448, and a total of 578 cases among the 3 Centers Stephanie oversees. Adrion explained that the current salary was \$56,000, with a proposed salary of \$63,000. Alma Adams made a motion to increase the salary for Stephanie Furnival to \$62,000. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CHANGES TO SICK LEAVE POLICY

Adrion Walker presented a proposed change to the Iron County Sick Leave Policy, capping the possible accrual amount at 480 hours, exceptions to a cap of 96 hour sick leave use per calendar year, clarifying proper use and abuse with sanctions from losing benefits to termination, donations of sick leave, the consequences of accepting sick leave donations, and clarifying the use of sick leave for funerals of family members. After some discussion, Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the Iron County Sick Leave Policy update. The motion died for lack of a second.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Iron County Sick Leave Policy as presented, excluding the accrual cap of 480 hours. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

COUNTY WIDE SALARY ADJUSTMENT

Adrion Walker presented a proposed county wide salary adjustment. Adrion explained that his proposal was fairly conservative, and was intended to make Iron County competitive in the employment market. He noted that the amount of the increase would be \$502,861.60 if approved. Of that total, 76% was comprised of Corrections and Patrol. Adrion explained that his proposal addressed compression of pay range issues, and came with his recommendation as Human Resources Director. Dale Brinkerhoff expressed that a lengthy discussion with Dan Jessen, the Iron County Auditor, would be needed before such a large increase be considered. Dan Jessen replied that if the budget were stripped down there would be about \$750,000 surplus, leaving about \$250,000 of excess capacity. Dale Brinkerhoff expressed that times had been good, but there was no guarantee that they would continue. Alma Adams recollected the number being only about \$476,000 per year. Adrion Walker replied that the higher number reflected changes made since his discussions with the department heads. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the proposed salary adjustment as presented in the amount of \$502,861.60. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye, Dale Brinkerhoff, Nay.

DISCUSS PETER SCOFIELD BILL AND STRATEGY CONCERNING CENTRALLY ASSESSED APPEALS AND CONSIDER BUDGET ADJUSTMENT

Dan Jessen mentioned that there was an outstanding bill from the law firm of Peter Schofield of Kirton and McKonkie. Mike Edwards suggested that because the agenda item was to consider that the Commission enter a closed executive session.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Those assembled were led in the pledge of allegiance by Scott Burns.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Preston Nelson.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Chad Nay, Iron County Building & Zoning Administrator, reported that it was a very busy time for building in Iron County, compared to 114 in 2017. As of May 1st there were a total of 128 building permits issued in the unincorporated areas in Iron County. In the month of May 21 out of 35 permits issued were for single family dwellings. Chad reported that on August 1st they would be set up for Building Permit applications to be available on line. He reported that in the Planning Department they had completed placing 11 silhouettes along the Spanish Trail. Landscaping for the Public Safety Building was complete. The Landscaping contract for the Iron County Courthouse was ready for bids. The irrigation water system was expected to be up in Parowan in July. Chad reported that the budget was on track.

Steve Platt, Iron County Engineer, reported that the budget was on track. Steve reported that the prison work crew was sporadic and could use help getting one together, especially in regards to fencing. Revised Statute 2477 (RS 2477) continued with gathering of depositions. The age range was lowered from 70 to 60 years old which allowed for more witnesses to be deposed. Sunset Subdivision was requesting to turn over their private roads to Iron County. An agreement was made with Cedar City for Iron County to acquire 7 ½ acres in the Sunset Subdivision for a gravel source. The papers were signed but he was waiting for the deeds. The estimated cost would be \$18,000 per lot in Sunset Subdivision. Steve reported that there had been three major floods as a result of the Brian Head fire. They were using the \$1.4M of the Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) money that was received for repairs at the Forebay in Parowan Canyon. The estimated date for the irrigation water to be operational in Parowan was July 10th. He reported that there was a time extension for the EWP money to Nov. 3rd, Steve reported that there had been an extra \$1M provided. The money could be used at the Little Creek retention basin, Red Creek and Parowan. The Forest Service wanted to replace two bridges at 1st and 2nd Left Hand Canyons with the recovery money from the Brian Head fire. He reported that the Cedar Valley belt route "story map" would soon be available to observe on the Engineer's website. The public would be able to look at it and write any comments. He had applied for additional Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) money to continue on the north leg of Coal Creek.

Preston Nelson, Iron County Roads Superintendent, reported that they have been patching roads to allow for future chipping. They had approximately two more days to conclude the current chipping. The road crews were cleaning cattle guard and culverts and working on Exit 75. Preston reported that in the upcoming quarter the goals were to finish the Iron County portion of Exit 75, complete chipping, complete patching and to begin to fog seal the roads that had been chipped.

Bruce Anderson, Iron County Landfill Supervisor, reported that the budget was on track. The bid was awarded for the new compactor for \$693,000. There was still no action on the cleanup at Stone Castle Recycling. Bruce reported the cleanup was a Cedar City problem but the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) continued to call him for answers. He reported that he was working with Brian Head on a local agreement to trade the collection on an estimated 120 cans in the unincorporated areas around Brian Head. Brian Head would collect the solid waste from those cans those for the trade on the bill. The scrap metal pile was completed with an estimated \$70,000 worth of metal. Most of the equipment was working well at that time.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that all Commissioners and Legislatures from Utah and Idaho were invited to the White House. While they were not able to go to the White House they met in the Eisenhower Executive Office Building. Vise President Pence made a visit to the meeting. Alma reported that they met with Brian Steed, the Acting Director of Bureau of Land Management (BLM), John Tanner and Tim Williams of the BLM. There was a discussion with them about the possibility of moving the BLM Offices to the West. Cedar City would be an ideal place for the office but they stated that the lack of "night life" was an issue for them to come to Utah.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he attended the meeting in Washington D.C. with Alma Adams and was able to meet with other Commissionerss from Utah to discuss their concerns. The meeting was very beneficial for all who attended.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Fred Rowley, candidate for the Iron County Commission, expressed his thanks for the clean election campaign ran by Michael Bleak.

CONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND RENEWAL AGENCY (ICCD&RA)

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the ICCD&RA.

APPROVAL OF TAX INCREMENT PAYMENT FOR THE THREE PEAKS COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AREA

Danny Stewart, Iron County Economic Development Director, reported that the Three Peaks Solar Community Development Area (CDA) was a large photovoltaic solar project off of Lund Highway. All the information that was required for the project was presented to him before the deadline of April 1st. Danny explained that the valuation was contested which held up the process. That valuation issue had been resolved. He reported that all paperwork had been submitted by Three Peaks and it was now in line for approval. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the tax increment payment for the Three Peaks Solar CDA in the amount of \$903,369.55. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

RECONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY COMMISSION

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the closing of the ICCD&RA and the reconvening of the Iron County Commission.

PERSONNEL

Adrion Walker, Iron County Human Resource (HR) Director, presented the new hire of Rex Dungan as a Certified Residential Appraiser in the Assessor's Office, effective June 20th, for approval. This would be a backfill of a vacant position. Adrion noted that Mr. Dungan had 20 years of experience. The starting salary wage would be \$23.56 per hour. After a probationary period of six months, and a positive evaluation, the salary would increase to \$26.24 per hr. Cindy Bulloch requested that the position be approved in whole including the salary increase after the probation period. Cindy explained that it would be helpful to not always come to commission after a probation period with in each department and to include it in the Personnel Policy. Cindy noted that she did not offer a \$5000.00 sign on bonus but wanted to wait until the probation period ended. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the new hire Rex Dungan as a Certified Residential Appraiser in the Assessor's Office, effective June 20th with a starting wage of \$23.56 per hour until successful completion of a 6 month probationary period, upon completion of which the salary would be \$26.24 per hour. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Adrion presented the new hire of Marcus Gilson as a Full-Time Deputy Attorney II in the Attorney's Office for approval, effective July 16th for approval. This would be a backfill of a vacant position. Mr. Gilson did have prior experience and the beginning salary would be \$63,000 per year. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the new hire Marcus Gilson as a Full-time Deputy Attorney II in the Attorney's Office, effective July 16th, as explained. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY BOARD OF EQUALIZATION (BOE)

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the Iron County BOE.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE DECISION FOR GREENBELT ROLLBACK TAX APPEALS ON PARCELS C-1048-2 THROUGH C-1048-14

Cindy Bulloch, Iron County Assessor, reported that 291 acres of property that was previously classified as greenbelt, owned by Brent and Bruce Williams, was recently sold to Iron County to become a Conservation Easement for Prairie Dogs. Cindy explained that one of the provisions of the greenbelt program was that if land no longer qualifies as greenbelt, a rollback tax of up to 5 years was applied. When a property changed hands the new owner must apply for greenbelt. The Williams' property had been recently audited. The Williams sent their updated paperwork naming David and Lori Hulet as the lessees. The lessees had changed, as generations changed, and the Assessor's office had not been informed of the changes, which was the reason for the audit. She reported that prior to the sale there were around 75 cattle on the property for an estimated three weeks which did not qualify the property for greenbelt. There needed to be 91 head of cattle to qualify. Cindy explained that the issue for the property was two-fold. First was the conservation easement. If the property was a conservation easement a rollback would not apply. Prior to the listing of the property as a conservation easement there was a change of ownership. The change of ownership constituted the rollback. In Utah Code Annotated (UCA) § 59-2 it states "prior to a title change any leans or taxes would be paid". In all the documents nowhere does it say that the livestock was the primary use. It does say livestock was allowed if there was a livestock agreement. She noted that there was not a livestock agreement, therefore no livestock were allowed on the property. Alma Adams explained that Prairie dogs like grass to be low thus the reason to have cattle on the same ground. Cindy Bulloch replied that cattle had to be the primary use on the property. On this property the prairie dog was now the primary use. Cindy stated that she was not doing a rollback on the property because of the prairie dog but because the law required her to.

Justin Wayment, attorney for the Williams', explained why the property qualified as a conservation easement, or dual use, and who was responsible for the rollback tax payment. Justin reported that he had a declaration from Lori Hulet that she grazed cattle depending on drought conditions. Justin stated that if the property were reassessed it would qualify as Grazing 2 not Grazing 3. UCA 59-2-503 sets the standard when rollbacks apply. It required 5 continuous acres actively devoted to agriculture use, devoted to agriculture for the past 2 years, and meets the average production levels. He stated that the property under question had met the average production levels. Justin reported that it was approved by the County Assessor on May 4th and was recorded with lease receipt from the Hulets, and was later withdrawn from rollback taxes. UCA 59-2-506 states, rollback taxes are required unless it met the exceptions in UCA 59-2-506.5 which deals with conservation easement qualifications (which it does) and UCA 59-2-511(5) if the county acquired the property by gift then the county was responsible to pay the rollback tax, which was a onetime in-lieu payment, (4) if the county acquired property pursuant to a conservation easement then the property was not taxed. UCA 59-2-506.5(a) states how a conservation easement was acquired. Justin explained that on page one of the easement it says the land must be subject to UCA 57-18 which makes it a conservation easement. He noted that the conservation easement provided for and promoted agricultural use. Justin argued that in either case the land continued to be used as greenbelt.

Cindy Bulloch explained that under UCA 59-2-511 title may not pass to a government entity until all taxes, in lieu fees or interest owing are paid to the county treasurer. Cindy noted that the code does not say who is supposed to pay those costs. Under the Conservation Easement agreement, Cindy noted that the Primary use was to support the prairie dog, not grazing. Also, under Section E of the agreement, only uses

that would not adversely affect the conservation values would be permitted. Further, the agreement states that all grazing must be in accordance with all conservation purposes and must comport with the management plan.

Mike Edwards expressed that there were two issues to consider: 1) did the property qualify for greenbelt before the transfer; and 2) whether the conservation easement disqualifies the property for greenbelt assessment. Mike noted that, based on the Assessor's information provided, the classification may have been incorrect because of insufficient Animal Unit Months (AUM's). On the second issue, he expressed that converting the property to Conservation Easement did not disqualify the property for greenbelt assessment. Citing a Utah Supreme Court case involving Kennecott Copper, Mike noted that the ruling stated that the greenbelt use did not have to be exclusive. Other uses did not nullify the agricultural use as long as those other uses did not hinder or exclude the agricultural use. Alma Adams made a motion to go with the County Assessor's opinion and impose the rollback on the property. After some discussion, and no second being offered, Alma Adams made a substitute motion to enter executive session to act in a quasi-judicial role. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Ryan Riddle.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Ryan Riddle, Iron County Fire Warden, reported that three projects were ongoing in Brian Head as a result the Brian Head fire. Ryan reported that the Iron County Fire Department was in need of a building to store equipment. The Cedar City Fire Station on the North end of town was not meeting their needs. If Cedar City decided to rebuild, the old station could become an option. The Iron County Road Department was proposing a building that could also be used. Ryan reported that the majority of training had been geared to the Volunteer Fire Departments. The trainings were to train the volunteers in advanced courses and qualifications for fire-land operations. The trainings had been funded by the State of Utah and through grants with no cost to Iron County. He noted that burning permits were required for all outdoor burning. The permits were available on-line on the Iron County website for no cost. There had been 257 permits issued from March 1st through June 1st. In 2017, the Fire Department used funding from the participation commitment match to purchase a printer for the Iron County Road Department. The printer was making money for Iron County in the making of signs. Ryan reported that that a message regarding fire restrictions was being included on the back of the Iron County Solid Waste quarterly billing. Funding to assist in the mailings of the bills would be coming from the participation commitment match funds. He reported that they were working with communities and subdivisions throughout Iron County for fuel mitigation. The Iron County Fire Department received \$300,000 in state funding from the Catastrophic Wildfire Program. The funds would be used in the area south of Cedar City, between Cedar City and Cedar Highlands for fire protection. Ryan reported that the recent Dry Canyon fire in Parowan burned 23 acres and the West Valley Fire, located two miles south of Iron County, was at 46% containment. Most of the fire was burning on wilderness area in the Pine Valley Ranger District and was holding on the 2009 burn scar.

Michael Bleak complemented Ryan and the fire crews with all the planning that happened in the winter in preparation of the summer season. Mike explained that he was a member of the Committee for Justice and Public Safety with the National Association of Counties (NACo). One of the initiatives was being worked on was a Blanket Fire Initiative. He noted that he was a co-sponsor of the initiative. The initiative would bring the idea of fire mitigation and mitigation matches nationwide. He was able to use Iron County as a positive example for the initiative.

Joyce Evans, Iron County Fair Director, reported that the Iron County Fair had \$12,000 from new sponsors. The sponsor money was up to \$69,000 at that time. Joyce reported that the Gate tickets were \$10.00 and \$6.00 and advanced ticket sales were still \$8.00 and \$4.00. She reported that she was still waiting on a building permit for the bleacher covers. The lateness of getting the permit would not allow time to install the covers for the 2018 Fair. Joyce reported that the 2018 Iron County Fair theme was "Passport for Fun." She noted that the fair grounds were in bad shape and she was in desperate need of a work crew. Parowan City's funds were depleted and they could not paint the bleachers as promised. Volunteers could help with weed control, painting the back of the bleachers, etc. Dale Brinkerhoff complemented Joyce for the hard work she puts in throughout the year for the Iron County Fair. Joyce reported that Chad Nay had noticed the posts on the bleachers were beginning to wear. There may need to be a discussion to keep the bleachers and shore them up or tear down and replace them.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that Iron County had a solid waste agreement with Brian Head to go beyond Brian Head to collect solid waste at Rainbow Meadow Ranches. The agreement was to charge \$8.00 per month per pickup. Iron County received a little over \$1M of the Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) money for the Parowan Canyon project, the second increment of \$1M would be for Red Creek Canyon in Paragonah.

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he received a letter from Andrew Harding requesting a letter from Iron County in support the Endangered Species Act.

Jon Whittaker, Iron County Clerk, reported that the Iron County Commission would be holding an appreciation luncheon for Parowan City on July 12th from 11:30-1:00 at the Fair building.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he traveled with Paul Monroe to the Pine Valley and Wah Wah areas to observe where the proposed pipeline would be placed.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Paul Cozzens, a member of the Water Conservancy District Board, reported that the Water Conservancy met with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) beyond the diversion structure at Quichapa. The BLM approved the creation of a lake for high water flows located on the south side of HWY 56. Paul reported there was a new paradigm of the deep water sources. On Thursday July 12th at 5:00 Mark Burr and Mike Page, Geohydrologists and owners of Primary Water Technology, would present new methods and technologies demonstrating that there are more sources of water in the earth than previously understood. Primary water technology uses sonar and other technologies to locate deep water. Mark Burr and Mike Page will do preliminary research in the Cedar City Valley prior to the presentation.

<u>DISCUSSION REGARDING CHILDREN'S JUSTICE CENTER (CJC)</u> <u>FUNDING, BUDGETING AND EXPENSES</u>

Stephanie Furnival, CJC Director, explained that the CJC funding cycle runs from July to June. Utah State statute requires the CJC to be funded on multiple levels. Stephanie reported that she receives money from state appropriations and was required to obtain federal, local, private, grants, city and county funding. She explained that all the funding was on a reimbursement basis. Stephanie reported that in the 2017-2018 funding cycle the CJC received appropriations in the amount of \$179,499. For the 2018-2019 funding cycle the State Appropriations would be \$186,355 plus a roll over amount approximately \$8,000 to \$10,000. She reported that the CJC had received two Victim of Crime Act (VOCA) grants. The funds come from the collection of federal fines. In 2018, Utah would be receiving an estimated \$31-32M from Federal fines. Stephanie explained that the CJC was a non-profit organization and a department that provided direct services to victims. That allowed her to apply for the VOCA Grant funding. The CJC was awarded \$5,401,153.94 from the VOCA Grant for use between July 2018 and June 2019. The grant would be used in Iron, Kane, and Garfield Counties to help supplement the Victim Advocate workers and to supply Mental Health help. Other grants that the CJC had received were \$6,000 from United Way and \$7,000 from NCA. Cedar City Corporation had graciously included the CJC in their budget for \$6,000. Stephanie reported that because the CJC was an Accredited Children's Justice Center, she would receive the National Children's Alliance Grant for \$7,000 per year for five years. She reported that she had received "In-kind" services from Iron County. The In-kind service allowed the CJC to access the IT Department, Iron County Attorney, payroll, and the Auditors office for accounting. The transition to the Iron County phone and internet system would save the CJC around \$4500 per year. Stephanie reported that she wrote a VOCA Grant in behalf of the Iron County Sheriff Department and requested \$146,000.00 to hire two victim advocates to work out of the Sheriff's Office and the Cedar City Police Department. The grant was obtained with a match of \$6,000 from the Sheriff Department and \$6,000 from the Cedar City Police Department. The grant would allow them to hire two full time advocates. The match funds would be a \$3,000 adjustment from the 2017 Sheriff and Police budgets. Stephanie reported that the Western Region Children's Advocacy Center in California invited her to meet with them in September to show them the Iron County Advocacy program.

DISCUSSION AND POTENTIAL ACTION ON FOR A LAW ENFORCEMENT SERVICES CONTRACT FOR THE INCORPORATED TOWN OF CEDAR HIGHLANDS

Mark Gower, Iron County Sheriff, explained that he had been working with Cedar Highlands on a contract for law enforcement services. Sheriff Gower requested that he be allowed to move forward with the contract. The commissioners gave Sheriff Gower permission to move forward with the contract with Cedar Highlands.

DISCUSSION AND POTENTIAL ACTION FOR ASSISTANCE TO SOUTHERN UTAH UNIVERSITY (SUU) AVIATION WITH THE PURCHASE AND UPGRADE TO NIGHT VISION GOGGLES CAPABLE TO THEIR NEW AIRCRAFT

Del Schlosser, Iron County Sheriff Lieutenant, explained that previously, SUU Aviation had requested help from the Iron County Commission for funding of the purchase of a new aircraft. After discussions with SUU Aviation it was decided that a new helicopter was out of the price range. Lt. Schlosser reported that SUU Aviation was in the process of retrofitting a Bell 206 helicopter that they currently possesed. SUU Aviation was requesting assistance to purchase Night Vision Goggles to be added to the aircraft. He reported that \$30,000 would cover the Goggles, and the retrofitting of the lighting in the helicopter to accommodate them. The larger Bell 206 helicopter would be used by the Iron County Sheriff Department.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the assistance to SUU Aviation for the purchase of NVG in the amount of \$30,000.00. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

APPROVAL OF CONTINUED STATE OF UTAH CONTRACT FOR BAILIFF & PERIMETER SECURITY FOR THE FIFTH DISTRICT AND JUVENILE COURTS

Sheriff Gower explained this was the annual contract from the State for the Bailiff and perimeter security provided for the Fifth District and Juvenile Courts. He reported that the State Legislature was able to significantly increase the perimeter funds for 2018. The perimeter security was provided every day.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the Utah Contract for Bailiff & Perimeter Security for the Fifth District and Juvenile Courts in the amount of \$97,937 Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

APPROVAL AGREEMENT, AMENDMENT #1 APPROVAL OF CONTRACT NO. 181559: DIVISION OF FACILITIES CONSTRUCTION AND MANAGEMENT, STATE OF UTAH, PUBLIC SAFETY BUILDING. UPDATE FOR O&M AND ADDITIONAL CONSTRUCTION COSTS (TERM EXTENSION)

Reed Erickson, Iron County Planner, reported that the extension was a result of an over-run of the \$3.7M budget by \$170K. Reed explained that the state was given a list of options as it was their cost. The state opted to extend the lease for an additional year to cover the costs. The lease was for an extension of the overage for one year at \$191K to cover the costs. He explained that in the original contract it was agreed upon to have an evaluation once a year of what the lease amount was going to be. At this time seven months of the year had been used. In the amended contract, the seven months were included. The estimated deficit was around \$22,000, so the amendment had an increase in the replacement fund. Reed explained that \$1.50 would be taken for every square foot lease amount and placed in the replacement fund. There was also an increase in utilities and operations costs.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Agreement, Amendment #1 of Contract No. 181559 with the State of Utah Division of Facilities Construction and Management, State of Utah, Public Safety Building. With an update for Operations and Maintenance (O&M), and additional construction costs with a one year extension. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

RESOLUTION 2018-6, ADOPTION OF CERTIFIED TAX RATES & BUDGETS FOR TAX YEAR 2018

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, explained there was no tax increase. The combined property tax rate, which includes the General operations, Library, and Health was 0.001234%. The levy for county Assessing and Collecting was %0.000405%. The Municiple Services rate was 0.002215%. Dan explained that the rate changes each year to represent the value of property and tax collected, including new growth. There was some negative new growth because of the incorporation of Cedar Highlands, which transferred that value to the town of Cedar Highlands. In the other areas, additional revenues continued to accrue due to new growth.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve Resolution 2018-6, Adoption of the Certified Tax Rates & Budgets for tax year 2018 as presented by Dan Jessen. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY UNINCORPORATED AREA SERVICE DISTRICT #2 (UASD#2

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the Iron County UASD#2.

Dan Jessen, explained there was a slight increase of the levy to 0.002215%, due to the incorporation of Cedar Highlands as explained.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve UASD#2 Resolution 2018-1, adoption of the Certified Tax Rates & Budgets for tax year 2018 as presented by Dan Jessen. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

RECONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY COMMISSION

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the adjournment of the Iron County USAD#2 and the reconvening of the Iron County Commission.

Dale Brinkerhoff to request the Iron County Clerk to form a letter of support of the proposed Endagered Species Act Amendment of 2018, sponsored by Senator John Barrasso of Wyoming.

CANVASS OF THE 2018 PRIMARY ELECTION

<u>DISCUSSION AND ACTION REGARDING CERTAIN CENTRALLY ASSESSED</u> <u>APPEALS</u>

Michael Edwards, Iron County Deputy County Attorney, explained that Centrally Assessed property is real property that is not assessed by Iron County but by the State of Utah. Companies are allowed to appeal their valuations. Iron County has the opportunity to Cross-Appeal in order to protect the valuation. If Iron County feels that appealed values are incorrect the county may seek to Cross-Appeal to counter the appealed value. Mike explained that companies often appeal the values because they feel the Centrally Assessed valuation is too high and they seek to reduce their tax. He reported that three entities had filed appeals. Those entities were PacifiCorp, Black Iron and Century Link. If the three entities were successful in their appeal it would present a tax shift to the other tax payers in Iron County. The Iron County tax shift for PacifiCorp would be approximately \$40K, Black Iron \$65K and Century Link \$15K. If all the taxing entities were included the shift for PacifiCorp would be approximately \$250K, Black Iron \$412K and Century Link \$95K. Mike explained that Iron County did not need to Cross-Appeal. Iron County had the option to let the other counties contest the appeals with the Tax Commission, or Iron County could stipulate to a reduction valuation. Mike explained that Iron County Resolution 2018-7 had been prepared to authorize the Cross-Appeal.

Whereas, it is in the best interest of the County that it file a cross-appeal(s) so that the County can fully participate in the proceedings initiated by the owner(s), including subsequent appeals to the District Court or Utah Supreme Court arising from such proceedings, with the purpose to protect the County's financial interests and the equality of the tax burdens of taxpayers within its jurisdiction.

NOW, THEREFORE, the IRON COUNTY COMMISSION resolves as follows:

- That cross-appeals should be filed by legal counsel and pursued in response to the appeals initiated by the following owners: 1. PacifiCorp; 2. Black Iron; 3. CenturyLink.
- That the County Commission direct the prosecution of the cross-appeal(s) under the advice of legal counsel.
- That in the event an appeal by an owner not identified above is subsequently discovered, legal counsel is authorized to file a cross-appeal using his or her discretion to ensure timeliness, but such cross-appeal must be subsequently brought before the Commission as soon as possible for ratification.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Dan Jessen.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the minutes of the July 12, 2018 Special Iron County Commission Meeting. Second by Alma Adams, Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Cindy Bulloch, Iron County Assessor, reported that her office had just concluded the assessment rolls. Overall the Iron County values had increased. Valuation notices were sent out last week and calls were beginning to come in for the Board of Equalization (BOE) hearings to be held approximately the third week in September. Cindy reported that her office was in the 2nd year of a county wide green belt audit. The main reason for the audit was to make sure property owners were in compliance with the state rules. She was thankful that she was almost fully staffed in the Assessor's Office.

<u>Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor</u>, reported that value notices were sent out as reported by Cindy. Cedar Highlands and Enoch would be going through Truth in Taxation. Iron County could bill the cities to advertise for their Truth and Taxation. Dan reported that there would be a hearing regarding the Iron County Budget adjustments at the next commission meeting. He reported that the Independent Audit was completed and he was waiting for the audit report. The report would be reviewed by the Audit Committee and Alma Adams would report back to the commission.

Nicole Rosenberg, Iron County Treasurer, reported that Collections were over \$14M from January to the present. Outstanding taxes were at \$4.9M. The Delinquent billing had been sent out which may help the amount would go down as payments were made. Pooled Cash was at \$33.5M. Nicole reported that her office was working on the returned mail to track down those that have moved. Instant Payments were working well and she was working with Kanarraville to start using the program. Her budget was on track at 57 percent.

<u>Debbie Johnson, Iron County Recorder</u>, reported that Documents were slightly up, Transfer Documents were up, notice of default were down, and trustee sales were down. Building continued in Iron County which results in an increase of maps sold. Debbie reported that the budget was on track at 47 percent.

Mandy Williams, Central Iron County Water Conservancy District (CICWCD) Office Manager, reported that they had been working with Senator Vickers and Representative Westwood to secure a grant to help with the LEPA and LISA programs which gives them the ability to give incentives to local farmers to change out their pivots to more water efficient pivots. Mandy reported that \$220K had been secured for Cedar Valley and there had been one pivot change and there were applications for 8-10 more. There may be up to 16-19 more by the end of the year. If more applications come in the CICWCD would approach the state for another grant. The cost was approximately \$7000-\$8000 per pivot. She reported that on July 6th the CICWCD received a Right-of-Way Grant from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) for the Quichapa Conservation Pond. The pond would be used for recreational purposes and to attract waterfowl. Mandy reported that the CICWCD had applied, through the Bureau of Reclamation, for a \$300K Water Smart Grant at a 50/50 cost share. The grant would be used to begin to develop their Financial Business Plan and the Water Needs assessment study for the West Desert Water Supply project. She reported that the CICWCD passed a Resolution for the Water Rights Exchange Policy. It was a conservation incentive for developers. Cross Hollow Hills has approached the CICWCD to take over their water system. The budget was on track.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he met with Reg Johnson regarding the Governors Initiative on "roadless" areas. Iron County has a lot of inventoried roadless areas in the forests. He and Mike Worthen met with the Forest Service and discussed all the different areas in the county. Mike has created a map of the

areas that need treatment even though some are roadless. The fire areas need to be tended to which will help with the area.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he attended the National Association of Counties (NACo) Convention last week. He sits on the Justice and Public Safety Committee with NACo. They worked on resolutions and platform changes within the organization. Some of the changes would benefit the Fire Fighters and the cost of personal protective equipment with the fire services. There were concerns regarding the longevity of the equipment so the committee endorsed a scientific study on fire fighters equipment. Mike reported that all of the platforms and resolutions that were submitted by the Utah Delegation to the various committees passed and were now at the NACo Board of Directors. Now that the Brian Head Fire was put out the county would now have to deal with the aftermath.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

William Pressgrove, a citizen of Iron County, expressed that "where there are no consequences there are no rules." In the Table of Uses under "Accessory outside storage of flammable and hazardous materials" the definition reads: the outside placement of flammable or hazardous materials which are customary and incidental to the principle use of the property. The definition of Accessory usage reads: the use customarily incidental to and on the same parcel as the principal or main use. Mr. Pressgrove explained that on the Table of Uses "Accessary outside storage of flammable or hazardous materials" Zones R20 through R1/2 was "not" permitted. He suggested that the addition of word "not" before customary on the code which would make it legal. Mr. Pressgrove was also concerned with the pay raise of the commission without any public input.

DISCUSSION REGARDING ANIMAL SHELTER OPERATIONS

Dawn Aerts, a citizen of Iron County, explained that she has had many negative experiences with the Iron County Animal Shelter. Dawn reported that she has tried to call numerous times with no answer, left messages with no messages returned, and visited the facility and the gate was locked with a number listed to call. There was an Iron County website that provided photos of dogs and the facility and listed that it was operated through the Iron County Sheriff Department with an Office number to call. Mrs. Aerts reported that she visited the Cedar City and Enoch Shelters and both were staffed and opened. She was concerned with who was accepting the animals, feeding them and caring for them at the Iron County Animal Shelter. Mrs. Aerts reported that an Iron County GRAMA response indicated that 15 dogs were transferred to Best Friends in 2016, but Best Friends reported they had only received 2. Dale Brinkerhoff reported that he thought Best Friends accepted all animals but when he contacted Best Friends they stated that they only took healthy dogs. He reported that there was now a part-time person working at the shelter. Dawn reported that Cedar City was willing to be in a partnership with Iron County with the new Animal Shelter they were building. She asked if a feasibility study or cost comparison had been done between using the Sheriff Departments time for operations and the part time employee vs what the proposed cost would be each year to house animals at the new Public Access Cedar City Shelter. Michael Bleak reported that the cost for the Iron County's share for the Cedar City Shelter was \$400,000, which was only the construction portion. At the time the Commissioners felt it would not be feasible to become involved. He noted that the commission would look into the posting of hours and availability of the Iron County Shelter. Carrie Haber, Iron County part time Animal Shelter employee, reported that she was at the shelter 4-6 hours per day. It was hard for her have a set time as she never knows when she would be transferring dogs. The dogs don't last long because she worked hard to get them adopted. The amount of animals varies each day. Sheriff Gower reported that when there were animals at the shelter they were fed and watered twice a day. He praised Carrie with getting the animals adopted quickly.

<u>DISCUSSION ON THE ADMINISTRATIVE LAND USE PERMIT ISSUED JUNE</u> 22, 2015 FOR THE BLUE SKIES RANCH, LLC. PARCEL # E-386-2, APN:492077, LOCATED IN SECTION3, T38S,R12W, SLB&M

Jerry Aerts, a citizen of Iron County, explained that he bought property south of the location mentioned in June of 2016 and at that time there was nothing on the land. Since he built his home the property seemed to be acquiring more of the land around it. Mr. Aerts reported that Blue Skies Ranch at the present time had 11 businesses operating from the location. They were operating under an Administrative Land Use Permit that was issued June 22, 2015. Since that use permit was issued there had been 9 businesses started that are operating from Blue Skies Ranch. The land was zoned at R20, which was agriculture, and the businesses were anything but agriculture. This was a 24 hour operation and he could not open his windows at night because of the noise. Some of the businesses working in the building were: Incorporated May 9, 2018 was W.E. MFG which makes machine parts, March 8,2018 the business builds paint stands, Building Zone Industries (BZI) incorporated July7,2017, Perpetual Services and Perpetual Tools both incorporated June 18, 2017, Wyoming Domestic Limited Liability Company incorporated on March 21,2017, Utah Domestic LLC incorporated December 9,2018, Harmony Farms Inc. incorporated February 2, 2018 and Five Star Holdings incorporated December 22, 2018. All of these began after the Administrative Land Use Permit was issued. BZI website states "Team chemistry sparked into more opportunity and a jump from agriculture work to light commercial was successful. Relationships developed with retail contractors which led to greater opportunities. BZI soon became a significant player in the construction of big box retail outlets such at Walmart and Kroger Stores." The area looks like an industrial site. Jerry reported that the administrative use permit stated that the hours be between 7:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. which was not being followed. It should be conceded that this was Industry not Agriculture. Reed Erickson reported that Blue Skies Ranch was applying for a Conditional Use Permit and was scheduled for discussion at the next Iron County Planning meeting. Mr. Aerts stated that Reed should send a letter to every Chekshani Cliffs resident and everyone within a mile giving notice of the meeting. Maurice Brown was concerned whether there was an oversite of the environmental containments and pollutions that were used in the industrial operations.

POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF GRAZING LEASE ON IRON COUNTY APN: C-1053, APPROXIMATELY 42.47 ACRES OF LAND TO DAVID & LORI HULET

Reed Erickson, Iron County Planner, explained that the Hulets approached him about being able to graze their cattle on the property. The property was located across and south from the Williams Conservation easement on Old Hwy 91 between Parowan and Summit. Reed reported that Iron County has had a gravel source there for a number of years. There had not been livestock on the property before. The terms of the lease would be \$0.40 per day per adult cow for approximately a week. They had 30 cattle. The lease would run from July 23rd through September 30th, with a maximum of 21 days grazing. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the Grazing Lease agreement as presented by Reed Erickson. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

REVIEW AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF A CONTRACT WITH BRIAN HEAD TOWN REGARDING TRASH COLLECTION OF UNINCORPORATED AREAS

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Jon Whittaker.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the minutes of the June 11, 2018 Iron County Commission meeting. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Scott Garrett, Iron County Attorney, reported that the 2017 budget ended with 5.08 percent remaining. The 2018 budget was on track at 51.09 percent remaining. Scott reported that Felony Cases were at 355 compared to 499 in 2017. He attributed the numbers to the great work of the Task Force. There had been 4 jury cases in 2018. Additional jury cases were scheduled later in the year which could bring the number to 7. Scott reported that Marcus Gilson was hired as an Attorney which made the Attorney's Office fully staffed.

Stephanie Furnival, Iron County Children's Justice Court (CJC) Director, explained that she was able to report on her budget at the last commission meeting. Stephanie presented the commissioners with the "Voices of the Children" that come to the CJC. The children wrote about what they experienced at the center and how they feel about the center. Most of the children wrote that they felt safe there and were glad they could talk about their experiences without feeling bad. She reported that statistics unfortunately show that most abuse wasn't reported right away. The center was a place where anyone could come to feel safe and helped. Stephanie explained that the threats to children often come true, like "I will go to jail, your family will be in trouble", etc. Statistics also show that perpetrators were typically known to the victim. Because it was often a family member, a friend of the family, when the child knows who their perpetrator is it makes it harder for them to report it. She reported that interviews in Iron County were at 98, Beaver County at 35 and Kane County at 21 for the year. Medical Exams in Iron County were at 27, Beaver County at 5 and Kane County at 3; therapy in schools in Iron County was at 145 and Kane County at 22. Beaver County was in the process of getting victims advocates in their schools. The ratio of victims was at about 5 girls to 2 boys being abused. Dale Brinkerhoff stated that the CJC defends those that cannot help themselves and appreciated all that Stephanie does for the children. Stephanie noted that the focus was not on the act or what happened, but helping them on where they are going.

Lori Eichelberger, Iron County Justice Court Administrator, reported that things were running well in the Justice Court. Lori reported that as of July 31st, Judge Miller had returned to full-time status. Contracted Services on the budget reported that there was approximately \$5,200.00 spent for the three Judges who offered their services while Judge Miller was gone. Lori expressed her appreciation to Judge Cox, Judge Bradshaw and Judge Whitlock for their service to the court and Judge Miller. She reported that the Merchant Fees would need to continue to be included on the budget. The budget was on track with 43.35 percent remaining. Lori reported that the Public Defender budget would now be represented by the Human Resource (HR) Office. The transition was in progress to move the budget over and she would help however she was needed. The Public Defender budget would be reported by Adrion Walker, HR Director.

Jared Wilson, Iron County Information Technology (IT) Director, reported that IT work orders completed from May through July were 1024 and year to date was 2238 completed. Jared reported that projects completed were: replaced the Assessor's server (moved from Oracle database to SQL database), commissary software upgrade at the Iron County Jail and the CJC installation of the new fiber and phones. He reported that some of the current projects were: Utility Billing and Accounts Receivable upgrade to version 10, server upgrades (Eagle, Incode,

ShoreTel), Phase 1 of the disaster recovery plan, web updates for the Iron County Fair, update exhibits software and Tyler Content Manager installation and training.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that 250 horses had been removed from western lands by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), and that none of the horses would be returned to the range. Alma reported that he attended a Visitors Use Plan meeting in Zion Nation Park. There were over 4M visitors per year and discussions were to move to a reservation system.

George Colson introduced himself as the new Emergency Management Coordinator for Iron County. He reported that he had local ties to Southern Utah and that he was looking forward to working for Iron County.

PUBLIC HEARING TO RECEIVE COMMENTS AND CONSIDER ACTION FOR PROPOSED RIGHT OF WAY VACATION & AMENDED PLAT FOR LOTS 5 & 6 IN THE ALLARD RANCH SUBDIVISION, LOCATED IN THE SW 1/4 SECTION 29, T34S, R9W, SLB&M, IRON COUNTY, UTAH

Reed Erickson, Iron County Planner, explained that the proposed vacation was an old easement that was required for access to the Allard Ranch Subdivision water system. Since that time there had been another phase of the subdivision to the east that allowed access along the main road to the water facility. Reed explained that the easement was no longer required and the property owner would like to vacate it. He reported that proper notice had been given to the property owners.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared a public hearing regarding the proposed right of way vacation & amended plat for 5 & 6 in the Allard Ranch Subdivision open. No comments were offered. Michael Bleak declared the public hearing closed.

Reed Erickson explained that these were narrow alleyways that were platted between the lots. He noted that the vacation would allow the lots to be combined so as to be large enough to build on a single lot without having to build on the property line.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve to vacate and amend plat for Lots 6 & 7, Block B, Old Iron Town Subdivision Phase II, located at 17788 W. 3875 South, Cedar City, Utah, in the SW ¼ Section 5, T37S, R14W, SLB&M, Iron County, Utah. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye: Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION REGARDING ALL TERRAIN VEHICLES (ATV) SAFETY AND ROAD DAMAGE CAUSED BY EXCESSIVE SPEED ON MOUNTAIN ROADS, AND POSSIBLE SOLUTIONS

Destry Batt, a citizen of Iron County, explained that he owned mountain property in Iron County and there was an increasing number of All-Terrain Vehicles (ATV's) and motorcycles on the mountain roads. There were many who were driving irresponsibly and fast. The roads that he had observed were the Dry Lakes Road and Navajo Ridge. He stated that there had been too many close calls. Destry reported that he had the support of Law Enforcement and other property owners to have speed limit signs put up on the roads. Sheriff Gower reported that he had talked with Destry about the problem and had contacted Wade Adams, Iron County Road Maintenance. Sheriff Gower said that Wade would be conducting a study for signage along the roads in question. Greg Wosnum, Cedar City Trail Blazers ATV Club, agreed that having speed limit signs placed on the roads would help. David Burton, a citizen of Iron County, reported that he had livestock on the mountain and had problems with ATV drivers going into the fields and harassing the livestock. David suggested that an education program could be implemented by the businesses that rent the ATV's. Greg Wosnum asked for rigorous enforcement of the speed limit, helmets and insurance.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Jerry Aerts, a citizen of Chekshani Cliffs Subdivision, explained that there was a business that he had concerns with that was located south of Kanarraville and North of Chekshani Cliffs, entitled Blue Sky Ranch. He said that he contacted Commissioner Michael Bleak and never heard back. Michael Bleak explained that he forwarded the messages to the Building & Zoning Office because it was their jurisdiction. Jerry stated that in the course of a year and a half he had conflicting information on whether or not he was allowed to enter the building to discuss his concerns with the owners. Jerry reported that there were now 12 businesses operating at the location. One of the businesses was a metal milling business which used water and oil to cut metal. Mr. Aerts expressed concern was where the waste water was going. He noted that the well for Chekshani Cliffs was located about a half mile from the building. The main drainage ditch that comes down from the building goes directly to Chekshani Cliffs. Other concerns were constant traffic. Mr. Aerts said that the Conditional Use Permit that had been issued was permitted without anything different being done at the businesses. Jerry reported that at the Planning & Zoning meeting the Iron County Attorney spent 25 minutes explaining why the Conditional Use Permit should be approved, mainly because none had been denied for the previous three years. Mr. Aerts felt that Iron County was rewarding bad behavior.

ENGINEERING SERVICE AGREEMENT MODIFICATION NUMBER 1, CONSIDERATION FOR APPROVAL. HORROCKS ENGINEERS, INC., ADDITIONAL SERVICES ADDED TO THE CONTRACT FOR THE CEDAR VALLEY BELT ROUTE ALIGNMENT STUDY FOR \$6,400.00

Reed Erickson explained that Iron County received an additional \$10,000 from Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) to help evaluate the realignment of the Summit Interchange as part of the alignment study. The amendment to the contract in the amount of \$6,400.00 was to include a more in depth evaluation of the rail road crossing and breaking out the segments for the Belt Route.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the Engineering Service Agreement Modification Number 1 for Horrocks Engineers, Inc, additional services added to the contract for the Cedar Valley Belt Route alignment study in the amount of \$6,400.00, recognizing that there was a \$10,000.00 grant from the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) to be applied back from the Corridor Preservation Fund. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

REQUEST TO DEED A RESIDENTIAL STREET IN A PLATTED ENOCH CITY SUBDIVISION FROM IRON COUNTY TO ENOCH CITY, APN: A-1001

Rob Dotson, Enoch City Manager, explained that in 2007, the Chamberlain Subdivision was annexed into Enoch City. Part of that annexation should have included a frontage road along SR-130 that Enoch City had been maintaining. It was a gravel road and ran next to a few residential homes. Rob reported that in performing due diligence to make sure the Enoch City roads were in compliance with sales, it was discovered that the road was currently owned by Iron County. He requested the road be deeded to Enoch City.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the request to deed a residential street in a platted Enoch City subdivision from Iron County to Enoch City, APN: A-1001. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CONSIDERATION OF TAX EXEMPT STATUS BEGINNING AUGUST 1, 2018 THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2018 ON APN: B-653

Christene Lowder, Iron County Deputy Auditor, explained that Southern Utah University (SUU) purchased property located at 11 N. 200 West, Cedar City, APN: B-653 on August 1st. SUU was requesting that the property be tax exempt from August 1 through December 31, 2018. SUU understood that the property was taxable from January 1 through July 3, 2018. Christene reported that the taxable amount was \$2,693.53 and the exempt amount would be \$1,923.99. She was requesting that the SUU property be tax exempt beginning August 1 through December 31, 2018.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the tax exempt status beginning August 1 through December 31, 2018 for the SUU property APN: 635 located at 11 N. 200 West in the amount of \$1,923.99: that the property would be taxed from January 1 through December 31, 2018 in the amount of \$2,693.53. REVIEW BIDS AND APPROVE CONTRACT FOR LANDSCAPING OF THE IRON COUNTY COURTHOUSE AND DISCUSSION AND APPROVAL FOR A BUDGET CHANGE FOR LANDSCAPING ON THE IRON COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Lester Ross, Iron County Lead Facilities Maintenance, reported that MJ's from Parowan and McArthur from Cedar City had submitted bids for landscaping of the Iron County Courthouse. Lester explained that approximately 80 percent of the grass was being eliminated and was to be replaced with xeriscaping. There would shrubs, small plants and trees included in the xeriscaping. The bid included a concrete slab that would become a pavilion type of area. He reported that Parowan City had requested that the 2 large sycamore trees be removed while the landscaping was being done. Dale Brinkerhoff noted that the trees were still healthy and the removal could wait until a later time. Lester reported that MJ's gave a square foot price on concrete because there was a question on how much would be needed. Lester requested that a \$5,000.00 buffer be included with the bid. Lester suggested that MJ's be awarded the bid as it was the lower bid.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve a pay increase for Robert Hunt for Completion of POST training in the Corrections Department as per the hiring agreement, effective July 29th, increasing his pay from \$19.47 to \$20.42 per hour; also to approve a pay increase for Shawn Peterson, for acquiring a K9 certification in the Sheriff Department, effective July 29th increasing his pay from \$22.57 to \$23.02 per hour. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Adrion Walker presented a request to add two new Victim Advocate positions to work under the supervision and direction of the Iron County Sheriff's Office (while coordinating efforts with the Cedar City Police Department). He explained that Stephanie Furnival (CJC Director) helped in funding the positions obtained in the form of a state grant. Chad reported that the business had been in compliance with everything that had been asked of them in regards to the codes and ordinances. His department had worked closely with Department of Environmental Quality and Southwest Public Health and he was confident in their work.

Chad reported that a Land Use Permit had been issued to Robinson Farm group home. Robinson Farm had sold the business to Sequel Ranch group home. The number of beds for the group home was 28.

An invocation was offered by Dan Jessen.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the minutes of the August 13, 2018 Iron County Commission meeting. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Jon Whittaker, Iron County Clerk, reported that things were running smoothly and expressed his thanks to his staff. Jon reported that the budget was at 41.26 percent. There were two items of concern on the budget. Those were Vehicle Fuel and Dues, Fees, Permits. Both could be attributed to the move back to Parowan. He reported that there was \$121K spent on new election equipment and he was expecting approximately \$86K to be reimbursed from the state. More could be reimbursed at a later date. Jon reported that Shaneal Bess attended the Business License Conference the previous week. One major change was that it was now necessary to obtain local consent for a Beer License.

Adrion Walker, Iron County Human Resource (HR) Director/ Public Defender Budget, reported that the budget was on track. Hiring and recruiting continued to be successful. Adrion reported that the following positions had been filled: a full-time Web Developer in the IT Department, a full-time Appraiser in the Assessors Department, three full-time Patrol Deputies in the Sheriff's Department, a full-time Deputy Attorney in the Attorney's Office, two full-time Corrections Deputies for Corrections and a fulltime Emergency Management Coordinator. He reported that Betsy Cummings was finalizing the paperwork for a new hire in the DMV. He was in the process of creating new rosters for the Sheriff's Office and Corrections. Adrion reported that employee turnover was trending very well at 10.6 percent for the year. Workers Compensation claims continued to be satisfactory in volume. There was a slight upswing in unemployment claims. Benefits renewal would be coming up in the fall. There was a slight increase in medical claims which may result in an increase in premiums. Adrion expressed that he would like to set up a meeting with all the Department Heads to discuss any concerns with them and to provide some training. Adrion reported that he challenged Betsy Cummings to become Society for Human Resource Management (HRM) certified. He explained that it was a very extensive certification that took a lot of her personal time to study and prepare for. Most individuals that take the HRM test have to take the test two or three times before they pass. He reported that Betsy passed it on her first try. Adrion explained that the Public Defender program was still in transition from the Justice Court. He requested that Lori Eichelberger continue to report on the Public Defender Department until the transition and training was complete.

Lori Eichelberger, Iron County Justice Court Administrator, reported that the Public Defender budget was on track. Lori explained that there were still a lot of items regarding the transition with the shifting budget. She was looking forward to working with Adrion Walker on the transition and would help him in any way.

George Colson, Iron County Emergency Management Coordinator, explained that this was his first time to report to the Iron County Commission. The budget was at 61 percent spent. He had only been in the position for three weeks and was familiarizing himself with the budget and workings of the department. George reported that he had met with the Fire Chiefs, Sheriff, and the Fire Warden. He was still in the process of meeting with the volunteers in Iron County.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that there was a fire at the Iron County Landfill which destroyed an expensive compactor. Bruce Anderson, Landfill Supervisor, was in the process of acquiring a new one. Alma reported that the first Iron County Audit Committee meeting was held and went well. He expressed his thanks to Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, for putting the committee together. He reminded everyone that the Iron County Fair was underway and encouraged everyone to attend.

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commissioner, reported that he met with Ryan Bremner from Garfield County regarding a request to financially participate in the Hole in the Rock Centennial Parkway.

OPEN THE COUNTY BUDGET FOR FY 2018.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the reopening of the Iron County Budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2018.

PRESENTATION OF BUDGET AMENDMENTS BY DAN JESSEN, IRON COUNTY AUDITOR

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, reported that the amendments to the Iron County 2018 Budget were: Salaries & Wages adjustments approved in a prior Commission meeting \$226,120; removing a T-Mobile grant \$443,000 which would now be handled through the University of Utah; Courthouse Remodel \$290,000 in final costs; Courthouse Remodel Engineering \$52,000; Election Equipment \$123,000; 911 phone system that was in the 2017 budget but not spent until 2018 \$240,815; Jail overtime due to being understaffed \$100,000; additional Public Safety Building lease revenue \$200,500; Public Safety Building Principal & Interest for bond added \$200,500; Public Safety Building landscaping \$65,213; Sun Edison Community Development Area (CDA) additional Revenue & Incentive payments \$82,957; Corridor Preservation Fund adding to Rural Planning \$39,500; additional Transient Room Tax (TRT) Advertising & Promotions spending \$30,000; Enterprise City Park \$25,000 (used by Escalante Valley residents); Search & Rescue/SUU Helicopter Night Vision Goggles \$15,230; Sheriff Patrol Pickups whose bids were higher than planned \$13,000; Public Health Fund transfer from General Fund \$10,277; and Justice Court Judges contracted during Judge Miller's absence \$6,000.

PUBLIC HEARING REGARDING 2018 BUDGET AMENDMENTS

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared a public hearing regarding the 2018 Iron County Budget amendments open. No comments were offered. Michael Bleak declared the public hearing closed.

CONSIDER TO APPROVE & ADOPT THE AMENDED 2018 BUDGET WITH CHANGES

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the 2018 Iron County Budget amendments as presented by Dan Jessen. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Seona Brown, a resident of Chekshani Cliffs, explained that a petition had been presented to the Iron County Commissioners regarding opposition to the Planning Commission's approval of a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) change for industrial businesses located at 1233 S. Old HWY 91, South of Kanarraville Town. Mrs. Brown reported that one concern was the unknown waste or chemicals being generated by any of the businesses, or the means of storage, transport or disposal being so close to the subdivision well. The second concern was the accountability of the business. The owners of the property, Blue Skies Ranch LLC, had not complied with the Administrative Land Use Permit (AUP) issued on June 22, 2015. Not knowing and not being informed was the last concern.

Murice Brown, a resident of Chekshani Cliffs, stated that he was curious to how the business had been allowed there and another across the road. He was concerned that the area would become an industrial area and that there was no monitoring of the business.

Marlene Huston, a resident west of Kanarraville, explained that she had tried to do a history of Blue Skies Ranch LLC. There was an agenda item listed for discussion regarding a CUP for Blue Skies Ranch LLC on the July 23, 2018 Iron County Commission meeting. Marlene reported that the Iron County Assessor was unaware of the nine additional businesses operating out of the location and had advised the commission, at the meeting, of the continual problem with the business location and their propensity to hide business operations and access. She reported that seven days after the July 23rd meeting the CUP was recorded and was concerned how due diligence was possible in such a short time. The septic facility was originally designed for 10 persons and that number was now at 45 plus. Ms. Huston reported that when she investigated the Water Rights she found Water Right number 81-324 Claim number A-28181 under the name of Ashworth Revocable Living Trust. The water rights were not consistent with where the irrigation water was coming from. She reported that the AUP was recorded on July 1, 2015 and Blue Skies Ranch existed a year earlier. The AUP was intended for businesses that were listed as agriculture, and none of them were, which made them uncompliant. In closing she expressed that the sight was not in compliance now and therefore should not be trusted. She asked who was going to be held responsible.

Jerry Aerts, a resident of Chekshani Cliffs, explained that he had tried to warn the commissioners as to what was happening with the business. Jerry stated that he asked that the all the residents be contacted when the item came up with the Planning Commission and none were. He noted that the business had been rewarded for being uncompliant. Mr. Aerts expressed that the Iron County Commission should be responsible for the decision not the Planning Commission.

Patti Truax, a resident of Chekshani Cliffs, explained that she expected that zoning ordinances were meant to protect the community members from any adverse effects. The business there was ignoring the zoning requirements and was not agricultural as the permit listed. Patti stated that the permit should be rescinded.

Paulette Baker, a resident of Chekshani Cliffs, explained that as a mother and grandmother she felt compelled to inform future residents that there might be an issue with the water down the road. Paulette stated that she was very concerned with the possible contamination of the water.

Cory Stokes, a resident of Chekshani Cliffs, reported that he appreciated that the lights from Blue Skies Ranch LLC had recently been turned down at night. Cory explained that his concern was for the increase of traffic as the result of the many businesses located at the sight. There were a lot of children in the area and he did not want any accidents or deaths to occur. He reported that the he had seen Blue Skies Ranch LLC filling their water truck with water from the Chekshani Cliffs fire hydrant. At the time there was no meter on the fire hydrant and asked whether anyone had checked with the Water Conservancy to see if they had paid for the water.

Chad Nay, Iron County Planning & Zoning, invited all the residents to meet with him in the downstairs conference room to discuss their concerns and to help clear up some inconsistencies in information.

Michael Bleak noted that the commissioners appreciated all the comments and that they were actively aware of their concerns.

REQUEST TO PURCHASE PROPERTY OWNED BY IRON COUNTY LOCATED IN THE PARK VIEW SUBDIVISION

George Luttterman, a property owner in Park View Subdivision, explained that the purchase was discussed in an Iron County Commission meeting in October of 2017. At that time he and Nathaniel Pugh were told that the purchase had to be approved by the Iron County Attorney. George reported that they had recently inquired about the purchase and was told it had not yet been approved. He said that Nathaniel wanted to purchase a 12 acre parcel and he wanted to purchase a 9 acre parcel. Both parcels bounded parcels that they already owned and the purchase would make one contiguous parcel. They were asking whether they were going to be able to purchase the property. Mike Edwards reported that the Iron County needed, but did not have, a definition of what was considered a "significant parcel of property." Jon Whittaker explained that the lots were located by the fissure area in Enoch City. There were several lots that were not vacated and would never be approved for a building permit. Dan Jessen explained that Enoch City Manager Rob Dotson reported that Enoch City did not have an objection to Mr. Lutterman and Mr. Pugh purchasing the property and that Enoch City was planning to vacate the Park View Subdivision so the purchase would not be a problem. Jon Whittaker explained that there were several issues to be discussed and suggested a meeting with Enoch City, George and Nathaniel. Dale Brinkerhoff expressed support for the sale of the property once all the legal issues were taken care of. No action was taken at this time.

<u>DISCUSSION ON LOCATION OF SOLID WASTE CONTAINER FOR</u> IRELAND MEADOW RESIDENT

Bruce Anderson, Iron County Landfill Supervisor, explained that the area in question was a four mile round trip from the owner's cabin in Ireland Meadows to the waste container. The area was within the Brian Head area so Bruce requested that Brian Head place a container closer to Ireland Meadow. Bruce reported that Brian Head agreed to place a solid waste container there.

CONSIDER APPROVAL OF HEARING OFFICER RECOMMENDATION FOR PERSONAL PROPERTY APPEAL OF ACCOUNT P997225 FOR THREE PEAKS POWER, LLC

Dan Jessen explained that there was a special meeting with the Board of Equalization in regards to the Three Peaks Power, LLC personal property appeal. Dan reported that this appeal would need to go through the state. Before the appeal could go to the state it had to be presented to the Iron County Board of Equalization (BOE). Three Peaks Power, LLC was contesting the value because there was Rocky Mountain infrastructure included and they wanted it excluded. Three Peaks Power, LLC challenged the value and the Hearing Officer, Daniel Johnson, recommended that "Pursuant to Utah code §59-2-1005 and after the evidence submitted, along with the verbal testimony presented by all parties" that the Iron County BOE deny the appeal. The appeal would then be referred to the Utah State Tax Commission. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to deny the personal property appeal of account P997225 for Three Peaks Power, LLC. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PERSONNEL

Adrion Walker, Iron County HR Director, presented the transfer of Zachrey Wood from Corrections Deputy to Patrol Deputy in the Sheriff's Department for approval, effective August 26th. This would be a backfill of vacant position. There would be a 5 percent salary increase related to the transfer. Adrion Walker presented the new hire of Ashley Barrett as a DMV Title and Registration Technician in the Assessor's Office for approval, effective August 27th. This would be a backfill of vacant position. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the transfer of Zachrey Wood from Corrections

Deputy to Patrol Deputy in the Sheriff's Department, effective August 26th, along with a 5% pay increase; also the new hire of Ashley Barrett as a DMV Title and Registration Technician in the Assessor's Office, effective August 27th. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Adrion presented the new hire of Robert Stammet as a Corrections Deputy for approval, effective September 9th. This would be a backfill of vacant position. Adrion presented the conversion of Anna Teeples "Interim" Corporal to "Regular" Corporal in the Corrections Department due to a recent voluntary resignation of Corporal Kerrie Turrill for approval, effective August 26th. The resignation would create openings for a new "interim" Corporal to fill Corporal Jerod Hansen's position while he was on active military leave and a new Corrections Deputy position. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the new hire of Robert Stammet as a Corrections Deputy, effective September 9th. Also, approval of the conversion of Teeples "Interim" Corporal to "Regular" Corporal effective August 26th. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Michael Edwards.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the minutes of the Iron County Commission meeting held June 25th, 2018 and August 27th, 2018. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Mike Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Maria Twitchell, Iron County Executive Director of the Cedar City/Brian Head Tourism Bureau, reported that the budget spent as of August 31st was 65 percent of Transient Room Tax (TRT) up from last year by 6 percent and 45 percent of Restaurant Tax up by 8.5 percent. Cedar City had continued to experience declines in occupancy. Some of the decline could be attributed to lack of snow early in the season at Brian Head, the opening of Courtyard Marriott and Airbnb type properties, which do not report occupancy data. Maria explained that there had been a presentation a short-term rental research company which estimated that there were 925 short term rentals in Iron County. These rentals were difficult to track because the company, "Airbnb," remits the tax on their behalf of the owners under the name of "Airbnb." She reported that two grants had been awarded to the Cedar City/Brian Head Tourism Bureau from the Utah Office of Tourism for the winter co-op with Brian Head in the amount of \$139,600 and \$48,000 for the summer campaign. Kanarraville town had taken over the permit system for Kanarraville Falls, its website and collections. The permit fee had increased to \$9.00 and may increase again in 2019 to \$10.00. Alma Adams commented that he had received one complaint about the permit fee. Maria reported that she would like a feasibility study on the future conference/meeting space/special event needs of Iron County. The Hunter Conference Center and Festival Hall seem to be at capacity and there needs to be a larger space to accommodate up to 1,000 people. Jon Whittaker expressed his appreciation to Maria for the art work in the halls of the Iron County Courthouse. He continued to receive positive comments on the art. Maria reported that the Outdoor Recreation budget was at 52 percent. There was a need to replace the toilets at Woods Ranch. Money from the Restaurant Tax could help with the costs of the replacement. The Restaurant Tax had awarded a grant for the Shooting Range for replacing some of the tables and targets. There had been 106 reservations for the Park Pavilion for a total of \$6,600, up from \$6,100 in 2017. The Monsoon rains had created problems with flood waters. Flooding had damaged the fence at the Shooting Range which had allowed range cattle to venture in. Workers continue to remove the cattle. A culvert at 3 Peaks had been washed away from a thunderstorm flood. There had been several feet of rock replaced but that was washed away with a second flood. Bids are out for a cement basin for the culvert. Maria expressed her thanks to Preston Nelson with the Iron County Road Department for all the assistance she had received from him. Lights had been replaced at Woods Ranch and the storage container had been moved to deter theft.

Joanna Cuthers, Iron County Corrections Supervisor, reported the budget was at 63 percent. Corrections was able to return \$1,866 to Iron County from maintenance scrap metal from the air handlers. Culinary meal costs were at 92 cents. Total bookings were 424. The current Inmate totals by type were State 10, Federal 18 and other Counties 0 for a total of 170. There were approximately 30 female inmates. Joanna reported that there were three vacancies in the Corrections with one hire. The work crew was reactivated for the purposes of the Iron County Fair and would be deactivated again once the Fair was concluded. The work crew put in approximately 561 hours helping with the Iron County Fair. The Jail remodel was currently out to bid.

Mark Gower, Iron County Sheriff, reported the budget was on track. The new Patrol trucks were delivered but were the wrong color. The dealership took responsibility for the mistake and kept the trucks. The Sheriff Department was now looking into other options on taking delivery of the budgeted Patrol vehicles. Sheriff Gower reported that each Detective carried on average about 12 open and active cases. To date the Iron County Sheriff Office (ICSO) Patrol Division had pulled approximately 2540 cases,

which was slightly above 2017. Deputies Powell and Hilleger had successfully completed their field training. The Sheriff's Office had three deputies deployed on 400-day military missions to various locations overseas. He stated that the Sheriff's Office completely and proudly supported their Military personnel and wished them a safe deployment and a safe return. Deputy Nick Gibson was retiring on October 1st after 20 plus years of dedicated service in Law Enforcement. Deputy Larry Orton recently retired after 45 years total in Law Enforcement. They would both be missed. Sheriff Gower reported that there were about the same crime statistics as compared to 2017. Sex offenses, property crimes, online fraud and drug crimes continued to be the majority of incidents investigated and arrested. Incidents of opioid addiction and related overdoses in Iron County continued to be a concern. As of September 1st, the Narcotics Task Force had filed about 205 felony charges related to the illegal distribution of drugs in Iron County. He reported that the Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS) program continued to be a success. The VIPS had worked diligently during the summer to provide safety, security, and traffic control for numerous events. The Search and Rescue had been very busy with 11 ropes rescues in Kanarra Falls. Each of the rescues were the result of broken leg injuries while hiking in the canyon. Dale Brinkerhoff suggested a possible \$2.00 per person be paid to reimburse for the rescues by Kanarraville Town. Alma Adams suggested a prevention program in the area of concern on the Kanarra Falls slide. Sheriff Gower reported that the Iron County Correction Facility continued to pass all Utah Jail Standard inspections. The Iron County Animal Shelter was running well because of the efforts and dedication of Carrie Haber and the volunteer staff.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Bruce Washburn, a citizen of Iron County, reported that the Iron County Fair was a great event. Bruce noted that he and his wife participated in the parade representing Iron County Democrats. The decision was made that there would be no political booths allowed at the Iron County Fair this year. The Democratic Party sent a check for a booth and the check was returned stating that political groups would not be allowed to have booths on the fairgrounds. He questioned what was behind the decision and how many other booths were deemed inappropriate. If political booths were not deemed appropriate for the fair why were political entries allowed in the Labor Day parade? A second concern was the Iron County Commission spending tax payer's money to fund political events. Labor Day seems to be the time that political campaigns begin. The Sunday night speaker did not make a political speech, the speaker was a candidate for Congress. When he was invited to the Iron County Fair it became a candidate endorsement and he benefited from free publicity from the fair flyer that was delivered to everyone's door step. Tax payer funds should not be used for political events. Dale Brinkerhoff reported that he was a fair liaison and he was contacted by the Mr. Washburn and he explained that there were a variety people that had been asked to speak at the Sunday night program whether it be cultural, historical or political. The program was non-political and no tax payer money was funded for the event. They would continue to ask anyone who may be of importance an interest to Iron County to speak regardless of political persuasion. The decision on the booths was made by the Fair board and it was equal with all political parties. He stated that the fair was run well and fairly. Alma Adams reported that the Congressman was a leader and was asked on that basis to speak. He agreed that the decision was made equally with all political parties.

Cindy Bulloch, Iron County Assessor, reported that Terry Woods was retiring from the DMV after 45 years of service and there would be a farewell for her in the Building & Zoning Office that day from 4:00 to 5:30 p.m.

Joyce Evans, Iron County Fair Director, reported that Diane Bixman who was over the booths for the Iron County Fair made the decision to exclude political booths in the spring of 2018. Diane felt that the community was overcome with political campaigning that she wanted the Iron County Fair to be fun and free from campaigning.

Joyce stated that she supported her decision. Diane had always insisted booths be manned.

<u>DISCUSSION AND APPROVAL TO SPEND THE 2018-2019 BEER TAX GRANT</u> FUNDS.

Lieutenant Del Schlosser, Iron County Sheriff Deputy, explained that the Beer Tax Grant Funds were applied for from July 1st to June 30th, however the funding was not available until December each year. In 2018-2019, Iron County was awarded approximately \$57,000 and 25 percent must be spent on confinement. The remainder of the money could be used to purchase an additional 11 Communication radios. The cost was approximately \$31,000. Lieutenant Schlosser requested to spend \$31,000 of the Beer Tax Grant funds for the remainder of the radios needed. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Iron County Sheriff's Office to spend the 2018-2019 Beer Tax Grant Funds for the approximate total amount of \$57,000 with \$15,000 to be spent on confinement at the Iron County Jail and \$31,000 on communication radios for the Sheriff's Office. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

CONSIDERATION AND APPROVAL OF MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU) WITH THE FOREST SERVICE AS A COOPERATING AGENCY IN THEIR SAGE GROUSE PLANNING PROCESS

Mike Worthen, Iron County Natural Resource Management Specialist, explained that the MOU was tied in with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and Forest Service recently completed Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) requested by Secretary of the Interior, Ryan Zinke. Mike recommended that Iron County approve being a cooperating agency in the development of the amended policies to be informed as the process progresses. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the MOU with the Forest Service to be a Cooperating Agency in their sage grouse planning process. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSS AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL, OF THE PROPOSED AMENDED PLAT OF LOTS 1 & 2, BLK B, SKI VIEW ESTATES, UNIT 'A' AMENDED, LOCATED IN THE EAST '/2 SECTION 34, T35S, R9W, SLB&M, IRON COUNTY, UTAH

Reed Erickson, Iron County Planner, explained that the proposed amendment of the lots in Ski View Estates, Unit A, were to combine Lots 1 & 2 into a single lot. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the proposed Amended Plat of Lots 1 & 2, BLK B, Ski View Estates, Unit A, located in the East ½ Section 34, T35S, R9W, SLB&M, Iron County, Utah as presented by Reed Erickson. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PRESENTATION OF THE ROCKY MOUNTAIN POWER (RMP) SERVICE REPORT FOR 2018

Tom Heaton, Regional Business Manager with RMP, reported that RMP served 21,439 customers in Iron County and paid \$1,586,788 in property tax in 2017. Cities in Iron County received \$1,836,726 in franchise taxes in 2017. Tom reported that \$11,525 in RMP sponsorships went to the Iron County Fair. Lions club Kite Flight, Rotary Club events, Happy Factory, Cedar City Area Chamber, Livestock & Heritage Festival and the Orchestra of Southern Utah all received support from RMP. In-Kind Community work in the amount of \$7,200 for the Iron County Fair Ground light poles, Cedar City Ball Park lights and the Thunder Ridge Scout Camp was also provided. The RMP Foundation gave \$51,000 to the Shakespeare Festival, SUU Scholarships, SWATC Scholarships, Cedar City Hospital and others. Tom expressed that RMP was pleased to be a part of Iron County. A total of 7,194,477 kilowatt-hours were saved for all business projects in Iron

County with a total of \$336,927 of incentives paid through the RMP program, "Wattsmart." This amount did not include all the residential energy saving initiatives that were implemented inside Iron County. Dale Brinkerhoff asked what was happening with net-metering agreements for rooftop solar customers. Tom explained that RMP desired to support rooftop solar customers, and that net-metering agreements would be revisited. The intent was not to drive rooftop solar out of business, but to find an equitable solution for fair cost sharing.

DISCUSSION OF IRON COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 66 REGARDING THE RENEWAL OF THE FRANCHISE AGREEMENT WITH ROCKY MOUNTAIN POWER

Tom Heaton explained that the existing ordinance was 60 years old. He presented the commission a template for a new ordinance to provide an ongoing franchise agreement with RMP. This would be a 20 year Franchise agreement which would provide RMP legal access to facilities. Iron County would benefit by clarifying who pays for expenses. In the instance of costs relating to welfare or safety, RMP would foot the cost. Also the ordinance as proposed would indemnify Iron County in case of fire caused by electrical equipment, delineate tree trimming, and define the overall operating agreement. Dale Brinkerhoff emphasized that said franchise would be non-exclusive. Alma Adams asked regarding the wording of a "General Utility Easement." Tom Heaton explained that said easement would provide access to existing easement. Tom expressed appreciation for Iron County and suggested that the proposed ordinance be reviewed by the Iron County Attorney's Office and brought back after such review. No further action was taken.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL TO USE \$35,000 OF TOURISM FUNDS TO REPAIR THE ROOF OF THE FESTIVAL HALL

\$35,000 in funds from Tourism was available and Cedar City asked that Iron County assist in replacing the roof on Festival Hall. After being bid upon, the winning bid to replace the roof was \$69,896. Maria Twitchell explained that the only way Iron County could participate was via Restaurant Tax monies. Alma Adams noted that the agreement for operations and maintenance denotes that Cedar City is responsible for such costs. Alma expressed that he was not comfortable using General Fund monies for the project, but if the monies were available in Restaurant Tax, and if the Restaurant Board decided to support it, then he was in favor. Dale Brinkerhoff expressed disdain for the agreement, but that Iron County would be remiss if the Festival Hall were allowed to deteriorate. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to us the \$35,000 of Restaurant Tax described to repair the roof as requested, contingent on the Restaurant Board's authorization. Mike Bleak seconded the motion, also respecting the Restaurant Board's decision. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PERSONNEL

Adrion Walker, Iron County Human Resource (HR) Director, presented for approval a status change for Pierce Robertson from Deputy II to Interim Corporal in the Corrections Department to be effective September 9th. There would be a 5 percent increase only while he was Interim Corporal. Pierce would serve as Interim Corporal for the remainder of Corporal Jerod Hansen's military deployment. Adrion Walker also presented a pay increase for Deputy Jonathan Bettridge for completing and obtaining K9 certifications in the Corrections Department for approval. Per policy this would be a 2 percent increase, effective September 9th. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the changes in personnel as presented. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

NON-DELEGATED ITEMS

COURTHOUSE

Lester reported that the work at the Forebay was complete, and the irrigation water in Parowan was now flowing.

Dale Brinkerhoff discussed a possible site for a new Jail facility. Dale had asked individuals at Southern Utah University to do a feasibility study by Thanksgiving. He asked for a comparative analysis of 4 parcels. Sheriff Gower expressed that performing a feasibility study was a good idea.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared adjournment.

An invocation was offered by Bruce Anderson

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the minutes of the Iron County Commission meeting held September 10th, 2018. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Mike Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Chad Nay, Iron County Building Official/Zoning Administrator, reported that building permits in unincorporated areas were on track to exceed the all-time high of 337. In September, there were 242, and there were sufficient permits in work to surpass the record. In incorporated areas where Iron County provides building inspection services, there had been 309 building permits.

Steve Platt, Iron County Engineer, reported that the Engineer budget was on track. Steve reported that chip sealing on the Kane Springs road was nearly complete, but he was in need of fencing to be completed as part of the land exchanges made by adjacent property owners in order to widen the road. Typically, the prison work crew would provide these services, but the work crew was not functioning. On the Vandenberge Road, Steve said he had to hire the fence work to be completed. Regarding Revised Statute 2477 (RS-2477) roads, the Utah State Attorney General was still gathering depositions of older residents who had memories of using the forest roads in question. Alma Adams asked how many depositions remained to be taken. Steve Platt answered that there were about 15. In Sunset Subdivision, Dan Bremmer was currently the Homeowners Association President, and they were exploring the costs of establishing a special assessment area to improve the roads. Regarding monies from the Natural Resource Conservation (NRCS) for flood channel repair and hardening, Steve reported that \$2 million had been spent on repairing and restoring the Forebay pond, and repairs of the Parowan flood channel. Additionally, there was another \$1 million to use on Little Creek and Red Creek above Paragonah Town. Steve expressed concern that the Upper Basin Road on Cedar Mountain might be closed by a hunting conglomerate that had been buying parcels and had locked the gate. Steve and the commissioners agreed that efforts to coordinate with Washington County to keep the road open to public access should be taken. Steve reported having travelled the Red Canyon Development to observe roads and conditions there. Alma Adams noted that the development had been laid out in 1972, and that the roads had never been brought up to code. Because the roads in Red Canyon were very steep, and lacking proper improvements, Iron County would not participate. On the planned Belt Route in the Cedar Valley area, a website where public

discussed. Finally Steve discussed with the commissioners that South Central was providing fiber optic lines around the Escalante dessert.

Preston Nelson, Roads Superintendent, reported that the Road Department had been patching roads, had chip-sealed the Kane Springs and Fife Town new roads for a total of 4 miles of chipping. They also completed 25 miles of chip-seal on existing roads. All of the chipping had also been fogged. Preston reported that Iron County had completed its portion of an upgrade to Exit 75 on I-15 at Parowan. The Road Department was in the process of working on Rollo Lane, removing culverts that were collapsing on Bulldog Road, striping, and building up subgrade on Vandenberg Road. Preston noted that he was eager to get a bid out to crush gravel in the newly acquired pit on Vandenberg Road from Cedar City.

Bruce Anderson, Landfill Supervisor, reported that the Landfill remained busy. Bruce explained that his budget was in line, except for the need to purchase more residential garbage cans. A newly purchased collection truck was slated to arrive that week. An agreement with Brian Head Town was completed, whereby Brian Head Town would collect the garbage in some mountain communities that were unincorporated during summer months. He reported that there had been a serious fire in the C & D (Construction and Demolition) pit, but that it was now out and the pit was open once more. Bruce noted that most of the equipment was working well, but many breakdowns continued to happen with the collection trucks.

Cindy Bulloch, Iron County Assessor, reported that the Assessor's office continued to be busy. Cindy reported that the Assessor's Office budget was on track. A parcel and building tracking program called Pictometry was working well, and had been shared with other offices. She expressed appreciation for Carrie Christensen and Dan Jessen for all of their help in processing the 207 Board of Equalization (BOE) appeals in 2018. Cindy noted that building permits were up, and that they represented a cumulative increase in workload for the Assessor's Office because the buildings needed to be accounted for as built, but also over time. She expressed that her staff, while young, was working hard. Cindy ended with a plea that the commissioners support the prison work crew, as landowners who had exchanged land to widen roadways were technically out of compliance with the Utah Farmland Assessment Act (Greenbelt) until the fences could be rebuilt.

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, reported that they had met with the newly formed audit committee. Mike Spilker from Hinton Burdick reported the findings of the external audit to the audit committee. Dan noted that it was time to go through the Request for Proposal (RFP) process for the external audit. He noted that the Board of Equalization (BOE) had been successful. They had hired 2 appraisers in case of conflict. Dan expressed that the process was impartial, even though it could get intense at times. He expressed that it was an essential opportunity for taxpayers to voice their concerns if values are unfair. Dan noted that abatements continued, with more to come later in the meeting. A representative from the Utah State Auditor's Office would be on site later in 2018 to focus on internal controls. He reported that budget meetings would be starting that week. Finally, Dan noted that flies had returned to the upstairs of the courthouse, and were accumulating in the light fixtures.

WEST OLD HIGHWAY 91 (S1/2 NW1/4 SEC.32, T36S, R11W, SLBM). APPLICANT: JEFF MIDDLETON/B-RAFF DEVELOPMENT

Mike Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared a Public Hearing open to discuss a zoning change. Reed Erickson explained that the requested zone change was within a defined Growth Area for Cedar City. Reed noted that the zone change had been approved by the Planning Commission. He explained that if the zone change were to take place, then the owners would effect a lot line adjustment. Cindy Bulloch asked what the purpose of the zone change was. Reed Erickson explained that the owner desired to build manufactured homes on the property. After Reed's explanation, no public comments were offered. Mike Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the Public Hearing closed. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the zoning change as explained. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Mike Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

William Pressgrove, a citizen of Iron County, noted that per the Table of Uses for his zoning, he was not allowed to store flammable materials such as a woodpile or a propane tank. He noted that the uses were listed as Incidental and Customary. He relayed that he had been instructed to bring up his concern before the Iron County Planning Commission which was the proper venue. Mr. Pressgrove understood that to get on the agenda there, he would have to pay a fee. He expressed that it was unjust to have to pay a fee just to have an item discussed that should be a common sense correction. Mr. Pressgrove appealed to the commissioners as elected officials to review the issue, not appointed officials.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL TO GRANT AN EASEMENT FOR AN ELECTRIC TRANSMISSION LINE ACROSS LAND OWNED BY IRON COUNTY

Joe Tippetts, TransWest Associate General Counsel, presented the request for an easement over Assessor's Parcel Number (APN): E-1523-1-2-1, of which Iron County owned an undivided 2/3 interest. Joe explained that the easement was part of a 500 Kilovolt (KV) Direct Current (DC) transmission line from Wyoming to the Hoover Dam. He noted that the easement requested was 250 feet wide and included two towers, 120 feet tall. In terms of acreage, the easement would cover about 17 acres. Mr. Tippetts noted that TransWest was offering 100% of the fee value of the land, which in this case, was \$18,140. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the easement as explained. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Mike Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE APPROVAL OF IRON COUNTY ORDINANCE 2018-3, DEFINING "SIGNIFICANT PARCEL FOR THE PURPOSES OF DISPOSING OF REAL PROPERTY PER UTAH CODE ANNOTATED (UCA) § 17-50-312

Jon Whittaker explained that Utah Code Annotated § 17-50-312 required counties to define what constituted a "Significant Parcel," and what "Reasonable Notice" was required before disposing of a significant parcel of land. Jon noted that, Ordinance 2018-2 defined a significant parcel as to be a parcel of real property whose assessed value by the Iron County Assessor at the time Iron County acquired said parcel to be \$10,000 or greater. Furthermore, the Ordinance defined reasonable notice as publishing in a newspaper of general circulation, the Utah Public Notice Website (www.pmn.utah.gov), and the Iron County Courthouse, notice of an opportunity for public comment for at least 14 days. He explained that most parcels on the surplus property list would not qualify to be significant parcels under that definition, thus allowing sales from the surplus property list. Michael Edwards noted that in UCA § 17-50-312(4) it state that the "the county"

312(4) it state that the "the county legislative body shall provide by ordinance, resolution, rule, or regulation for the manner in which property shall be acquired, managed, and disposed of," and that such should be included in the Ordinance. No action was taken.

APPROVAL TO SELL PARCEL APN: B-1180, #82534

Jon Whittaker explained that the parcel in question was a skinny parcel under which ran an irrigation ditch. The parcel was adjacent to land that was to be developed, and the developer sought to bury the ditch for safety and aesthetic reasons. The parcel was in the North Field Road area of Cedar City. Dale Brinkerhoff asked the value of the parcel. Alma Adams concurred that, by law, Iron County must receive fair market value for the parcel. Jon Whittaker explained that an appraisal had been discussed, but was deemed to be nearly the cost of the value of the property. Jim Rushton, Stratum Real Estate, explained that he represented the developer and was in the process of purchasing a similar parcel for \$1,000. Jim had enquired about an appraisal of APN B-1180, but the appraisal would have cost \$2,000, which was what his client was willing to offer. Mr. Rushton explained that part of what his client proposed was to bury and clean up the parcel for beautification and safety purposes. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the sale of APN B-1180 for \$2,000. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Mike Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION, REVIEW AND POSSIBLE RENEWAL OR UPDATE TO "IRON COUNTY POLICY FOR SELLING REAL PROPERTY," DATED OCTOBER 22, 1987

No action was taken on this item.

ORDINANCE 2018-4, GRANTING AN ELECTRIC UTILITY FRANCHISE AND GENERAL UTILITY EASEMENT TO ROCKY MOUNTAIN POWER

Jon Whittaker explained that this ordinance was in relation to the presentation Tom Heaton, Regional Business Manager, made to the commissioners on September 10th. Mr. Heaton had provided a template Ordinance for the Iron County Attorney to review. Michael Edwards expressed no concerns after having reviewed the Ordinance. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to accept Iron County Ordinance 2018-4, granting a non-exclusive franchise to Rocky Mountain Power. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Mike Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

IRON COUNTY ORDINANCE 2018-4

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING AN ELECTRIC UTILITY FRANCHISE AND GENERAL UTILITY EASEMENT TO ROCKY MOUNTAIN POWER

Whereas, Rocky Mountain Power, is a regulated public utility that provides electric power and energy to the citizens of Iron County (the "County") and other surrounding areas;

Whereas, providing electrical power and energy requires the installation, operation and maintenance of power poles and other related facilities to be located within the public ways of the County;

Whereas, the County, pursuant to the provisions of Utah Code Ann. § 17-50-306 has the authority to regulate power line facilities within public ways and to grant to Rocky Mountain Power a general utility easement for the use thereof;

Whereas, the County desires to set forth the terms and conditions by which Rocky Mountain Power shall use the public ways of the County;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE IRON COUNTY COMMISSION AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Grant of Franchise and General Utility Easement. The County hereby grants to Rocky Mountain Power the right, privilege and authority to construct, maintain, operate, upgrade, and relocate its electrical distribution and transmission lines and related appurtenances, including underground conduits and structures, poles, towers, wires, guy anchors, vaults, transformers, transmission lines, and communication lines (collectively referred to herein as "Electric Facilities") in, under, along, over and across the present and future streets, alleys, and rights-of-way, not including County parks, buildings or other spaces not associated with County-owned rights-of-way (collectively referred to herein as "Public Ways") within the County, for the purpose of supplying and transmitting electric power and energy to the inhabitants of the County and persons and corporations beyond the limits thereof.

SECTION 2. Term. The term of this Franchise and General Utility Easement is for fifteen years (15) years commencing on the date of acceptance by the Company as set forth in Section 3 below.

SECTION 3. Acceptance by Company. Within sixty (60) days after the passage of this ordinance by the County, Rocky Mountain Power shall file an unqualified written acceptance thereof, with the County Recorder otherwise the ordinance and the rights granted herein shall be null and void.

SECTION 4. Non-Exclusive Franchise. The right to use and occupy the Public Ways of the County shall be nonexclusive and the County reserves the right to use the Public Ways for itself or any other entity that provides service to County residences; provided, however, that such use shall not unreasonably interfere with Rocky Mountain Power's Electric Facilities or Rocky Mountain Power's rights as granted herein.

SECTION 5. County Regulatory Authority. In addition to the provision herein contained, the County reserves the right to adopt such additional ordinances and regulations as may be deemed necessary in the exercise of its police power for the protection of the health, safety and welfare of its citizens and their properties or exercise any other rights, powers, or duties required or authorized, under the Constitution of the State of Utah, the laws of Utah or County Ordinance.

SECTION 6. Indemnification. The County shall in no way be liable or responsible for any loss or damage to property or any injury to, or death, of any person that may occur in the construction, operation or maintenance by Rocky Mountain Power of its Electric Facilities. Rocky Mountain Power shall indemnify, defend and hold the County harmless from and against claims, demands, liens and all liability or damage of whatsoever kind on account of Rocky Mountain Power's use of the Public Ways within the County, and shall pay the costs of defense plus reasonable attorneys' fees for any claim, demand or lien brought thereunder. The County shall: (a) give prompt written notice to Rocky Mountain Power of any claim, demand or lien with respect to which the County seeks indemnification hereunder; and (b) permit Rocky Mountain Power to assume the defense of such claim, demand, or lien. If such defense is not assumed by Rocky Mountain Power, Rocky Mountain Power shall not be subject to liability for any settlement made without its consent. Notwithstanding any provision hereof to the contrary, Rocky Mountain Power shall not be obligated to indemnify, defend or hold the County harmless to the extent any claim, demand or lien arises out of or in connection with any negligent or willful act or failure to act of the County or any of its officers or employees.

SECTION 7. Annexation.

- 7.1 Extension of County Limits. Upon the annexation of any territory to the County, the rights granted herein shall extend to the annexed territory to the extent the County has such authority. All Electrical Facilities owned, maintained, or operated by Rocky Mountain Power located within any public ways of the annexed territory shall thereafter be subject to all of the terms hereof.
- 7.2 <u>Notice of Annexation</u>. When any territory is approved for annexation to the County, the County shall, not later than ten (10) working days after passage of an ordinance approving the proposed annexation, provide by certified mail to Rocky Mountain Power: (a) each site address to be annexed as recorded on county assessment and tax rolls; (b) a legal description of the proposed boundary change; and (c) a copy of the County's ordinance approving the proposed annexation. The notice shall be mailed to:

SECTION 8. Plan, Design, Construction and Installation of Company Facilities.

- 8.1 All Electrical Facilities installed or used under authority of this Franchise shall be used, constructed and maintained in accordance with applicable federal, state and county laws, codes and regulations.
- 8.2 Except in the case of an emergency, Rocky Mountain Power shall, prior to commencing new construction or major reconstruction work in the Public Ways, apply for any permit from the County as may be required by the County's ordinances, which permit shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned, or delayed. Rocky Mountain Power will abide by all applicable ordinances and all reasonable rules, regulations and requirements of the County, and the County may inspect the manner of such work and require remedies as may be reasonably necessary to assure compliance. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Rocky Mountain Power shall not be obligated to obtain a permit to perform emergency repairs.
- 8.3 All Electric Facilities shall be located so as to cause minimum interference with the Public Ways of the County and shall be constructed, installed, maintained, cleared of vegetation, renovated or replaced in accordance with applicable rules, ordinances and regulations of the County.
- 8.4 If, during the course of work on its Electrical Facilities, Rocky Mountain Power causes damage to or alters the Public Way or public property, Rocky Mountain Power shall (at its own cost and expense and in a manner reasonably approved by the County) replace and restore it in as good a condition as existed before the work commenced.
- 8.5 In addition to the installation of underground electric distribution lines as provided by applicable state law and regulations, Rocky Mountain Power shall, upon payment of all charges provided in its tariffs or their equivalent, place newly constructed electric distribution lines underground as may be required by County ordinance.
- The County shall have the right without cost to use all poles and suitable overhead structures owned by Rocky Mountain Power within Public Ways for County wires used in connection with its fire alarms, police signal systems, or other public safety communication lines used for governmental purposes; provided, however, any such uses shall be for activities owned, operated or used by the County for a public purpose and shall not include the provision of CATV, internet, or similar services to the public. Provided further, that Rocky Mountain Power shall assume no liability nor shall it incur, directly or indirectly, any additional expense in connection therewith, and the use of said poles and structures by the County shall be in such a manner as to prevent safety hazards or interferences with Rocky Mountain Power's use of same. Nothing herein shall be construed to require Rocky Mountain Power to increase pole size, or alter the manner in which Rocky Mountain Power attaches its equipment to poles, or alter the manner in which it operates and maintains its Electric Facilities. County attachments shall be installed and maintained in accordance with the reasonable requirements of Rocky Mountain Power and the current edition Further, County of the National Electrical Safety Code pertaining to such construction. attachments shall be attached or installed only after written approval by Rocky Mountain Power in conjunction with Rocky Mountain Power's standard pole attachment application process. Rocky Mountain Power shall have the right to inspect, at the County's expense, such attachments to ensure compliance with this Section 8.6 and to require the County to remedy any defective attachments.

- 8.7 Rocky Mountain Power shall have the right to excavate the Public Rights of Ways subject to reasonable conditions and requirements of the County. Before installing new underground conduits or replacing existing underground conduits, Rocky Mountain Power shall first notify the County of such work by written notice and shall allow the County, at its own expense, (to include a pro rata share of the trenching costs), to share the trench of Rocky Mountain Power to lay its own conduit therein, provided that such action by the County will not unreasonably interfere with Rocky Mountain Power's Electrical Facilities or delay project completion.
- 8.8 Before commencing any street improvements or other work within a Public Way that may affect Rocky Mountain Power's Electric Facilities, the County shall give written notice to Rocky Mountain Power.

SECTION 9. Relocations of Electric Facilities.

9.1 The County reserves the right to require Rocky Mountain Power to relocate its Electric Facilities within the Public Ways in the interest of public convenience, necessity, health, safety or welfare at no cost to the County. Within a reasonable period of time after written notice, Rocky Mountain Power shall promptly commence the relocation of its Electrical Facilities. Before requiring a relocation of Electric Facilities, the County shall, with the assistance and consent of Rocky Mountain Power, identify a reasonable alignment for the relocated Electric Facilities within the Public Ways of the County.

The County shall assign or otherwise transfer to Company all right it may have to recover the cost for the relocation work and shall support the efforts of Rocky Mountain Power to obtain reimbursement.

9.2 Rocky Mountain Power shall not be obligated to pay the cost of any relocation that is required or made a condition of a private development. If the removal or relocation of facilities is caused directly or otherwise by an identifiable development of property in the area, or is made for the convenience of a customer, Rocky Mountain Power may charge the expense of removal or relocation to the developer or customer. For example, Rocky Mountain Power shall not be required to pay relocation costs in connection with a road widening or realignment where the road project is made a condition of or caused by a private development.

SECTION 10. <u>Subdivision Plat Notification</u>. Before the County approves any new subdivision and before recordation of the plat, the County shall obtain Rocky Mountain Power's approval of Electrical Facilities, including underground facilities to be installed by the developer, and associated rights of way depicted on the plat. A copy of the plat shall be mailed for approval to Rocky Mountain Power:

SECTION 11. <u>Vegetation Management.</u> Rocky Mountain Power or its contractor may prune all trees and vegetation which overhang the Public Ways, whether such trees or vegetation originate within or outside the Public Ways to prevent the branches or limbs or other part of such trees or vegetation from interfering with Rocky Mountain Power's Electrical Facilities. Such pruning shall comply with the *American National Standard for Tree Care Operation (ANSI A300)* and be conducted under the direction of an arborist certified with the International Society of

Arboriculture. A growth inhibitor treatment may be used for trees and vegetation species that are fast-growing and problematic. Nothing contained in this Section shall prevent Rocky Mountain Power, when necessary and with the approval of the owner of the property on which they may be located, from cutting down and removing any trees which overhang streets.

SECTION 12. Renewal. At least 120 days prior to the expiration of this Franchise, Rocky Mountain Power and the County either shall agree to extend the term of this Franchise for a mutually acceptable period of time or the parties shall use best faith efforts to renegotiate a replacement Franchise. Rocky Mountain Power shall have the continued right to use the Public Ways of the County as set forth herein in the event an extension or replacement Franchise is not entered into upon expiration of this Franchise.

SECTION 13. <u>No Waiver.</u> Neither the County nor Rocky Mountain Power shall be excused from complying with any of the terms and conditions of this Franchise by any failure of the other, or any of its officers, employees, or agents, upon any one or more occasions to insist upon or to seek compliance with any such terms and conditions.

SECTION 14. Transfer of Franchise. Rocky Mountain Power shall not transfer or assign any rights under this Franchise to another entity, except transfers and assignments by operation of law, or to affiliates, parents or subsidiaries of Rocky Mountain Power which assume all of Rocky Mountain Power's obligations hereunder, unless the County shall first give its approval in writing, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed; provided, however, Rocky Mountain Power may assign, mortgage. pledge, hypothecate or otherwise transfer without consent its interest in this Franchise to any financing entity, or agent on behalf of any financing entity to whom Rocky Mountain Power (1) has obligations for borrowed money or in respect of guaranties thereof, (ii) has obligations evidenced by bonds, debentures, notes or similar instruments, or (iii) has obligations under or with respect to letters of credit, bankers acceptances and similar facilities or in respect of guaranties thereof.

SECTION 15. Amendment. At any time during the term of this Franchise, the County through its County Council, or Rocky Mountain Power may propose amendments to this Franchise by giving thirty (30) days written notice to the other party of the proposed amendment(s) desired, and both parties thereafter, through their designated representatives, will, within a reasonable time, negotiate in good faith in an effort to agree upon mutually satisfactory amendment(s). No amendment or amendments to this Franchise shall be effective until mutually agreed upon by the County and Rocky Mountain Power and formally adopted as an ordinance amendment, which is accepted in writing by Rocky Mountain Power.

SECTION 16. Notices. Unless otherwise specified herein, all notices from Rocky Mountain Power to the County pursuant to or concerning this Franchise shall be delivered to the County Recorder's Office. Unless otherwise specified herein, all notices from the County to Rocky Mountain Power pursuant to or concerning this Franchise shall be delivered to the Regional Business Management Director, Rocky Mountain Power, 70 North 200 East, Room 122, American Fork, Utah, 84003, and such other office as Rocky Mountain Power may advise the County of by written notice.

SECTION 17. <u>Severability</u>. If any section, sentence, paragraph, term or provision hereof is for any reason determined to be illegal, invalid, or superseded by other lawful authority including any state or federal regulatory authority having jurisdiction thereof or unconstitutional, illegal or invalid by any court of common jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct, and

independent provision and such determination shall have no effect on the validity of any other section, sentence, paragraph, term or provision hereof, all of which will remain in full force and effect for the term of the Franchise or any renewal or renewals thereof.

SECTION 18. Waiver of Jury Trial. To the fullest extent permitted by law, each of the parties hereto waives any right it may have to a trial by jury in respect of litigation directly or indirectly arising out of, under or in connection with this agreement. Each party further waives any right to consolidate any action in which a jury trial has been waived with any other action in which a jury trial cannot be or has not been waived.

Mike Bleak, Iron County Commission Chairman, declared a Public Hearing open to receive comments regarding amendments to the Iron County Resource Management Plan as part of the Iron County General Plan. This Ordinance has to do with the management of Inventoried Roadless Areas (IRA's) within the Dixie National Forest. No public comments were offered. Alma Adams made a motion to approve Iron County Ordinance 2018-2 as explained. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Mike Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

IRON COUNTY ORDINANCE 2018-2

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF IRON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, PROVIDING FOR AMENDMENTS TO THE IRON COUNTY RESOURCE MANAGEMENT PLAN AS PART OF THE GENERAL PLAN OF IRON COUNTY, UTAH (the "General Plan"); INCORPORATING MANAGEMENT PROVISIONS ON INVENTORIED ROADLESS AREAS (IRAs) ON THE DIXIE NATIONAL FOREST; SETTING POLICY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Whereas, in order to provide for the health, safety and general welfare of the citizens of Iron County, Utah, the County commission is committed to establish and keep current a General Plan that specifies goals relating to the land use of private and public lands, housing, the environment, transportation, public facilities and services and policies that facilitate those goals; and

Whereas, on June 26, 2017, the County Commission adopted amendments to the General Plan of Iron County, Utah as Ordinance 2017-3 incorporating the Iron County Resource Management Plan into the General Plan in accordance with the provisions of Utah Code Annotated relating to the adoption, amendments and content of General Plans in the State of Utah; and

Whereas, on May 24, 2018, Utah Governor Herbert sent a letter to Secretary of Agriculture, George Ervin Perdue notifying him that Utah is considering petitioning the Department of Agriculture to engage with the State of Utah to develop new management provisions for the State's Inventoried Roadless Areas (IRAs) as allowed under the 2001 Roadless rule. To that end, the counties have been asked to gather information on each IRA within their jurisdiction and make suggested management provision to the Public Lands Policy Coordination Office, where the statewide petition will be drafted; and

Whereas, Iron County has a total of ten IRAs within the county or shared with adjacent counties. To help determine what could be done within the IRAs to benefit forest health, public safety, grazing and wildlife, representatives from the county met with the Dixie National Forest Service and the State of Utah Division of Forestry, Fire and State Lands personnel to review current conditions and discuss some potential management strategies; and

Whereas, the guidance for the Proposed Management Area Categories provided by the State of Utah and the local knowledge of the individual IRAs were used to determine which category each IRA would best fit. Management strategies were developed based on the threat fire poses to property and resources (water), forest health, and accessibility; and

Whereas, the Planning Commission of Iron County has held a duly advertised and noticed public hearing on the proposed amendments to the County Resource Management Plan for the purpose of receiving public comment regarding the content of the amendments and has forwarded a recommendation to the County Commission that the October 2018 Amendments and Management Provisions on IRAs on the Dixie National Forest, be adopted; and

Whereas, the County Commission of Iron County has held a duly advertised and noticed public hearing on the proposed 2018 Amendments of the Iron County Resource Management Plan/Iron County General Plan addressing management provisions on IRAs on the Dixie National Forest for the purpose of receiving public comment regarding the content of the amendments and has carefully and thoroughly reviewed and considered those comments and the planning commission recommendation and the County Commission concludes that the proposed ordinance appropriately considers and balances the general

public good with the purposes and goals of the Iron County General Plan and the September 2018 Amendments to the Iron County Resource Management Plan/Iron County General Plan herein proposed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF IRON COUNTY, UTAH AS FOLLOWS:

 The document "September 2018 Amendments to the Iron County Resource Management Plan/Iron County General Plan" attached hereto is hereby adopted, with necessary formatting, grammatical and spelling revisions as required.

- 2. The Section entitled "USFS Roadless Areas (Forest Service)" of the Iron County Resource Management Plan adopted by Ordinance 2017-3 is hereby repealed and replaced with the "September 2018 Amendments to the Iron County Resource Management Plan/Iron County General Plan"
- 3. All ordinances adopted subsequent to the September 2018 Amendments shall comply with the goals and policies of the General Plan of Iron County, Utah and Iron County Resource Management Plan, as amended by the September 2018 Amendments.
- 4. The provisions of the September 2018 Amendments shall supersede any inconsistent provisions in the existing General Plan.
- This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage by a majority vote of the Iron County Board of County Commissioners and following notice and publication as required by law.
- 6. Should any portion of this ordinance be found for any reason to be unconstitutional, unlawful, or otherwise void or unenforceable, the balance of the ordinance shall be severable therefrom, and shall survive such declaration, remaining in full force and effect.
- 7. The provisions of this ordinance shall be, and hereby are, adopted with the express intent of promoting management provisions to the State of Utah Public Lands Policy Coordination Office, where a statewide petition will be drafted to help determine what could be done within the IRAs to benefit forest health, public safety, grazing and wildlife, and address the threat fire poses to property and resources (including water), forest health, and accessibility.

NOTICE OF ANNEXATION OF PARCEL INTO CEDAR CITY FOR MARK MEISNER/JUDD LOCATED IN THE SOUTH 1/2 OF SEC. 32, T35S, R11W, SLB&M

Arlo Fawson, GO Civil Engineering gave notice of an impending annexation into Cedar City, located in the South 1/2 of Section 32, Township 35 South, Range 11 West, Salt Lake Base and Meridian. Mr. Fawson noted that the annexation had already been brought before Cedar City Corporation, who voiced their assent. Because this item was for information only, no action was taken.

CONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

Mike Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the Iron County Board of Equalization.

DISCUSS AND APPROVE APPLICATIONS FOR LOW INCOME, HOMEOWNERS TAX CREDITS, BLIND AND VETERANS ABATEMENTS FOR THE 2017 TAX YEAR

Christene Lowder, Chief Deputy Auditor, explained that there were 4 types of abatements: Veterans, Blind, Special, and Circuit Breaker. Veterans' abatements were for veterans with a service-connected disability of 10% or more and are a full-time county resident. Blind abatements were for those who were legally blind. Special abatements were for those age 65 or younger who were disabled or under hardship. Circuit Breaker abatements were for those age 66 or older that met certain income obligations or were widows or widowers. Christene explained that the reimbursable amount from Circuit Breaker abatements thus far was \$171,848.89 and would likely increase. She reported that Iron County had abated a total of \$820,462.53. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the total abatements in the amount of \$820,462.53. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Mike Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

REQUEST, REVIEW, AND APPROVAL OF HEARING OFFICERS' RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE APPEALS FILED WITH THE BOARD OF EQUALIZATION (BOE)

Carrie Christensen, Deputy Auditor, noted that 2018 was close to an all-time low in Board of Equalization (BOE) appeals, with a total of 207 appeal applications, with a total taxable value adjustment of \$5,969,285. Carrie noted that, by lowering the values in that way, Iron County's General Fund revenue would decrease by \$9,837.38, while the Municipal Services would decrease by \$3,396.28 for a total reduction of \$13,233.66. Alma Adams made a motion to approve the Hearing Officers' recommendations for the appeals filed with the Board of Equalization. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Mike Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

RECONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY COMMISSION

Mike Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the reconvening of the Iron County Commission.

DISCUSSION AND APPROVAL TO MODIFY AN EXISTING LANDSCAPING CONTRACT FOR THE COURTHOUSE TO INCLUDE AN IDENTIFYING SIGN

Lester Ross explained that he wished to modify an existing contract with MJ Landscaping for Courthouse landscaping to also include an identifying sign. Lester estimated that adding the sign to the existing contract would cost \$14,075. UTAH'S PATCHWORK PARKWAY ANNUAL REPORT

PERSONNEL

Adrion Walker presented the new hire of Taylor Dunn as a Corrections Deputy, effective September 24th, for approval. This was a backfill of a vacant position. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Those assembled were led in the pledge of allegiance by Lori Eichelberger.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Danny Stewart.

Commission Chair Michael Bleak excused Commissioner Alma Adams.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the minutes of October 8, 2018. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Scott Garrett, Iron County Attorney, reported that the budget was on track. The statistics show that it was a busy year. Felony cases were at 437 estimated thus far, with a projected 500 for the year. Task force cases were up at 136 thus far with an estimated 150-185 for the year. Child homicide cases were at 2. Scott noted that his office was in the process of assisting the filing an Opioid complaint lawsuit by Durham, Jones & Pinegar.

Stephanie Furnival, Iron County Children's Justice Court (CJC) Director, reported that the fiber optics was completed, which should save \$3,600 per year. Dancing with the stars Nov 5th fund raiser was upcoming. Scott Phillips was now the producer of it with Fred Adams, Mindy Benson, Mayor Wilson as judges. There was a commercial based on the Greatest Showman starring Mike Bleak and Tyler Allred which was showing in all the local theaters and on social media. Wyatt Larsen produced the commercial. In 2017, the fundraiser netted \$20,000. Stephanie noted that the community was now becoming sponsors, and the goal was \$40,000 for 2018. There was also a golf tournament fundraiser sponsored by Pastry Pub. They were in the process of interviews to fill Victims' Advocates positions.

Jared Wilson, Iron County Information Technology (IT) Supervisor, reported that the budget was on track. Worker orders were at 3042 to date. Projects completed: Incode utility billing, Incode Account Receivable, upgraded servers (Eagle, Incode and Mitel), upgrades to networking routers and switches. Jared noted that current projects included: Updating the fair exhibit software, Tyler Content Manager installation and training, updates to Assessors' Office webpage, implementation of MCAD, and Color County Trail System, had gone live.

Nicole Rosenberg, Iron County Treasurer, reported that KUTV called and interviewed her. She noted that Iron County had the highest delinquent taxes in state due primarily to Black Iron. Tax notices had been sent out. The "Data Center" printing company was ahead of schedule. Collections going well. Pooled cash report was at \$30 Million. Interest rates were doing well and helped interest income with over \$470,000 already collected in 2018. Budget was on track. The transition to Incode 10 was nearly complete. Nicole expressed her thanks to her office staff with all the hard work that they do.

Lori Eichelberger, Iron County Justice Court, reported that Judge Miller was back in the office and doing well. The budget was on track. Lori noted that there were 7 full time clerks, 1 full time judge and 1 part time judge. Thank you to the IT department for the small claims forms being put on line. She noted that year to date, there had been 4,500 moving violations file, with almost 2,000 in the 3rd quarter alone. Lori reported roughly \$1.5 Million in total revenue.

Debbie Johnson, Iron County Recorder, noted with glee that this would be her last report given as the Iron County Recorder. Debbie explained that her Retirement was coming in November. The Interim Recorder was to be named on Thursday. She expressed that it had been a wonderful position and was grateful for the opportunity to work with Iron County. She reported that Notices of Default were down, revenue was slightly up, and her budget was on track. All documents were now scanned.

Blaine Nay, Iron County Bee Inspector, explained that Utah beehives required inspection. Blaine reported having visited half of the hives and focus to work with new bee keepers and those having problems. He noted that bee health problem with a parasite mite imported from Asia. Blaine explained that there were 57 viruses that affected bees. He also discussed mites that affect bees and bacteria and spores. Solutions to these problems range from using bleach and formic acid to burning the hive and burying it in extreme cases.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

No public comments were offered.

CONVENE AS THE IRON COUNTY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND RENEWAL AGENCY (ICCD&RA)

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the ICCD&RA.

PUBLIC HEARING ON THE DRAFT PROJECT AREA PLAN AND DRAFT PROJECT AREA BUDGET FOR THE FIDDLER'S CANYON SOLAR COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT PROJECT AREA

Adam Long, attorney with Smith Hartvigsen, PLLC and counsel for the ICCD&RA, explained that the public hearing was for the Fiddlers Canyon for three, three megawatts solar projects. Adam noted that all required notices had been delivered. The upcoming Resolution wasto approve the Project Area Plan, and the next Resolution was to approve the Project Area Budget. Adam explained that with the redefinition of SunEdison, Phase 1 Solar, the Fiddlers Canyon projects had been left without a project area. He emphasized that the ICCD&RA was under no obligation to offer the incentives because the solar plants in question were already created and did not require enticement. Adam did acknowledge the sense of fairness the board was employing with the Fiddlers Canyon projects

Michael Bleak declared the public hearing on the draft Project Area Plan and draft project on items 2 through 5 open. No public comments were offered. Commissioner Bleak declared the Public Hearing closed.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING AND ADOPTING THE COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT PROJECT AREA PLAN FOR THE FIDDLER'S CANYON SOLAR COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT PROJECT AREA.

Whereas, pursuant to the provisions of the Utah Limited Purpose Local Government Entities - Community Reinvestment Agency Act (the "Act"), specifically Utah Code Annotated ("UCA") § 17C-5, the Iron County Community Development and Renewal Agency (the "Agency") adopted a resolution on January 8, 2018 designating a survey area, which was to become the Fiddler's Canyon Solar Community Reinvestment Project Area ("Project Area"), and calling for the preparation of a project area plan and budget; and

Whereas, the draft Project Area Plan (the "Draft Plan"), having been prepared for the Project Area pursuant to UCA § 17C-5-105, the Agency held, on October 22, 2018, a duly noticed public hearing pursuant to UCA § 17C-5-104 to allow public comment on the Draft Plan and whether it should be revised, approved, or rejected; and to receive all written and hear all oral objections to the Draft Plan; and

Whereas, having received and heard all commentary on and objections, orally and in writing, to the Draft Plan submitted for its consideration, the Agency has passed upon such objections as it has received and has made such modifications, amendments, and/or emendations to the Draft Plan as it deems appropriate, if any; and

Whereas, the Agency has made relevant findings concerning the amount of opposition, if any, to the Draft Plan by owners of real property within the Project Area.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE IRON COUNTY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND RENEWAL AGENCY AS FOLLOWS:

1. Legal Description.

The boundaries of the Project Area are described in the Project Area Plan, attached hereto as **Exhibit A**.

2. The Agency's Purposes and Intent with Respect to the Project Area.

The purposes and intent of the Agency with respect to the Project Area are as follows:

- 2.1. To satisfy the purposes of the Act, as defined therein, by promoting, creating, and/or retaining jobs through the planning, design, development, construction, rehabilitation, or business relocation within the Project Area, as well as the provision of office, industrial, manufacturing, warehousing, distribution, parking, public, or other facilities, or other improvements that benefit the state or a community;
- **2.2.** to increase the County's tax base as well as its commercial front so as to improve both opportunity and quality of life for all of its citizens;
- **2.3.** to promote, encourage, and bring to fruition, the development within the Project Area of a commercial development comprised of up-scale, reputable commercial concerns;
 - 2.4. to stimulate the economy within the Project Area and in the surrounding area;
- **2.5.** to provide for the installation of needed infrastructure, if and as necessary, for development within the Project Area;
- **2.6.** to take any or all additional steps which may be appropriate or necessary to promote or further the aim of improving the Project Area (and, indirectly, of surrounding areas).

3. Designation, Adoption, and Incorporation of the Plan.

The Draft Plan for the Project Area (attached as **Exhibit A**) is hereby designated the Official Plan for the Fiddler's Canyon Solar Community Reinvestment Project Area (the "Official Plan"), and is incorporated herein by this reference.

The Agency hereby officially approves and adopts the Official Plan for the Fiddler's Canyon Solar Community Reinvestment Project Area.

4. Required Findings.

- **4.1.** A need exists to effectuate a public purpose; to wit, the exercise of the statutorily enacted community reinvestment mechanism for the benefit of the citizens of Iron County.
- **4.2.** Benefit to the public shall accrue from the execution of the Official Plan, as each project undertaken thereunder shall be subject to the analysis described in Utah Code § 17C-5-105(2).
- **4.3.** The adoption and carrying out of the Official Plan is economically sound and feasible.
 - 4.4. The Official Plan conforms to the County's General Plan.
- **4.5.** Carrying out the Official Plan will promote the public peace, health, safety, and welfare of the Iron County and its residents.

5. Submission of the Official Plan to the Iron County Commission for Adoption by Ordinance.

5.1. Pursuant to Utah Code §§ 17C-5-104 & -109, the Agency Board hereby submits the Official Plan to the Iron County Commission for review and adoption.

6. Recording and Transmittal.

- **6.1.** Pursuant to Utah Code § 17C-5-111, Agency Staff are hereby directed and authorized to take the following actions within 30 days after adoption of the Official Plan by the Iron County Commission:
- a. to record with the Iron County Recorder a document containing a description of the land within the Project Area, a statement that the Official Plan for the Project Area has been adopted; and the date of its adoption by the Iron County Commission; and
- b. to transmit a copy of the description of the land within the Project Area, a copy of the County ordinance adopting the Official Plan, and a map indicating the boundaries of the Project Area to each of the following: (i) the auditor and assessor of the county in which the Project Area is located; (ii) the officer or officers performing the function of auditor or assessor for each taxing entity, if any, that does not use the county assessment roll or collect its taxes through the county; (iii) the legislative body or governing board of each taxing entity; (iv) the State Tax Commission; and (v) the State Board of Education.

7. Execution of the Plan.

7.1. Following adoption of the Official Plan by the Iron County Commission, the Agency shall proceed to carry out the Plan.

8. Directions to Agency Staff.

8.1. The Agency staff are hereby directed and authorized to take all such actions as necessary to effectuate the purposes and aims of this resolution.

9. Effective Date

9.1. This Resolution shall take effect upon its adoption.

- 4. This ordinance takes effect upon publication and recording, but not sooner than 15 days from this date.

REQUEST FOR A DONATION FOR THE SENIOR COMPANION AND FOSTER GRANDPARENT PROGRAMS

JoAnne Lyman, Senior Companion and Foster Grandparent Program Director, explained that Iron County had 17 senior companions and 11 foster grandparents. Scope

This charter is not meant in any way to inhibit, nor reduce the authority granted to the Iron County Auditor granted by Utah State statute to perform his/her audit-related duties.

Mission

The Iron County Board of Commissioners has established an audit committee to provide independent advice, assistance, and recommendations to the Iron County Board of Commissioners in the oversight of the internal and external audit functions of Iron County Government.

Composition and Requisite Skills

The Iron County Audit Committee is comprised of a subset of Iron County Board of Commissioners members. This subset must be less than a quorum of the governing body. This ensures that investigations regarding the work of management, external auditors, and internal auditors remain confidential until reports are made public to the governing body. The committee shall include: one (1) Iron County Commissioner, the Iron County Treasurer, the Iron County Auditor, and member of the public with the following qualifications: 1) is not an employee of Iron County 2) has sufficient financial or audit-related qualifications to be on the committee 3) who neither does business with Iron County nor has within the last 2 years.

The Committee members collectively should possess the knowledge in accounting, auditing, and financial reporting needed to understand and evaluate Iron County's financial statements, the external audit, and the entity's internal audit activities. Accordingly, the Audit Committee's members, collectively, should:

- Possess the requisite knowledge necessary to understand technical and complex financial reporting issues.
- Have the ability to communicate with auditors, public finance officers and the governing body.
- Be knowledgeable about internal controls, financial statement audits and management/operational audits.
- If no audit committee members have sufficient personal internal control or finance knowledge, the committee must gain this knowledge via a financial expert (either volunteer or paid) advisor.
 - The financial expert advisor must:
 - Be independent of management
 - Be present for meetings
 - Not be a member of the audit committee
 - Not vote on committee actions

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Iron County Audit Committee include the following:

• External Audit Focus

- Provide recommendations regarding the selection of the external auditor
- Meet with the external auditor prior to commencement of the audit to, among other things, review the engagement letter.
- Review and discuss with the external auditor any risk assessment of the entity's fiscal operations developed as part of the auditor's responsibilities under governmental auditing standards for a financial statement audit and federal single audit standards, if applicable.
- Receive and review the draft annual audit report and accompanying draft
 management letter, including the external auditor's assessment of the entity's
 system of internal controls, and working directly with the external auditor, assist
 the governing body in interpreting such documents.

- Make a recommendation to the governing body on accepting the annual audit report.
- Review every corrective action plan developed by Iron County management and assist the governing body in the implementation of such plans.

• Internal Audit Focus

- Make recommendations to the governing body and regarding the appointment of an internal auditor.
- Assist in the oversight of the internal audit function, including reviewing the annual internal audit plan to ensure that high risk areas and key control activities are periodically evaluated and tested, and reviewing the results of internal audit activities.
- o Review significant recommendations and findings of the internal auditor.
- Monitor management's implementation of the internal auditor's recommendations by management.
- o Participate in the evaluation of the performance of the internal audit function.

Administrative Matters

- Hold regularly scheduled meetings
- o Review and revise the Audit Committee Charter, as necessary.

Membership

The membership duties of the Iron County Audit Committee include the following:

- Good Faith Members of the Committee shall perform their duties in good faith, in a
 manner they reasonably believe to be in the best interests of the Committee and the
 county with such care as a generally prudent person in a similar position would use under
 similar circumstances.
- Independence An individual may not serve on an audit committee if he or she:
 - Is employed by the entity.
 - Currently provides, or within the prior two years, has provided, goods or services to the entity.
 - o Is a family member of an employee or officer.
 - Is the owner of or has a direct and material interest in a company providing goods or services to the entity.
- Confidentiality During the exercise of duties and responsibilities, the Committee
 members may have access to confidential information. The Committee shall have an
 obligation to the entity type to maintain the confidentiality of such information.

Meetings and Notification

The Iron County Audit Committee shall meet a minimum of four (4) times each year. An agenda of each meeting should be clearly determined in advance and the Audit Committee should receive supporting documents in advance, for reasonable review and consideration.

The Audit Committee shall create meeting minutes which include the meeting:

- Agenda
- Time, date, and location
- Attendance
- Findings requiring further investigation
- Items to report to the governing body

Decision-Making Process

All decisions shall be reached by vote of a simple majority of the total membership of the committee. A quorum constitutes a simple majority of the total membership and meetings will not be conducted unless a quorum is present.

Reporting Requirements

The Iron County Audit Committee has the duty and responsibility to report its activities to the Iron County Board of Commissioners as needed, but not less than annually. Periodic written reports of Audit Committee activities are and important communication link between the Audit Committee and the Iron County Board of Commissioners on key decisions and responsibilities. The Audit Committee's reporting requirement are to:

- Report on the scope and breadth of committee activities so that the Iron County Board of Commissioners is kept informed of its work.
- Provide minutes or a summary of minutes of meetings which clearly record the actions and recommendations of the Committee
- Report of their review of Iron Counties draft annual audit report and accompanying management letter and their review of significant findings.
- Report on suspected fraud, waste or abuse, or significant internal control findings and activities of the internal control function.
- Report on indications of material or significant non-compliances with laws or Iron County policies and regulations.
- Report on any other matters that the committee believes should be disclosed to the Iron County Board of Commissioners.

Charter Review

The Iron County Audit Committee shall assess and report to the Iron County Board of Commissioners on the adequacy of this Charter no less than an annual basis or as necessary. Charter modifications, as recommended by the Audit Committee, should be presented to the Iron County Board of Commissioners in writing for their review and action.

Michael Bleak presented new hires David Kwiatkowski and Michael Ferguson as Patrol Deputies in the Sheriff Department for approval, effective October 29th and as backfills of vacant positions; a promotion for Thomas Byrd from Deputy to Corporal in the Sheriff Department for approval, effective October 21st as a backfill of a vacant position; the new hire of Shelby McDonnell as a part-time Bailiff in the Sheriff Department for approval, effective October 24th as a backfill of a vacant position; the new hire of Brionna Garrett as a Victim Advocate Coordinator/Grant Specialist for approval, effective November 4th. This position was funded under the 1984 Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Grant and a new position. This position was required through the office of the attorney general as part of the continuation of the VOCA Grant.

Michael Bleak made a motion to approve new hires David Kwiatkowski and Michael Ferguson as Patrol Deputies in the Sheriff Department for approval, effective October 29th and as backfills of vacant positions; a promotion for Thomas Byrd from Deputy to Corporal in the Sheriff Department for approval, effective October 21st as a backfill of a vacant position; the new hire of Shelby McDonnell as a part-time Bailiff in the Sheriff Department for approval, effective October 24th as a backfill of a vacant position; the new hire of Brionna Garrett as a Victim Advocate Coordinator/Grant Specialist for approval, effective November 4th. A caveat was also placed on the Victim Advocate Coordinator, in that the continuation of the position would be contingent upon state funding moving forward. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Adrion Walker presented the 2019 Employee Insurance Benefit package. Adrion introduced Brenden Krelle from AJG Benefits. He noted that the renewal process was often difficult. After opening to bid, Select Health increased 17.3 percent, which was much higher than expected. After such an increase, other carriers and brokers were invited to prepare bids. Going through the bidding process helps Iron County to maintain the best service for employees. Adrion noted that, because of the process, time was growing short, and there was some urgency to commit to a plan and carrier, and begin the open enrollment period.

Brenden Krelle explained that Gallagher and Iron County had been working together to keep costs down and maintain benefits. Brenden noted that the initial increase of 17.3 percent from Select Health was a large and alarming increase. He proposed that Iron County use PEHP in 2019. Brenden extolled the virtues of PEHP, they already focus on public sector employees covering 333 entities in Utah; they have been in business since 2001, they are non-profit and a trust and will rebate to the members of the trust a percentage if profitable; they have excellent references; they have a 95% provider crossover from the current Iron County system; improved cost transparency; member engagement; diabetic services; and excellent reputation and references in Southern Utah. Brenden noted that with nearly identical plans, the negotiated increase was a 2% increase compared to 2018.

Dental Select increased by 17.85% or roughly \$32,000. Because of the large increase, it was proposed to move to EMI, which would represent a 4.9% or 8,700 increase. The EMI plan offered enhanced benefits, including Endodontics and Periodontics. Vision was also proposed to move to fully insured under EMI.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the 2019 Health Benefit package with PEHP with a 2.3 percent increase totaling \$54,104.00. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

NON-DELEGATED ITEMS

COURTHOUSE

Lester Ross reported that the courthouse landscaping was moving forward. He noted that the goal was to be finished by the end of the week. Much of the xeriscaping rock had been place, and sod was to be placed later in the week. Lester explained that an identifying sign to be placed in the front of the building was moving forward. He did not know when the sign would be completed, but anticipated it taking 1 to 2 days. There would be a light for the flagpole on the back of the sign. A concrete pad had been poured on the southwest corner of the building, and a pavilion would be installed over it in 2018.

Dan Jessen discussed art work for the second floor of the courthouse. He had plans to make 5 similar murals as the first floor, but with more of a horizontal format. Dan explained that mural ideas included Enoch City, The Spanish Trail, the West Desert, the Beryl/Newcastle Area, The Iron County Fair, Three Peaks and/or Woods Ranch, Paragonah and Summit, and Old Iron town. He estimated the cost to be around \$7,000.

Those assembled were led in the pledge of allegiance by George Colson.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Mike Edwards.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

George Colson, Iron County Emergency Management Coordinator, reported the budget was on track. George reported that there was 2015 Grant money left to spend. The Beryl Station Generator proposal was with the Iron County Attorney.

Jon Whittaker, Iron County Clerk, reported that the budget was on track with 41.26 percent remaining. Jon reported that Iron County had a 77 percent turnout for the 2018 General Election. There were many who volunteered to assist on Election Day, which was greatly appreciated. He stated that he was extremely appreciative of his staff for all the sacrifice, extra work and hours put in for a successful election. The Iron County Canvass would be held later in today's commission meeting. All mailed ballots needed to be postmarked the day before the election to be counted.

Adrion Walker, Iron County Human Resource (HR) Director, reported that the HR budget was on track. Adrion reported filling various positions since his last report such as: Full-time Victims Advocate working with the Iron County Sheriff and Police departments, four seasonal election workers, Part-time Bailiff, seasonal Deputy Treasurer, two Full-time Patrol Deputies and two Full-time Correction Deputies. All positions, except the Victims Advocate, were backfill of open positions. Adrion reported that the Iron County employee turnover was at 11 percent. This was a good rating. There had been no unemployment claims filed.

Adrion reported that the Public Defender budget was on track. He was waiting on some of the tracking reports from the Juvenile Public Defenders. The appeals were still under budget. The contract for Jeff Slack was approaching. He noted that Dale Sessions was doing a great job. Dale Sessions was selected to the Adoption Representation list for Southern Utah.

Alma Adams, Iron County Commissioner, reported that there was still a controversy between the Department of Wildlife Resources (DWR) and ranchers over the Big Horn Sheep. DWR was meeting that day at 10:00 a.m. in Beaver regarding the Big Horn Sheep conflict between livestock and sportsmen. Alma reported that the Forest Service had met with another group in Panguitch to begin 20 year contracts for thinning, treating and logging.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commissioner, reported that the Children's Justice Center (CJC) Dancing with the Neighborhood Stars fundraiser was a huge success. Scott Phillips and Fred Adams were the producers of the show. Along with the dancers there were approximately 30 children who participated in the entertainment that had been served by the CJC. Michael reported that a record \$50,201 was raised for the CJC. This was the fifth year for the fundraiser. The first year raised \$4,000. The funds raised would be used for the facilities, training, medical equipment and being able to embed personnel in the schools.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Cindy Bulloch, reported that the UAC Conference would be held November 15th and 16th. The Iron County Commissioners were welcome to attend.

PRESENTATION OF THE 2019 IRON COUNTY TENTATIVE BUDGET

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, reported that the tentative budget was filed with the Iron County Commissioners on November 1st. The budget was currently balanced in the tentative form without any appropriations with exception of Fund 11. He would be appropriating money from the fund balance, primarily due to Capital acquisitions and transfers to the Road Fund. There was \$1.7M being appropriated to Capital and Fixed Asset Acquisitions, which included vehicles budget wide. There was a 1.5 percent Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) that was contemplated in the budget. This was pursued rather than an adjustment due to the algorithm that Adrion Walker had developed and would benefit the employees. The benefit package was an increase of \$54,000. There were no additional requested full-time employees approved with the exception of a

were no additional requested full-time employees approved with the exception of a Videographer in Tourism. Maria Twitchell reported that the salary would be offset from Ad revenues. Capital projects still under review were a Salt building, Metal building for the Road Department and Weed Department, and the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) partial buildout. The tentative budget would be on display in the Auditor's Office before the Public Hearing.

Dan Jesson explained that there was a need to restructure the Iron County Search and Rescue by creating a new department within the General Fund under the supervision of the Iron County Sheriff and clarify the 501(c)(3) non-profit organization role. There was a gray area between when the Sheriff Department stops and the 501(c)(3) starts and where the Search and Rescue is. Washington County recently underwent a state audit in regards to a fraud report to their hotline. There were no write-ups and no wrong doing, but that Iron County would benefit by adopting these changes. Dan reported that there were three areas to be discussed: liability, employees (volunteers) and assets. When the volunteers participated in a search and rescue they were covered for liability under Iron County. He proposed bringing the Search and Rescue under the umbrella of Iron County under the Municipal Services Fund where the Sheriff Department and Fire Suppression were located. Also, create a department so the line items could be broken down. Keep the 501(c)(3) separate to act as a Financial Organization only.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve restructuring the Iron County Search and Rescue by creating a new department within the Municipal Services Fund under the supervision of the Iron County Sheriff and keep the 501(c)(3) separate as a Financial Organization. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Maria Twitchell, Iron County Executive Director of the Cedar City/Brian Head Tourism Bureau, reported that the budget spent as of October 31st was 77 percent of Transient Room Tax (TRT) and 60% of Restaurant Tax. Cedar City had continued to experience declines in occupancy. Some of the decline could be attributed to lack of snow early in the season at Brian Head, the opening of Courtyard Marriott and Airbnb type properties, which do not report occupancy data. Maria explained that they continued to use the company "STR Helper," to help identify all of the short term rentals in Iron County. Anyone they discover that is not reporting will get a letter outlining the state tax requirements. Regarding staff workload, Maria reported that there had been more calls, but fewer walk-ins during 2018. She reported that their new website was currently out for bid, and was to be awarded in mid-December. There were approximately \$75,000 in funds that went unallocated, and the Restaurant Tax Board requested that those funds be placed in the fund balance for a large, future project. Due to large requests in the Transient Room Tax (TRT) budget for a new staff person and website, the TRT Board did not allocate any funds for special events. Maria reported that the Outdoor Recreation budget was 71% spent. For 2019, she had requested a vault toilet for Woods Ranch for the Small Pavillion. The Restaurant Tax board had recommended splitting the \$45,000 to \$50,000 cost. Maria noted that many new events were taking place on county venues. From mountain biking to shooting to motocross, interest in Iron County was surging. There was a 20% increase in reservation, camping and special event fees from 2017. Maria reported that a concrete basin had been poured at Three Peaks, where flooding had damaged the road.

Mark Gower, Iron County Sheriff, reported that the Patrol budget was on track, he noted that the budget is posted each month on the Iron County Sherrif's Office website (www.ironsheriff.net). Sheriff Gower noted that they hoped to take delivery of new patrol vehicles in December. He noted that the department continued to work diligently. To date, about 3,300 case files had been pulled, which was on par with 2017. He noted that there were more physical abuses and slightly fewer sexual abuse cases. There were 15 outstaning extraditions, with the furthest being in Pennsylvania. There were 3 deputies currently deployed on overseas Military assignments. Sheriff Gower expressed his support for the military and the servicemen. The narcotics task force had filed a record 250 felony charges relating to the illegal distribution of drugs. He hailed the Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS) program as a great success. These volunteers helped defray overtime costs and accomplish public safety responsibilities at numerous biking events, the Utah Summer Games, and the Iron County Fair. The Iron County Search and Rescue had a very busy summer, in particular there were 12 ropes rescues in Kanarra Falls. Sheriff Gower discussed various other topics with the commissioners, but focused on the Animal Shelter. He expressed that it continued to run well, but that Pit Bull dogs were the hardest to get adopted. Also regarding animals, Sheriff Gower and the commissioners discussed a concern brought back by deputies that there were more cases where owners were neglectful in keeping their livestock restrained. He expressed concern that there was no county ordinance allowing for citation, even for multiple offenses. The commissioners asked Michael Edwards to investigate and possible draft an ordinance to address it.

Joanna Cuthers, Iron County Corrections Supervisor, reported that the Jail budget was at 79% spent. Joanna noted that the per meal cost was still low at \$0.94 per meal. She reported that there were currently 28 female inmates. While there were 3 vacancies, Joanna expressed confidence that with the current hiring roster, Corrections would be at full staff soon. She noted that the prison Work Crew was now operational. She noted that a remodel of the Jail was ongoing. Installation of bathroom hardware and bunks were currently happening.

Curtis Crawford, Council on Aging Manager, reported that attendance at both the Cedar and Parowan facilities continued to increase. Curtis noted that the Council on Aging (COA) workforce had been very stable for some time, but there were two employees about to leave. However 74 volunteers perfored 507 hours of service, for a value of \$12,609. Regarding interations with seniors, in October there were: 432 telephone vists; 425 one on one visits; 443 instances of outreach; 784 bus rides; 864 meals served at the centers; 1687 home delivered meals; and 457 health and disease prevention and promotion units distributed. Curtis reported that as of October 31st, 83% of the budget should be used, while actual usage was at 78%, or 5% below. He reported that a monthly dance night had begun in September, with a live band and excellent attendance. They were working on a wall in both centers to honor veterans. A local boy scout had completed an Eagle Scout project to install a lit flag pole outside the Cedar Center. Curtis relayed many successful classes, activities and field trips that had been undertaken. In the Cedar Center, an administrative office had been completed. It greatly improved morale among staff. Their fleet of 9 vehicles and the buildings were in good repair and maintenance.

Chad Reid, Iron County Extension Office Director, reported that the Extension Office was under budget thus far. They had coordinated with Cedar City Mayor Maile Wilson-Edwards to obtain a \$150,000 grant for Intergenerational Poverty, of which \$67,000 went to afterschool 4-H middle school programs. Another \$109,000 had been received in grants for programs at North, Fiddlers, and East Elementary schools covering 6 staff and volunteers from SUU, and serving 60 youth. Various nutritional assistance and awareness programs were ongoing. In terms of Agriculture and Natural Resources, Chad reported that they were still performing leak checks for irrigation and sprinkler systems. 21 soil moisture meters were installed to help farmers irrigate efficiently. He also reported on a study of indigenous burning habits, and what could be learned. They had studied fire history on Cedar Mountain by way of the history contained in ponderosa pine trees, both living and even stumps. The fire study showed a fire happening on average once every 9.6 years before the modern era. The Master Gardner program was active, and gave presentations to local 4th graders. The 4-H program continued to be very successful and well-attended. At the livestock show, they broke a record, selling \$580,000 in livestock. Chad reported on the use of Biochar, which helps soils hold water. Biochar is used as a soil amendment, and might be a solution to make use of the charred trees in the Brian Head burn scar.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

No Public Comments were offered

<u>DECISION REGARDING STANDARD IN OFFICER IN CHARGE (OIC) AND FIELD TRAINING OIC PAY DIFFERENTIALS</u>

Dan Jessen explained that the pay differential and accounting code for deputies that act as the Officer In Charge (OIC) for a shift and for deputies that act as OIC for Field Training were different. Currently, the Auditor's Office only had one accounting code, which gave a 6% differential for OIC. There was no code yet for the Field Training OIC, which had a differential of 5%. Dan suggested that a single accounting code be used for both scenarios, and that both scenarios also pay a 6% differential to simplify matters. Sheriff Gower expressed that having separate accounting codes for each situation would help to more properly account for training costs. Dan Jessen replied that his office could just create the Field Training OIC code with a 5% differential built in.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to standardize both OIC differentials at 5%. The motion died for lack of a second.

Alma Adams made a motion to keep the 6% differential for regular OIC, and to also keep the Field Training OIC at a 5% differential, causing an additional accounting code to be created. Second by Mike Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Nay.

PERSONNEL

Adrion Walker, Iron County Human Resource (HR) Director, presented the new hire of Elizabeth Soriano as a Victim Advocate, effective December 3. He noted that this was the second of two previously approved Victim Advocate position approved, and that Ms. Soriano understood that the continued existence of this position would be contingent upon continued state funding. Adrion Walker also presented for approval the completion of a six month probationary period for Brian Hoffmeier as Chief Deputy Assessor. This change would result in an increase in pay from \$68,473 to \$70,824. Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to approve the new hire of Elizabeth Soriano as a Victim Advocate, effective December 3, and to approve the completion of a six month probationary period for Brian Hoffmeier as Chief Deputy Assessor, resulting in an increase in pay from \$68,473 to \$70,824. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

NON-DELEGATED ITEMS

COURTHOUSE

Lester Ross reported that some warranty work would be done on sewer lines in the basement, that the landscaping was complete, and that the block work for the sign was completed, but was waiting on the actual sign to be completed and installed.

The commissioners and staff discussed and strategized regarding staff locations and office space availability. Commissioner Brinkerhoff directed that an agenda item be placed on the December 10th Iron County Commission Meeting to discuss the disposition of the Fiddlers Canyon Building.

INVOCATION

An invocation was offered by Eric Grimm.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Alma Adams made a motion to approve the minutes of the Iron County Commission meetings held October 26, 2015, June 8, 2015, November 26, 2018 and November 26, 2018. Second by Michael Bleak. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye.

Michael Bleak excused Commissioner Dale Brinkerhoff for health reasons.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS

Chad Nay, Iron County Building/Zoning Administrator, excused.

Steve Platt, Iron County Engineer, reported that the budget was on track. Steve reported that there was a prison crew constructing fences on 7700 W. Lake Rd. He reported that the bids had been submitted for the Iron County crushing and that the contract had been awarded to Susan Martin Construction, low bidder at \$5.38 per cubic yard. Regarding Revised Statute 2477 (RS-2477) Roads, Tyler Farlings would need a temporary office to download the inventory of the Iron County roads. The Parowan Emergency Watershed Protection (EWP) was completed. The Federal Government paid \$2,546,520 for the Parowan EWP. After the EWP was complete Iron County had \$195,408.33 left over. Some of the money may be used to help with the Paragonah EWP. Steve reported that the Forest Service would like to meet January 9th from 2:00 - 4:00 in the Justice Center Conference Room in regards to the Upper Basin road to Kolob Reservoir. Mike Edwards explained the property owners would like to meet with the Washington Commissioners after the New Year. He suggested that Iron County Commissioners attend that meeting regarding the road. Mike reported that the road has been maintained by Iron County since the 1960's. The lock on the Iron County side would need to be cut off. Natural Resources Conservation Service money for the North leg of Coal Creek road past the Regional Waste Water Treatment Plant that had been applied for would not be granted. Iron County would need to reapply each year.

Preston Nelson, Iron County Road Superintendant, reported that the Road Department was currently placing gravel on 4000 north so chipping could begin. There were 4 miles of subgrade built on Vandenburg Rd and plans for chipping 2 miles of the road would begin in 2019. Preston reported that plans for crushing road base would begin in December and January at the new pit on Vandenburg Rd. The Road Department was ready to plow snow and that they had striped Beryl Hwy, 5700 West, and Hwy 91 between Summit and Parowan City limits. He reported that some of the upcoming projects were: to start the bidding for Chipping oils, Chips and Asphalt, build 7700 West up and place gravel for about 1 ½ miles, place gravel on 1000 West & 1400 West and finish subgrade as far as they could get on Vandenburg Rd.

Bruce Anderson, Iron County Landfill Supervisor, reported that the budget was on track. The new garbage truck which had been discussed, had been delivered and already put in use. Bruce reported that the Landfill had received a new 938 CAT Loader and D6 Dozer and both were located at the Parowan Landfill. The new compactor would be delivered this week. He noted that he would be meeting with Betsy Cummings in HR to begin going over applications to replace Wade Brush. Most of the equipment was in good, working order. Bruce reported that the landfill was less 560 tons for household, up 1703 tons for construction and demolition. The total tonnage was up 1140 tons.

Dr. Blodgett, Iron County Southwest Health Department Supervisor, not present.

Jon Whittaker, **Iron County Clerk**, reported that there would be a swearing-in of the new Iron County Elected Officials at 12 p.m. on Jan. 2, 2019 at the Iron County Courthouse Commission Chambers.

Dale Brinkerhoff, Iron County Commissioner, joined the Iron County Commission meeting.

PRESENTATION OF THE 2019 IRON COUNTY BUDGET

Dan Jessen, Iron County Auditor, presented the 2019 Iron County Budget. Dan explained that the budget had been on display in the Auditor's office for the allotted time and the local Newspapers had been sent a copy. Dan reported that there would be no tax bonds, regular bonds or tax rate increases. There was approximately 1.7 M in Capital/fixed assets acquisitions which included vehicles. In the budget there was a 1.5% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) The Social Security Administration would have an increase of 2.8% in 2019. He reported that there was a "Standing Pat" on additional employee requests for 2019 with one exception of a New Videographer for the Tourism Department. The Videographer would be funded by a budget cut to the Tourism Advertising Promotion line item. Budgets were mainly driven by salary for employees. In summary, Dan reported that the Iron County Government was financially strong and healthy.

PUBLIC HEARING ON THE 2019 IRON COUNTY BUDGET

Michael Bleak declared the public hearing on the 2019 Iron County Budget open.
Bruce Washburn, a citizen of Iron County, explained that he was displeased that
\$7,500 was going to the American Lands Council with little return for Iron County. Dale
Brinkerhoff explained that those funds were appropriated for lobby groups.

No other public comments were offered. Michael Bleak declared the public hearing closed.

RESOLUTION 2018-13 ADOPTING THE 2019 IRON COUNTY BUDGET

Alma Adams made a motion to approve Resolution 2018-13 adopting the 2019 Iron County Budget as presented by Dan Jessen. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

PRESENTATION OF THE 2018 IRON COUNTY BUDGET AMENDMENTS

Dan Jessen explained that most of the budget amendments were previously approved by the Iron County Commissioners at earlier meetings. Dan reported that one of the items not talked about was a change with the audit trail on prior year's uncollectable utilities monies that were transferred and attached to property taxes. There was not a "clean" audit trail to follow. He reported that the uncollectable monies were now listed under "bad debt." This would clarify where the money flows from utilities to property tax. In 2018, the Sewer fund had \$9,300 written off to property taxes. Landfill had \$78,000, and Solid Waste Collections had \$1,900. Dan reported that the adjustment to merchant fees in the Treasurer Department was \$10,000.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair declared the public hearing regarding the amendments to the 2018 Iron County Budget open.

Bryan Dangerfield, Iron County Events Coordinator, reported that the Tour of Utah held in Iron County was successful. Dan reported that as a result of the Tour of Utah the Haute Route Company would be sponsoring a cycle race in Cedar City Aug 23-25, 2019. Cyclers from around the world would participate in the event. A 50k Ultra run was held in Cedar City for the first time. Dan expressed that community pride was strong.

Michael Bleak, Iron County Commission Chair, declared the convening of the ICCD&RA.

Whereas, the Iron County Community Development and Renewal Agency (the "Agency") and Iron County, the Iron County School District, the Iron County Unincorporated Area Services District #2, and the Central Iron County Water Conservancy District (the "Taxing Entities") are "public agencies" for purposes of the Act; and

Whereas, the Agency has adopted a Project Area Plan (the "Plan") for the Fiddler's Canyon Solar Community Reinvestment Project Area (the "Project Area"); and

Whereas, after careful analysis and consideration of relevant information, the Agency desires to enter into interlocal agreements with the Taxing Entities (the "Interlocal Agreements") whereby the Taxing Entities consent to the Agency receiving for an extended period of time a portion of the tax increment produced by the Taxing Entities' levies on real and personal property within the Project Area; and

Whereas, Section 11-13-202.5 of the Act requires that certain interlocal agreements be approved by resolution of the legislative body of a public agency.

Now Therefore, be it resolved by The Iron County Community Development And Renewal Agency as follows:

- 1. The Interlocal Agreements with each Taxing Entity, substantially in the form attached hereto as **EXHIBIT A**, are approved and shall be executed by the Agency.
- 2. The Chair shall make such additions, changes, and emendations as the Chair deems necessary prior to the execution of the Interlocal Agreements.
- 3. Pursuant to Section 11-13-202.5 of the Act, each Interlocal Agreement has been submitted, or will be submitted prior to execution, to legal counsel of the Agency for review and approval as to form and legality.
- Pursuant to Section 11-13-209 of the Act and upon full execution of each Interlocal Agreement, a copy thereof shall be filed immediately with the keeper of records of the Agency.

SILVER PEAK SUPPLY IN NEWCASTLE REQUEST FOR A LOCAL CONSENT FOR AN OFF-PREMISE BEER RETAILER LICENSE

Mike Edwards explained that there was a change that required an off premise entity to have authorization from the local government entity before they receive a license from the state to operate off premises. Shaneal Bess reported that at the Utah Business License Association (UBLA) training the state would now require a local consent first for off-site premise consumption.

CONSIDERATION OF AN ABATEMENT OF TAXES FOR A MOUNTAIN CABIN. PROPERTY LOCATED AT 1059 E. MEADOWS DR, BRIAN HEAD IN CEDAR BREAKS MOUNTAIN HOMESITES SUBDIVISION, UNIT B, BLOCK B. LOT 6 REQUESTED BY SHEM AND SUSAN MACKERT

Shem Mackert explained the property was appraised for \$124,000 at only 75 percent. He reported that he was willing to pay the tax based on what it was worth. Cindy Bulloch explained that the issue should have come to the Bureau of Equalization (BOE) to discuss the valuation. Mr. Mackert reported to her that he did not receive the valuation notice. Cindy reported that the commissioners only had the capacity to abate taxes. In this instance the amount to be abated was not known because of the lack of BOE. Mr. Mackert may appeal to the Utah State Tax Commission and report that they missed deadline and would like consideration. Only the State could reopen the BOE. Cindy explained that she needed to proceed in accordance with the law, which says that he missed the deadline of the BOE. If the abatement were to be denied, Mr. Mackert could appeal to the state to reopen the BOE. She would be willing to work with Mr. Mackert if he applied to the state.

Dale Brinkerhoff made a motion to deny the abatement of taxes for a mountain cabin property located at 1059 E. Meadows Dr., Brian Head in Cedar Breaks Mountain Homesites, Unit B, Block B, Lot 6. Second by Alma Adams. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

DISCUSSION ON SHORT-TERM RENTALS TO UPDATE THE COMMISSION AND PUBLIC ON THE ORDINANCE RECOMMENDED BY THE IRON COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION. CONSIDER DATE FOR PUBLIC HEARING AND ORDINANCE ADOPTION

Reed Erickson, Iron County Planner, explained that this was an update from the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission recommended an ordinance that brings Iron County in compliance with the code which requires the collection of the transient room tax. The ordinance defined short-term rental as "a privately owned residential dwelling such as, but not limiting to, a single family dwelling, a multifamily dwelling, apartment, house, guest house, duplex rented for occupancy, for dwelling, lodging, or sleeping purposes for any period less than 30 consecutive days when the owner is not present." A lot of concern in residential areas was parking, noise issues, and partying. Reed explained that the proposed ordinance was divided into two categories; 1. Incidental, or 25 nights or less for a short period of time. Such a use could occur in any zones where residential is allowed; 2. Business Level, or more than 25 nights a year. Could occur in all zones except R-1/2. The Business Level would require Administrative Land Use Permits, a carbon monoxide detector, a posted map for parking onsite, and a business license would be required. Reed noted that requests would come into his office for short-term information and requirements at least 2 to 3 times a week. Finally, Reed explained that the Short Term Rental ordinance does not affect when a basement is rented out with homeowners upstairs, or other shared use.

APPROVAL OF A CRUSHING GRAVEL CONTRACT FOR THE IRON COUNTY ROAD DEPARTMENT, 2018 and 2019

Jon Whittaker explained that Steve Platt reported earlier that Susan Martin Construction had the lowest bid for crushing at \$5.38 cubic yard for a total of \$269,000.

Christene Lowder explained that SUU purchased Assessor's Parcel Number (APN) B-1253-3-BL located at 2265 W. Kittyhawk Dr. in Cedar City on October 23, 2018. The previous owners paid the pro-rated property taxes up to the closing date. Christine reported that SUU was now asking for tax exempt status from October 23 through December 31, 2018 in the amount of \$400.05.

Alma Adams made a motion to approve Southern Utah University tax exempt status beginning October 23 through December 31 as presented by Christene Lowder. Second by Dale Brinkerhoff. Voting: Alma Adams, Aye; Michael Bleak, Aye; Dale Brinkerhoff, Aye.

Lester noted that the commissioners would now need to make a decision whether to proceed to sell or to rent the building. The Water Conservancy moved into a larger office in the building. Ensign Engineering had expressed a desire to lease the two North rooms, Cindy Bulloch expressed that the purchase price should be dependent on the appraisal. Alma Adams expressed concern that sale proceeds would go to the jail fund. Dan Jessen explained that any proceeds from the sale of the Fiddlers Building would go to Capital Project funds.

Dale Brinkerhoff suggested that Iron County offer the Fiddlers Building for sale contingent upon current assessment. Advertise self with the proceeds put into capital projects.
